FWSA voting delegates who attended our 90th Annual FWSA Snowsports Convention in June elected volunteer officers to our Board of Directors and Board of Trustees. Council Presidents, the FWRA President, and our National Ski Patrol Liaison also serve on the Board of Directors. As President, I make appointments of committee leads which the Board ratifies. “Altitude with Attitude”

Far West Ski Association’s 91st Annual Convention is set for June 6-9, 2024, in Reno, Nevada. It will be, once again, co-hosted by the Bay Area Snow Sports Council and Sierra League & Council. The fabulous Atlantis Casino Resort Spa will be the host hotel for our glorious stay while in Reno. Located just 10 minutes from the airport, the AAA Four Diamond Resort boasts free hotel shuttles, both indoor and outdoor pools, a Forbes Travel Guide Four-Star Spa, loads of entertainment, restaurants and bars.

The City of Reno itself, known as the “Biggest Little City,” will roll out the red carpet for us upon our arrival. We’ll begin the weekend early, with a relaxing Happy Hour at one of the local spots on Wednesday evening. This will give the “early birds” a chance to meet and greet their friends, enjoy some food and have a nice adult beverage or two while we play catch-up with what’s been happening since we were all together in Boise in June, 2023.

We are looking at possibly doing a repeat of our 2007 Pub Crawl, at the National Auto Museum, in downtown Reno. This would be a catered affair, with food and beverages, as well as a tour of the museum. There may be a Raft Trip on the Truckee River during the day on Thursday, to get everyone wound up for even more excitement that evening.

On Friday, we will hold the 17th Annual Michael German Memorial Golf Tour-

namment. This will take place at one of the lovely local golf courses, where we’ve played before. We will have an opportunity to team up, and have some fun competition for prizes, as well as network with our industry partners, and finish off with a great lunch and awards. You will also have the option of going on a bike ride on Friday. This too, will be along the scenic Truckee River, beginning at Palisades. We will be done with all this in plenty of time to get to the Pool Party later on Friday afternoon, followed by the Club Happy Hour, prior to the 38th Annual Silent Auction and Trade Show on Friday evening.

Network with your favorite ski resorts, meet with Tour Operators to plan future trips for your club and council, get trip details and pricing, and participate in a fantastic Silent Auction that can bring you a variety of hardware or adventures for the coming season. A drawing will take place during the auction for two Trip Gift Certificates, valid for \$250 towards one of Far West’s many skiing or adventure trips the following season.

On Saturday, you will have the opportunity to sit in on some fascinating Snowsport Leadership sessions. We plan to have a hands-on session with a Ski Mechanic from one of the local area ski shops, where we’ll learn about boot fitting, ski tuning, and the latest in gear. Another session may be geared toward Succession Planning... searching for leaders for your organization. A Public Affairs panel session, in the afternoon, could include representatives

from the new Snow Sports Museum currently located in Tahoe City, Bill Clark from the Western Ski-Sport Museum, and possibly Ingrid Wicken, ski historian and founder of the California Ski Library. Bill is the head of Nordic ski training and a member of the Board of Directors for the Auburn Museum. Jon Lundin, award-winning author, who spoke on writing the history of his ski club, in Boise, has been invited to participate again. John is the author of four books and numerous articles about ski jumping, ski resorts and Sun Valley Ski Club. Invited guests and speakers will include: Tom Kelly, former Vice President of Communications of U.S. Ski and Snowboard and 2018 inductee into the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame; Wayne Wong, World Freestyle Champion and inductee into the Canadian Ski Hall of Fame and U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame; and Daron Rahlves, World Champion and Olympic ski racer.

“Save the Date” announcements will be sent out sometime this fall. Convention registration materials will follow in mid-February. Come play with us and find a little Altitude with Attitude! See you in Reno!



FWSA 2024 International Ski Week – Madonna di Campiglio, Italy

At the turn of the nineteenth century, European aristocrats discovered a wonderful place in the heart of the Dolomites, and Madonna di Campiglio became a sophisticated and elegant destination, whilst preserving its majestic and fascinating landscape of the Dolomites.

We are currently taking registrations to go back to the amazing Dolomites in late February 25 – March 3, 2024. Madonna di Campiglio is the main point of access to the Dolomites mountain range. The resort is located in a valley between the scenic Dolomites

and the Italian Alps with the ability to ski both. This vibrant Italian ski area links four small sectors known both for excellent grooming and steep runs. The slopes spread out widely. The ski area has 57 lifts, and 93 miles of ski runs with a capacity of more than 31,000 people per hour. A spectacular 16-minute gondola ride connects to the neighboring resort of Pinzolo.

Madonna di Campiglio is one of the world's classic ski centers and one of Italy's most famous, ranking with Cortina, Courmayeur and San Martino. Considering its long history in winter sports, it has the benefit of an extensive and hugely enjoyable ski area with lifts coming right down into the town, unusual assets compared to many other famous ski resorts. The resort's altitude gives it more dependable conditions than many traditional winter sports centers.

After Madonna di Campiglio Ski - Northern Italy Extension Adventure Tour

Many of the Madonna di Campiglio ski week participants will be enjoying the extension trip in Northern Italy. We will be staying 2 nights in Milan and visiting the "must see" attractions, such as the Duomo Cathedral, the Sforza Castle, Teatro La Scala exterior, the amazing Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II and much more.

The next day we'll drive to Lake Como for a walking tour which includes visit-

ing the Dome, then we'll take a boat tour on the lake.

After Milan, we'll transfer to Verona for 2 nights, where we'll have a guided walking tour. The next day will be a free day to explore on your own.

After Verona we'll transfer to La Spezia where we'll spend 3 nights. On our way, we will stop for a balsamic vinegar "acetaia" tasting in Modena, where the authentic balsamic vinegar comes from. Then we will proceed to Parma for an authentic ham and cheese tasting, arriving in La Spezia later that day.

Off with the guide for a for day tour on the train and by boat to Cinque Terre. Cinque Terre is famous for their series of Italian villages that are perched high along the rugged cliffs of the Italian Riviera. These five villages along the Ligurian coastline and the surrounding hilly areas form a part of the Cinque Terre National Park that was designated as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1997.

Our last day adventure day will take us on a boat touring Portovenere. The scenic views will be amazing and this little medieval town in Liguria is just a stone's throw away from Cinque Terre. It too is a UNESCO World Heritage site and one of the most picturesque towns in Italy.

We hope to see the “Big 5” during this photographic safari trip and explore areas that FWSA has not been to in a very long time. Let's join together and experience the local culture, as well as seeing the many magnificent animals in their natural habitat.

We will depart the U.S. and fly into Kilimanjaro Airport then off to our lodge in Arusha. The next day we will travel to Lake Manyara National Park, which is famous for its tree-climbing lions. We will engage with several photographic safaris/game drives throughout the trip.

Golden-maned lion prides feast on the plain grazers. Solitary leopards and high-density cheetahs prowl the southern plains, yet there are over 500 species of birds in these areas. This will be a feast for your eyes. An optional hot air balloon safari will be taken by some to experience an early morning flight with a bush breakfast...a true “Out of Africa” experience and much more to experience.

links. Getting to Chamonix is easy: it's just over an hour from Geneva airport. All snowsports enthusiasts should plan a pilgrimage to Chamonix to experience the magic of the Mont Blanc massif at least once. The town also has a well-deserved reputation for lively nightlife.

FWSA Galapagos Adventure Trip – 2026

Research is underway for the 2026 Adventure Trip to the Galapagos, which is part of Ecuador, and possibly Machu Picchu, which is in Peru, or to another destination. Stay tuned for the announcement of this trip.

FWSA 2027 International Ski Week – Val Gardena, Italy

2025 NORTH AMERICAN SKI WEEK—BANFF, CANADA, JANUARY 25—FEBRUARY 1, 2025

The destination for the 2025 North American Ski Week will be Banff, Canada. We will stay in town at the following lodgings: Banff Park Lodge, Caribou Lodge, Moose Lodge, and Ptarmigan Inn. Lake Louise is known for the "biggest" Banff skiing. It has 25% beginner terrain and a green run accessible from every chairlift, 45% intermediate terrain, and 30% expert terrain. It has terrain for every level and is great for large groups and families.

Banff National Park is a UNESCO World Heritage site which shouldn't be missed. It has some of the world's most beautiful sites such as Lake Louise Lake, breathtaking mountain peaks, and all kinds of wildlife. It is a unique and special destination.

FWSA Annual Convention.



SKI AREA DEVELOPMENT Independent Ski Resorts

Aspen Snowmass, CO

Beginning in the 2023-24 season, the area, which has been skied for years by a small number of people, will now be accessed via a high-speed quad and will include 1,220 vertical feet of groomed trails and glades ranging from intermediate to advanced terrain (plus an extension of favorite expert runs such as Walsh's, Kristi, Hyrup's). This will be Aspen Mountain's first significant addition since the opening of the Silver Queen Gondola in December of 1985.

Mt. Hood Meadows, OR

Mt. Hood Meadows is replacing the Mt. Hood Express, a high-speed quad with a detachable six-pack chairlift. Although the new Leitner-Poma chairlift will not increase speed, it is expected to increase capacity by 1,000 people per hour, from 2,600 to 3,600.

Bogus Basin, ID

Bogus Basin just completed its 80th season. The resort has allocated \$5 million to a variety of projects including additional snowmaking equipment, new runs, expanded beginner terrain, RFID technology, and increased lighting for night skiing. Some of that was accomplished prior to 2022-23 ski season. During the 2023 off season, Bogus Basin has installed a new pump on the "back side" to add more snowmaking capacity.

Brundage Mountain, ID

Brundage Mountain is the 4th largest

ski area in Idaho. Located in McCall it has 1,920 skiable acres and averages 320 inches of snow per winter. In 2023 the U.S. Forest Service approved Brundage Mountain's master development plan, which includes proposals for up to seven new lifts, including two more high-speed quads, which could eventually serve substantial terrain expansions. Brundage is replacing the Centennial triple chair installed in 1990 with a Doppelmayr high-speed quad in the summer of 2023. The new quad will cut the ride time from 16 minutes to six minutes. The new lift will be in operation for the 2023-24 ski season.

Big White Ski Resort, BC

For 2023-24 Big White will open a new luxurious and relaxing spa at Stonebridge Lodge, where guest can relax and rejuvenate after an exhilarating day on the slopes. Big White has also purchased a new groomer with advanced technology adding to a fleet of 12 groomers. This new groomer will enhance skiing conditions for guests and increase efficiency in snow grooming operations. Last year replaced 16 cabins on Lara's Gondola. This year the gondola controls have been upgraded for safety, reliability, and efficiency. The River Day Lodge will re-open this winter with many improvements. Big White will be adding two new electric vehicle charging stations.

Jackson Hole, WY

After 31 years of ownership, the Kemmerer family announced in August its intent to sell Jackson Hole Mountain Resort. The Kemmerer family bought

the Resort in 1992, and their passion, dedication and commitment turned the Resort into a world-class destination. As the family watched the consolidation of the ski industry, their highest priority was maintaining the Resort's status as an independent, family-owned ski area. The Kemmerer family found the perfect buyers: Teton County residents, close Kemmerer family friends and Jackson Hole Mountain Resort Board Members Eric Macy, Mike Corbat, their families and a small, select group of co-investors.

Alterra Mountain Company Resorts Steamboat Springs, CO

Steamboat is moving ahead with a \$220 million improvement package which will make it the second largest ski resort in Colorado. The big items that are part of the upgrade include the new Wild Blue Gondola, which Steamboat describes as "the longest and fastest 10-person gondola in North America. With the lower leg opening in 2022-23, and upper leg opening in 2023-24, the state-of-the-art gondola will feed skiers/riders through a newly created mid-station adjacent to Bashor bowl with the final destination at the top of Sunshine Peak." The gondola will be 3.16 miles long with a total riding time of 13 minutes. The Mahogany Ridge expansion will add 650 acres to the north side of the resort. The additional terrain will move Steamboat from the fifth largest resort in Colorado to second place. In addition, improved snowmaking will ensure that the runs

The other race we had was at Snow King Mountain, and that was a GS on a steep pitch that was very rhythmic

Many of the racers commented on how much fun they had on their runs down the hill. Afterwards, we had a picnic lunch in the Snow King lodge, and everybody had a good time socializing.

Believe it or not, ski racing is a very social sport. Racers get to know other racers in their groups, and friendships materialize over time. You end up free skiing with skiers you otherwise would not know. Racing also helps you improve your skiing technique so you will be more comfortable on various types of terrain, and of course it is also fun to

compete with your friends, win or lose! Ski racing can also help skiers with their confidence, which is very important when coming down the mountain.

For 2024, we have tentatively scheduled the Far West Championship races for April 3rd & 4th at Mammoth Mountain. The race clinic will be on Wednesday April 3rd at 10:00 AM, and the GS Race will be at 10:00 AM on Thursday April 4th, with the Slalom at 1:00 PM on the 4th. We will be experimenting this year with mid-week races and see if it is successful.

If you want to improve your technique, or you want to have fun, come on out and give ski racing a shot!

Athletic Scholarship Chair

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is in its 19th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$9,050 and 14 recipients in the 2022-2023 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is \$193,000 to 139 recipients. The program is designed to provide financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where FWSA has a presence. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with U.S. Ski and Snowboard (USSS) and must participate in racing programs in states where FWSA has regional councils. These include California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, athletic performance, academic achievement, and community service.

Skiing is an expensive sport and the costs involved in ski racing cannot be left up to the parents alone to incur. For younger athletes the costs are modest. However, for 15 through 20 year olds, where competition becomes national and even international, the costs can be significant. Without the

help of outside resources, many junior racers simply cannot compete. For a top competitor, expenses can reach \$20,000 per year. This is not a seasonal sport for these racers; it includes a full year of ski-related involvement. After the winter race competition has concluded, competitors engage in dry-land training; then off to summer camps. Camps typically run about \$1,200 per week, not including transportation.

Winter training costs range from \$1,000-\$1,500 each season. Most applicants work part time to offset expenses. The demands on their time is significant. They must balance their time between training, competition, school, work, and community service. Despite these demands, the average GPA for these recipients consistently exceeds a 3.9 average. Our scholarships are modest compared to the need, but they do make a difference in the overall scope of the resources they require.

The funding of the scholarships come from a number of sources: raffles, auctions, club and council partnerships, and direct contributions from club

members, clubs, and councils. The FWSA has greatly benefitted from the generous support from its sponsors including **Whitefish Mountain Resort** (www.skiwhitefish.com), a year round winter and summer resort; and **Grouse Mountain Lodge** in Whitefish, Montana; **Schure Sports, Inc.** (www.karbonmail.com), maker of the Karbon line of snowsports apparel; **US Ski & Snowboard**, and the **Far West Racing Association**. Their contributions of vacation packages, snowsports apparel, and cash bring in approximately \$10,000 per year as raffle and auction proceeds, as well as direct cash donations.

In addition, our partnership program through clubs and councils afford us approximately one third of our scholarship funding each year. Finally, the **Far West Ski Foundation** (www.farwestskifoundation.org), 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization, is a valuable resource for encouraging tax exempt donations. 

Protect Our Winters

POW has been lobbying at both the State and Federal levels since 2013, giving the organization the opportunity to build relationships with lawmakers and staff on both sides of the aisle. Bipartisan work can be a challenge, but this approach is critical to advocating on behalf of POW's constituents. Over the last three years POW has been lobbying for many of the policies that were included in the "Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)" and the "Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)," marking a huge win for the POW advocates. On June 20 and 21, POW held its first Lobby trip of 2023 in Washington D.C. with 14 Athlete, Science, Creative Alliance members and five Brand Alliance partners to meet with the Biden Administration's agency officials.

POW's key talking points included:

In order to reach our clean energy goals and address climate change, we need to responsibly develop and deploy renewable energy. Renewable energy needs to reach communities, so we also need to rapidly build transmission lines to deploy affordable energy across the country. Communities

that host transmission and other energy infrastructure need real incentives to come to the table and work with developers and other key stakeholders to build and operate this energy infrastructure. Responsible deployment of renewable energy and transmission development must tangibly support local communities. Community participation will help alleviate the growing backlog of permit applications and ensure projects can move forward. POW's proposal would build a fund to support communities, which requires no additional government spending. on Sunshine Peak are “consistently covered and can open early.”

Mammoth Mountain, CA

Mammoth Mountain is replacing the Canyon Express chairlift with a new Doppelmayr D-Line 6-Pack detachable high-speed chairlift featuring an enclosed top and bottom terminal. The ride time will remain the same but the lift is expected to transport an additional 800 skiers per hour.

Palisades Tahoe, CA

The new 2.4 mile gondola at Palisades Tahoe opened last winter and made Palisades Tahoe and Alpine Meadows the largest ski resort in California (6,000 acres) and third largest in North America behind Whistler Blackcomb, BC and Park City, UT. The connection is a 16 minute ride from Palisades to K-22 to Alpine. The gondola has 96 cabins that can carry 8 passengers each. The resort offers 41 lifts and 279 ski runs.

**Vail Resorts
Attitash, NH**

The much anticipated Mountaineer is a

high-speed 4-passenger chairlift that will reduce ride time to 6-minutes, increase uphill capacity and improve the flow of the Attitash base area.

Breckenridge, CO

The Peak 8 base area will be upgraded to enhance the beginner and children’s experience and increase uphill capacity. A new high-speed 4-person chairlift will replace the existing 2-person fixed grip 5-Chair. The new investments at Breckenridge will provide a clear path to progression on Peak 8, with Rip’s Ride servicing learning and beginner terrain, 5-Chair servicing beginner and intermediate terrain, and the Colorado and Rocky Mountain Super Chairs servicing intermediate and advanced terrain.

Keystone, CO

The Bergman Bowl replacement is expected to be completed in 2023. The high-speed, six passenger Bergman Bowl Express Lift will add 555 acres of lift-served, intermediate-and-above level high alpine terrain with 16 new trails in Bergman and Erickson Bowls.

Stevens Pass, WA

The Kehr’s 2-person chair will be re-

placed with a new fixed grip 4-person lift to improve out-of-base capacity and the guest experience.

Whistler Blackcomb, BC

Vail Resorts plans to replace the Fitzsimmons high-speed quad lift with a new eight person high-speed chairlift in 2023. The Jersey Cream high-speed quad will be replaced by a new six-person high-speed lift in 2024.

Boyer Resorts

Big Sky Resort, MT

Big Sky Resort expects to open the new Lone Peak Tram during the 2023-24 season. The resort announced on August 8th that the lift’s sole tower was finished and crews would begin installing the haul rope. Unlike other lifts that use a series of towers to ascend a mountain, the Lone Peak Tram will use just one tower to bring skiers to Lone Peak’s 11,166 ft summit. The lift will have two tram cabins, each cabin capable of transporting 75 passengers. Travelling at 22 miles per hour the ride time will be under 4 minutes. The cost to ride the new Tram will change from a daily rate to a per ride fee.

History Committee Chair

The Far West Ski Association’s history program was founded in the early 2000’s, and the primary reasons were to: expose or educate members to the dynamic history of their sport; provide educational material for public use; promote the establishment, growth, and continuance of preservation in learning centers and museums; and provide opportunities for research into snowsports history.

The program started with an award for a club or council that produced a body of work that educated members about their history. The amount of work required discouraged participation, so another recognition program was created giving Historic Recognition for Clubs, Councils, Ski Patrols and Ski Schools with over 50 years in existence. The Western Ski Heritage Award, sponsored by the Steamboat Resort since 2000, was designed to recognize recent work which shows the role of snowsports in the larger community. We have recognized many authors and research projects over the years.

2023 History Award/Recognition Recipients

Submissions were received for all three programs this year, and congratulations to the winners, who were recognized at the 90th Annual Far West Ski Association Convention. They were as follows:

- **Western Ski Heritage Award –** John W. Lundin, for his work to preserve ski jumping history, ex-

pressing Norwegian identity, and its role in the development of skiing in America.

- **History Recognition Award –** Rusty Bindings Ski Club for their book, “Rusty Bindings 50: 1971-2021,” Tony Baker, Historian and Editor.
- **Historic Ski Clubs –** Sun Valley Ski Club, Founded in 1936 and Century City Ski Club, Founded in 1972.

Tony Baker volunteered to conduct one of the Snowsports Leadership Academy Sessions to explain how easy it is to prepare and publish a history for a club or council. John W. Lundin offered to join him, since he recently published a history of the Sun Valley Ski Club. First and foremost, I want to extend my great appreciation to the FWSA Board of Directors, the FWSA Service Awards Committee, the FWSA Safety Committee, and Jane Wyckoff for nominating and awarding me the esteemed honor of being named the 2023 FWSA Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year. I am truly thrilled and humbled. I am so happy to be reengaged with the Far West Ski Association as the National Ski Patrol Liaison and look forward to being a part of the preservation, growth and continued success of our membership and programs.

Our 2022-2023 winter season was definitely one for the history books. I don't know that I will ever experience such winter wonderlands in the Far West ever again in my lifetime but I sure hope I do! The Southern Sierra snowpack reached 219% of its normal levels. Early numbers from the National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) show U.S. ski areas had record levels of visitation for the 2022-2023 season with a total of 64.7 million skier/rider visits- a 6.6% increase over the previous season. With more people on the slopes, the services our NSP members provide are evermore invaluable, depended upon, and necessary. There were more than 24,000 people enrolled in and took part in the coveted NSP Education Programs.

We are through most of the summer months and many of the local Far West Resorts have had a couple months with their summer Bike Parks

in full operation. Many of these resorts are utilizing well-trained and seasoned volunteers from the National Ski Patrol. Entertaining our local communities and guests in our bike parks bring a heightened awareness of the potential blunt force traumas to the abdomen which is a common occurrence due to the terrain, speed and force of riding accidents. These injuries can cause moderate to severe damages to the liver, spleen and kidney organs. These types of injuries can be life-changing and life-threatening, hence the focus on ensuring our summer patrollers are well educated and trained and as always ready to respond and save lives.

National Ski Patrol Celebrates 85th Anniversary

1938 - 2023

National Ski Patrol started in 1938 in Stowe, VT to address the need for national ski rescue by Charles Minot "Minnie" Dole (grew to over 4,000 members and 300 patrols by 1950). In 1941, National Ski Patrol was ap-

pointed by the United States Army to recruit and vet soldiers for the 87th Mountain Infantry Regiment and 10th Mountain Division. National Ski Patrol became a congressionally chartered non-profit organization under Title 36 of the United States Code in 1980 (officially sanctioned by the US Government). National Ski Patrol is now the largest winter education organization in the world with over 31,000 members across 650+ patrols. Join us in celebrating over eight decades of history.

Skiing and snowboarding in deep powder is awesome. However, tree wells, areas of loose, unconsolidated snow at the base of trees, can be extremely hazardous, and can even cause death from Snow Immersion Suffocation (SIS). When skiing in areas where tree wells and deep snow are a potential hazard, always ski with a buddy.

What is a Tree Well and Snow Immersion Suffocation (SIS) Accident?

A tree well/snow immersion suffocation accident can happen when a skier or snowboarder falls - usually headfirst - into a tree well or deep loose snow and becomes immobilized and trapped under the snow and suffocates. In an inverted position you can become trapped under the snow. Breathing becomes difficult as the loose snow packs in around you. Without immediate help from your partner, you may suffocate.

Prevention of falling into a tree well, or areas of deep snow, is all-important because the odds of surviving deep snow immersion are low. **A total of 90% of people involved in Tree Well/SIS hazard research experiments could NOT rescue themselves.** If a partner is not there for immediate rescue, the skier or rider may die very quickly from suffocation - in many cases, he or she can die as quickly as someone can drown in water.

What is a Tree Well?

A tree well is a void or depression that forms around the base of a tree. It can contain a mix of low hanging branches, loose snow and air. These voids can be hidden from view by the tree's low hang-

ing branches. There is no easy way to identify if a particular tree has a dangerous tree well by sight therefore, treat all tree wells as dangerous. Most all Tree Well/SIS accidents happen in un-groomed terrain. You can easily identify and avoid these areas.

The picture from the site of a fatal Tree Well/SIS accident demonstrates that even very small trees with just their tops visible can be lethal.

TIP: In dense tree areas or in poor visibility, ski or ride short pitches and stop to regroup often - stay within sight of your partner! More than half of all SIS victims were with partners that did not see them go down. Lose sight of your partner and you could lose your friend.

What if you go down?

- Yell or use a whistle to get your partner's attention.
- Do whatever you can to keep your head above the surface of the snow including rolling, grabbing tree branches or the tree trunk. If possible, keep your feet below the level of your head.
- If you become immersed, make a space around your face and protect your airway - resist the urge to struggle, it could compromise your airspace and entrap you further.
- Stay calm to conserve air.
- Trust your partner is on their way.
- If possible, use your cell phone to call the ski patrol or the resort's

emergency number.

Keep your partner in site at all times.

- Don't leave to get help. Stay with your partner.
- Call for additional resources. Use a whistle or yell for assistance. If possible, call ski patrol or the resort's emergency phone number.
- Evaluate scene safety for yourself.

Immediately begin snow immersion rescue efforts. Go directly for the airway, and keep it Clear, being careful not to knock more snow into the hole. Clear any snow from the airway and continue necessary first aid or extrication efforts.

Do not try to pull the victim out the way they fell in. Instead, determine where the head is and tunnel in from the side.

When tunneling directly to the airway be careful not to knock more snow into the hole. Continue expanding the tunnel to the airway until you can extricate the body. Efficient "strategic shoveling techniques" with multiple rescuers is very useful.

Looking For Leaders? Do You POP with POWER?

Does your organization offer members and volunteers an opportunity to bring their own POWER to make a difference?

Perspective - what they think

Outlook - what they see for the future

Wisdom - what they have learned

Experience - what they have done

Resources - what they can share

Purpose

Members need to feel that they belong to an organization with value. Volunteers want to know they are making a difference. They want to share a burning "why" that excites them. The purpose is what keeps them engaged and involved, even through trials and hardships. What is your organization's purpose(s)?

If your snowsports organization does not POP, there are changes to make, so go ahead and make them quickly. Host activities. There are active clubs that are attracting new members each month. Members turn into volunteers, and they turn into leaders, who fuel your leadership pipeline. Your local snowsports council, and the Far West Ski Association have resources to help your organization be one of these organizations that survive and thrive.



Each region has a Vice President and Board of Directors and reports to the current NBS President, Henry Rivers.

We are happy to announce the rejuvenation of a 15th club, Four Seasons Northwest, in Seattle, Washington, that has re-applied for membership. "We are focused on the growth and prosperity of our clubs, supporting the mission of the NBS to diversity in Snowsports with passion, unity, and harmony through fun and education" - David Geiger, Vice President NBSWR.
