
The area around Jackson Hole provides other activities that both skiers and non-skiers will enjoy. A list of these activities will be provided to the Trip Leaders

Far West Association's Antarctica Trip



If you want the ultimate winter outdoor adventure with some black and white furry friends, then visit the world's last great wilderness,



Antarctica. The 37 Far West Ski club members began by flying to the southernmost city in the world, Ushuaia, Argentina.

Boarding the MV Fram in the late afternoon, our feelings were ambivalent, both dreading and anticipating the journey through the infamous turbulent Drake's Passage. While enjoying 22-hours of uninterrupted sunshine, we had calm seas which occur only two to three times per year.

On our first Antarctica tour, we wore: long underwear, two jackets, waterproof pants, wool socks, and warm hat and scarf, --you name it, we had it on. We were loaned boots and rainproof jackets, and before we walked on Antarctica, we had to decontaminate the bottom of our boots. In order to keep the area undisturbed, we stayed on the Penguins' path that went from their rookery (where they nest) to the ocean.

I know this is shocking, but there are a few crazy people in our club that received an Ice Swimming Certificate for swimming in the Antarctica Ocean in swim suits. If you want to see the certificate, let me know.

On Deception Island, we saw Adelie, Emperor, Chinstrap and Gentoo Penguins. The penguins build circular nests out of pebbles and we saw light-brown newborns that looked like fat little fuzz-balls. A few rogue penguins steal pebbles from other nests, and when they get caught, they



chase and peck each other. The Antarctica food-chain consists of krill, then penguin, then other seabirds

(who eat penguin eggs); and lastly, whales, sea lions and harbor seals. We watched as an Orcus Whale Pod cornered some poor little penguin and made him an appetizer for four.

We then went to Half Moon Island and then through the Errera Channel. On the tall mountains, the expedition staff created a snow slide, so going down was fun and easy. The Ship's Captain had to maneuver around icebergs, and when the ship grazed one, you could hear the bang and feel the ship shudder. At Port Lockroy we were able to walk the beach and even see grass.

We arrived at the Antarctica Ukraine Station the day they celebrate Christmas, and we joined the festivities with a tour and a shot of home-made vodka.

We saw breathtaking scenery at Wilhelmina Bay. Antarctic ice contains 70% of the world's fresh water and 90% of the world's ice. In the Antarctic Sound, we saw icebergs shaped like "warehouses" that were long, square, flat-topped and a mile long. Heading back, we experienced huge waves, and in the dining room, people were leaning into anything they could find while trying not to spill their food.

Although, a 32-hour flight isn't



easy, it was well worth it. Antarctica is the most peaceful place on Earth. No wars have ever been

Serving as Administrative Assistant to the President, her functions were vital to the success of the operations of FWRA. Ski Equipment Design, How to Get the Right Ski Equipment Fit

Many great events occurred at the 2011 convention but partiality aside, one of my favorite programs at the convention is the Snowsports Leadership Academy. Why? Not simply because it provides an informational forum for the membership. Digging deeper, in the normal course of doing ski business-as-usual in your council or club, when do you have a chance to discuss

the dynamics of club involvement? Issues regarding membership, how one goes about organizing a trip, insurance check-ups, etc.; we do that here. And you get to interact with members from other clubs and councils and get input you usually don't have.

This year we had some new additions. The first, "Ski Equipment Design: How To Get The Right Fit," hosted by Mark Mackay from Atomic Ski Company, addressed new ski technology and how design has evolved

over the past decade. What does that have to do with leadership you ask? Well, if you are in a leadership position with your club, you may want to have some knowledge of the sport. Plus, well you know, it's fun. Mark also started with the video "Atomic: We Are Skiing 2011." Look it up on You Tube; you'll likely end up watching it several times.

Dick Shawkey spoke on "Building Membership Through Racing." Introducing new members to your race program is added value only a club can provide unless they

join a league on their own. It may be old hat to some of the veterans, but I have seen firsthand how excited first-time racers are

the race fees. This subject is also getting clubs to raise the bar considering family involvement. It's a great way to add a youth program to your club agenda.

The afternoon session revisited our first leadership topic, "Taking Office: Now What?" which explores the responsibilities when taking a position on the board, how to interact with other board

members, conducting meetings, setting club policy and agendas are just a few of the issues discussed. We could have this session every year as there are volumes of issues to talk about on this subject. Hosted by Eileen Sanford, Sheri Parshall, and Jo Simpson; from San Diego, Northwest, and Sierra Councils' respectively added a variety of viewpoints that covered a lot of ground in a very short time. Billy Kidd became America's hero back in the 1964 Olympics when he and teammate Jimmie Heuga became the first American men to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing — a silver for Kidd and a bronze for Heuga in the slalom at Innsbruck, Austria.



Bill Clark

Bill Clark is the *Western SkiSport Museum* Executive Director of the historic Auburn Ski Club, Inc. He directs the Auburn Ski Club Training Center and Western SkiSport Museum on Donner Summit. The ASC Training Center is home to Alpine, Nordic and Snowboard programs.



Troy Hawks

Troy has been the editor of the NSAA Journal since 2004. In this capacity, he directs all aspects of the publication including developing editorial content, writing, assigning and editing stories, photography, and management of magazine production including art, design, print and distribution.



Ron Ketter

Dr. Ron Ketter is the Deputy Regional Forester for Operations for the *USDA Forest Service* and previously worked at the *Forest Service* Headquarters in Washington, D.C., where he was Assistant Director of Strategic Planning, Budget and Accountability.



Dave Ludwig

Dave Ludwig, founder of *Hope On The Slopes*, originated what is now known as the *American Cancer Society (ACS) Hope on the Slopes*. Since its inception in 2004, \$2 million has been raised for the American Cancer Society.

J. Stanley Mullin Award Dennis Heffley





Jordan-Reily Award Christina Thomure

Christina Thomure works with Grand Targhee Resort's Sustainability Program and as a Commercial Sales Manager for Creative Energies, a renewable energy company with offices in WY and ID. Christina has served on steering committees for the Greater Yellowstone



Framework for Sustainable Development, the Linx co-op feasibility study, and was the program contact for Grand Targhee Resort's participation in UnCommon Sense.

"We are still learning about what 'good' is, trying to create a support network," Christina said. "People already love Grand Targhee. I want them to be proud of the resort for what we're doing up here by looking at every option available to lessen our impacts. We have to think inside of our island, but outside the box."

For the past three years, Christina has promoted these beliefs as she has helped steer Grand Targhee through the rough waters of trying to be environmentally friendly and economically viable simultaneously.

She became involved with the Yellowstone Business Partnership, a relationship she has fostered and enhanced at Targhee.

From grasping the greenhouse gases that Targhee emits to understanding how to best divert the resort's waste stream, Christina is encouraged by the change in behavior that has taken place up at 8,000 feet.

"From the front line to senior management, priorities have shifted to focus on sustainability," Christina said.

While she acknowledged significant challenges as Targhee tries to put the best practices in place as a Wyoming resort that depends on an Idaho gateway, Christina feels equipped with the sharp shears necessary to cut through the red tape she will encounter along the way. From a vision of a composting greenhouse that could supply the resort to the idea of a satellite university to teach sustainability up at altitude, Christina's mind is filled with ideas for the future.

In the meantime, Christina helps Grand Targhee establish itself as a leader in the industry by minimizing its impacts on the environment while maximizing the outdoor experience that brought her to the Rocky Mountains from the Midwest. *Written by Catherine Ohl*

Steve Bellamy is a creative sports and media entrepreneur known for founding The Tennis Channel and The Ski Channel television networks. He has been involved in the production of 1000's of hours of television and film, and has produced, directed, written and hosted numerous television shows and films.

The film he recently wrote, produced and



directed entitled "The Story" is about a diverse group of people who have devoted their lives to the mountains. It is garnering critical awards and is being pushed through the Academy Award nomination process.

He has been given a plethora of awards including a proclamation from the Mayor of Los Angeles, the key to the City of Las Vegas and the Distinguished Entrepreneur Award from the Kelly School of Business at Indiana University where he was also the commencement speaker.

As an avid evangelist of lifetime sports, promoting skiing and tennis has been his life's work. In the tennis world, Bellamy was one of the top 10 most influential people in the sport by *Sports Business Journal*. Also, he was awarded the Tennis News Person of the Year Award, which is given to an influential person in the sport every year, and is called the "Bellamy Award" in his honor. He won the award in 2005. For years he sat on every major board and could be seen regularly on ESPN and other news outlets prognosticating on tennis.

Steve has four boys and is married to former professional tennis star Beth Herr. The children are all tennis players and have won numerous National Titles.

Snowsports Builder Award



Dave McCoy opened Mammoth Mountain's first chairlift on Thanksgiving Day, 1955, just in time to meet his permit requirements. Since 1955, Dave and his crew have installed an average of one lift annually.

Not only did Dave love to ski and race, but he also loved developing the ski area and coaching young racers. He coached 19 of his team members to the United States Olympic Ski Team, including two of his own children. During the 1960s, approximately 80% of the US Women's National team trained at Mammoth.

After building his first chairlift in 1955, Dave went on to build one of the largest ski resorts in the country. Now a four-season destination resort, Mammoth Mountain is busy during the summer months as a world-class Mountain Bike Park and Adventure Center and operates a golf course and fly fishing guide service. Dave McCoy has been called one of the last great entrepreneurs in the skiing business.

When he was asked to help establish a college in the Eastern Sierra, he joined with other town leaders to introduce the nonprofit Mammoth Lakes Foundation to pursue this goal. The Eastern Sierra

College Center (ESCC) opened in 1996 with seed money from the McCoy family. In the 1930s, Dave McCoy and his friends envisioned a bright and promising future for Mammoth. Dave took that vision and built upon it, making Mammoth an integral part of California's burgeoning tourist economy. The legendary founder of Mammoth Mountain saw Mammoth as one of North America's best-loved ski destinations, but also as an extraordinary four-season resort playground.

Racing Into 2012

Looking forward to 2012, we are having the Far West Championships at Mammoth Mountain on April 6-8, 2012. The Championship weekend will include race clinics and pacesetter races on Friday, slalom races on Saturday on Fascination and Andy's Gold, and the giant slalom races on Sunday probably on Terry's and Fascination. On Saturday night we will have our awards banquet for the slalom and the silent auction, so bring your checkbook and take advantage of the great items available at the auction.

In 2011 we received tremendous snowfall from February through June, which did cause some cancelled races and challenging racing conditions for some races. In 2012, we are looking forward to a more normal snowfall and consistent snow conditions.

Tom Stienstra has made it his life's work to explore across California, the Pacific Northwest and beyond, always out hiking, biking, fishing, boating — and camping just about everywhere — always searching for the best of the outdoors and writing about it. He was the fourth living member inducted into the California Outdoors Hall of Fame.

Tom Stienstra is the outdoors columnist for the San Francisco Chronicle, where his column appears on Thursdays and Sundays, on the internet at SFGate. com/outdoors.

Tom Stienstra has been twice named National Outdoor Writer of the Year, "President's Award, Best of the Best," newspaper division, by the Outdoors Writers Association of America. He is the only outdoors writer in America to win first place in OWAA's Excellence in Craft competition for 10 straight years, and to win first place awards for newspaper, television, radio and photography in the same year. His national awards include from Associated Press, United Press International and Associated Press Sports Editors. In 2009, he won first place for best outdoors column in America.

His column, "Coping with death of a loved one," was chosen as one of the 20 best stories about dogs in the 20th century and reprinted in the book, "Old Dogs Remembered." Other stories selected for the book include features by James Thurber, T.S. Eliot, John Updike, William Wadsworth and others. A series about fishing for great white sharks was selected as one of the best features in the 20th century about San Francisco, and selected for reprint in the book, "Travelers' Tales of San Francisco." Tom is the nation's topselling author of outdoor guidebooks. His books are available at his website: tomstienstra.com.

Ski Scholarship Program is Growing

June 30 marks the deadline for applications for the 2011 Far West Ski Association athletic scholarships, and the beginning of the scholarship process for 2011. The applications are trickling in and we are happy to report that for the first time we're seeing interest from junior racers in the Intermountain Division. The fund raising for 2011 climaxed at this year's FWSA convention where the raffle and auctions raised \$3005.00. Our total funds available, including carry-over from the 2010 season, will fund at least 15 scholarships during the coming season. With possible new partners we may be able to exceed last year's 15 scholarships. We extend our appreciation to Whitefish Mountain Resort (www.skiwhitefish.com) and Grouse Mountain Lodge (www.grousemountainlodge.com), for the vacation packages which brought in \$1300.00 at the auction. We also would like to thank Sandy Beecher, Paul Vlasveld (and Adobe Systems Inc.), and the Acacia Winery for their donations for the convention raffle. To all the volunteers who pitched in to help sell raffle tickets and for the generosity of the convention attendees, a special thanks.

Much of the growth in the scholarship program is attributable to our partnership program. Ski clubs, councils, businesses and individuals have the opportunity for direct sponsorship of a young athlete. In its selection process, the scholarship committee evaluates and prioritizes candidates. All the scholarship recipients, whether direct or partnered, must meet the FWSA criteria. However, partners can establish additional criteria based on area of origin (e.g., Bay Area, Pacific Northwest, etc.) and gender. The scholarship committee will nominate a qualified candidate based on the partner's criteria. In turn, the partner agrees to maintain their sponsorship at a minimum of \$500 for three years. The committee will award a scholarship that is

no less than the amount provided by the partner, but reserves the right to increase the amount. This is usually done for athletes who would be eligible for a higher scholarship amount through a direct FWSA scholarship. Portland's Skiyente Ski Club was our first partner. Each year the women's club awards the Erin Nicole Award to the top female athlete from the Pa-

cific Northwest. Skiyente has since been joined by the Los Angeles Council, the San Diego Council, and Portland's Mountain High Snowsports Club.

Great news! Lila Lapanja, a two-time scholarship recipient, received a nomination to the U.S. Ski Team's development (D) team this last. Despite a hectic schedule and the demands of ski competition, she maintains a 4.0 GPA. She is currently a member of the Sugar Bowl ski team. During the last season, she went on the war path competing in 40 races, and adding over 17,000 miles to the family car. Not all races ended on the podium, but enough of the important ones, e.g., a silver medal in Slalom at the J-2 Nationals, earned her an invitation to compete in the U.S. National Championships where she placed third in the junior overall category. Lila is our first recipient to earn a spot on the D Team. Please note that the purpose of the athletic scholarship is not help athletes make it to the U.S. Ski Team. It is to help and encourage young athletes to excel, and in so doing, we try to make ski racing affordable for all junior athletes. We are making a difference, one kid at a time. Outstanding Club Publication Award, Web Site Outstanding Club and Coun-


