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

Billy Kidd 1964 Olympic Slalom Silver Medalist, Keynote Speaker



When you think of legends in American skiing the name **Billy Kidd** is at the top of the list. He and teammate Jimmie Heuga became the first American men to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing — a silver for Kidd and a bronze for Heuga in the slalom at Innsbruck, Austria.

Although his racing is confined mainly

to the "Legends Races" now, he continues his involvement in the sport as Director of Skiing at Steamboat; TV commentator at the Olympics; Head Skiing Coach for Special Olympics as well as equipment design, books, videos and movies.

Kidd grew up in Stowe, Vermont and raced internationally for nine years on the U.S. Ski Team. While racing, he studied at the University of Colorado and graduated in 1969 with a degree in economics.

In the 1964 Olympics, Billy marked yet another "first" for American men by becoming the first person to win both Amateur and Pro World Championships in a single year-1970. Kidd went on to win the Amateur World Championship in Val Gardena, Italy. Then Billy turned pro and two weeks later won the World Pro Championships.

Billy has made his home Steamboat Springs, Colorado since 1970 and spends much of the winter as Director of Skiing at the Steamboat Ski Area and running his Billy Kidd Performance Center.

Billy also leads Steamboat's Ute Future Olympian program, which brings Native American youngsters from Utah reservations to Steamboat, where they build self-confidence by learning to ski and snowboard. His efforts with Native American youth earned him the Texaco Star Regional Award.

Because his Olympic teammate and long-time friend Jimmie Heuga had MS, Kidd is also involved in fundraising for Multiple Sclerosis and is on the board of directors of the Jimmie Heuga Center for the Reanimation of the Physically Challenged, now known as Can Do MS.

We are so proud of Lila Lipanja, a six (6) time recipient of a FWSA Athletic Scholarship!

She had just finished her first driving lesson at age sixteen when she got the call from the U.S. Ski Team in the spring of 2011. "I was so excited. I've been working so hard...it's just one step closer to my dream of being an Olympic to chase after prize Easter eggs. With ski racer," said Lapanja, who learned of her nomination at the summit of a mountain highway in the Sierra Nevada.

Lila rode that momentum into a remarkable junior career, finishing sixth in the Junior Worlds slalom, winning backto-back U.S. Junior combined titles, and landing on the podium at the U.S Nationals with a bronze overall and Junior title in slalom.

In 2014, Lapanja claimed the NorAm Slalom title and secured her spot on the World Cup as a tech stand-out and NorAm champion. However, 2015 proved to be the most challenging season of her young career as she struggled with an injury: after being named to for the Snow Leopard Trust and is dedithe 2015 World Championship Team, Lapanja made "the hardest decision of my life" and forfeited her slalom spot so she could heal and regenerate for the rest of the season.




His most recent articles covered the US Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame inductions at Squaw Valley in April, a spe-

Snowsports Builder Award

The FWSA Snowsports Builder Award is given to individuals who have made an indelible positive impact on snowsports. The builder honored may be for achievements in athletics, the press, publishers, historians, industry, humanitarian work, area development, or technology. In short, they honor those who have made significant contributions to snowsports.

Ingrid Wicken California Ski Library

The Ski Library celebrated its 30th year of operation this year. It is the result of over three decades of collecting material that reflects the growth of snowsports in Southern California. The library holds probably the largest collection of paper goods, mementos and graphic material in the USA outside of state-sponsored libraries. It exists because of the devotion to ski history of one person - Ingrid Wicken.

Wicken became interested in and started collecting ski books more than 35 years ago while a graduate student at Cal Poly - Pomona. Her Master's thesis was a biomechanical investigation See it at http://www.skilibrary.com/ of the diagonal stride on skis vs. roller skis (she was and is an avid crosscountry skier). She has written four books on skiing history and numerous articles for events and journals. She has been a Professor of Kinesiology in Moreno Valley College, part of the **Riverside Community College District** since 1989.

What started as a fascinating hobby grew - and grew (and continues to grow) - into a fabulous collection of photographs, autographs, cartoons, magazines, legal documents, books, posters, equipment, maps, memorabilia and personal collections of authors and



skiers. It's a history of skiing in the USA, with special attention to the West and Southern California. It is open to the public and for research. The Library invites historical material from industry and ski organizations. index.html.

Ingrid has written seven books and numerous professional papers on ski history in various journals. Her research has resulted in a ski history timeline that provides a framework for snowsport history available for any researcher or editor. She has previowon the FWSA/Steamboat Western Ski Heritage Prize three times - in 2002, 2005, 2013 and this year. She won in 2013 for her book Flight: Fifty Years of Ski Jumping in California.

She continues her work on Western Lost Ski Areas. She is the author of one section of the new and authorita-


tive book License to Jump on women in ski jumping. Her chapter in this book, published in Sweden, covers the history of women's ski jumping in the USA and Canada from 1900-1950. She was a presenter at the International Ski History Congress held in Mammoth in 2009 (where the movement for an Olympic event in women's ski jumping got its first big push).

The Ski Library in Norco, California, a fabulous treasure trove that preserves the interwoven strands and connections in skiing's history. Museums devoted to snowsport history have a hard time surviving. Those that exist today owe their survival to a dedicated group of community activists or to one person. That unique person is Ingrid Wicken.

John Watson 50 Years of Dedicated Volunteerism to the Organizations That Support Our Sport of Skiing



Southern Council (now Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs) President John Watson "swearing in" the new FWSA Executive Director Snuffy Smith in 1969.

Innovative and brilliant. A founder of ski clubs. Creator of multiple programs and recognition awards on all levels of snowsport – club, council, Far West Ski Association, US Ski Association, US Recreational Ski Association, Far West Ski Foundation - spanning over five decades of dedicated volunteerism.

Since joining the Single Ski Club in 1966 until the present, John Watson's depth of volunteer efforts and the impact on the organizations which benefited from his leadership and expertise, is unparalled in snowsport history.

As President of Southern Council (now Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs), John set up a mirror image of FWSA programs at the council level in the late 1960's. He was a co-founder of the Mineral King Ski Club and the Single Ski Club of Orange County.

He launched the office of VP of Coun- his recent accomcils in 1970, a continuing viable, important office on the FWSA Board of Directors. He served as FWSA President from 1971-73 and was a Trustee

from 1971-76. He created many of the FWSA service awards that have recognized so many worthy volunteers for a half century.

In 1988 he served as FWSA VP of Public Affairs, planning and conducting the Eastern Sierra Site Survey. An engineer and geologist with Masters Degrees and a minor in History, John launched the History Committee in 2003 and instituted the Historic Ski Club Program in 2010.

On the national level, John was a Director of USSA and a VP of the USSA Sports Division. He founded the Councils Committee and Long Range Planning Committees, assisted Bill Berry with the National Ski Hall of Fame Committee (wrote the first Rules for Governance), and set up the Citizen Racing Committee and program.

He founded USSA Ski Week in 1969 and chaired the Ski Week for several years, setting up the initial menu of activities within ski week, including both the Alpine Council Challenge Cup and Nordic Challenge Cup. He became known as the "father of ski week" within USSA.

John Watson was a major player in

the Association's area development activity, including the failed attempt to keep the proposed Mineral King ski area from being included in the Sequoia National Park, which kept it from being developed as a ski area.

Most notable of plishments was his reanimation of the Far West Ski Foundation in 2009 and



John Watson's overarching contributions over his 50 years of service are in two areas:

•Elevating the status of every ski club or council to that of a mainstay in the broader community fabric - hence the effort toward recognition amongst ourselves and the outward projection provided by programs like the Historic Ski Club.

Fritz Buser Mt. Rose–Ski Tahoe Founder & Developer

Fritz Buser became an early investor in Mt. Rose after meeting some of the founders at the ski shows he attended annually for the previous twenty years promoting Henke boots. He became the company's majority shareholder in 1971 and has controlled the growth and direction of Mt. Rose ever since.

Fritz was born in the small Swiss farming village of Hemmiken in 1921.

Still in his teens, on the eve of World War II, he began his first business venture – trading sardines. In his early twenties – at the end of World War II – Fritz decided it was time to think bigger...America. He secured agreements with various prominent Swiss manufacturers to represent their products as a salesman in the United States, including the ski boot company 'Henke' – the first company that produced buckled (vs laced) boots. Eventually, he acquired principal ownership rights of the Henke boot company.

Mount Rose Ski Tahoe's history began in the 1930's. Long before any chairlifts were constructed or even an all weather road, Reno locals were skiing in the area.

Shortly after World War II, the Sky Tavern lodge was established. It continues to operate today in the same location southwest of Reno. It is now owned by the City of Reno and operated by Ski Tavern Junior Ski Program..

Devoted skiers from Sky Tavern hiked up to the 9,700-foot peak of adjacent Slide Mountain and skied in the location of the present Mt. Rose – Ski Tahoe. The original Reno Ski Bowl was constructed on the east slope of Slide Mountain (currently the East Bowl of Mt. Rose) and was at one point connected to the Sky Tavern via a lift that took skiers to the base of the Reno Ski Bowl.

The 60's saw substantial changes on the slopes of Slide Mountain. The Reno Ski Bowl evolved into the Slide Mountain Ski Area. In 1964, the north face of Slide Mountain became the Mt. Rose Ski Area. The Mt. Rose Development Company was formed to direct the future of the ski resort and in 1971 Fritz Buser became the owner.

For many years "Slide" and "Rose" operated independently of each other, both expanding in their own ways with more lifts and lodge improvements. The 1984-85 season saw the 20th anniversary of Mt. Rose – Ski Tahoe operations along with two new chairlifts.

The "Iron Curtain" between Slide and Rose finally came down in 1987 when Mt. Rose acquired the Slide Mountain Ski Area terrain under a lease agreement with the U.S. Forest Service. The "Slide Side" (as it is affectionately referred to by locals) became the East Bowl of Mt. Rose. The combination of the two ski areas increased the overall terrain of Mt. Rose to 900+ acres and established the resort as a significant player in the Lake Tahoe Basin.

As Mt. Rose-Ski Tahoe moved into the 90's, improvements continued to take place on the hill with new lifts added that vastly increased uphill capacity and aided in boosting the overall image

of the resort.

The 1994-95 season shined as the 30th anniversary for Mt. Rose and this landmark year produced some of the most significant facility improvements in the resorts history; a 2.5 million dollar remodel of the main lodge which included a BBQ deck and a 300 percent expansion of the indoor dining area.

Top-to-bottom snow-making was also introduced to the resort in the late 90's giving the mountain the insurance policy it needed to have consistent early season openings.

Mt. Rose screamed into the 21st century with its first high speed lifts, giving Mt. Rose dual high speed, base-tosummit rides to the top.

In the separation between the east and north slopes of Slide Mountain lives the extreme terrain known as The Chutes. There was a time when skiers were allowed in the Chutes area at their own risk. The mid 1960's saw the closure of this area until its official opening in 2004. After 10 years of groundwork, Mt. Rose officially adopted these 200 acres into its trail system including the addition of the Chuter lift providing an exit back to the Slide lodge.

In 2009, the old Slide Lodge, which had evolved from the Reno Ski Bowl days as a simple warming hut through six additions, was demolished and replaced with the Winters Creek Lodge. It features a steel and glass design to bring facets of the mountain into the architecture of the facility.

Fritz's son Kurt has been executive of the company for the past 20 years, overseeing the more recent development. The resort was offered for sale two years ago, but after testing the open market and receiving no offers, Fritz, now living in Switzerland, transferred control to his children and grandchildren.

The Far West Ski Foundation accomplished another successful year owing to the support of industry partners, club and council partners, scholarship sponsors and individual supporters like YOU. Athletic Scholarship Committee His

Highlights of the Foundation's efforts are reflected in grants made using funds contributed by these dedicated snowsport team members.

Our successful joint Association/ Foundation program to support young ski racers in their respective ski schools continues across the western states. We made scholarship grants ranging from \$500 to \$1500 to 19 athletes, for a total of \$16500.

This program is made successful by

the continuing support from partners Whitefish Mountain, Grouse Mountain Lodge, KARBON, and Far West Racing Association, with material support from U S Ski Team.

Councils and clubs that are committed to annual support include NWSC Council, Skynet Ski Club (Erin Nicole Memorial), Sierra League (Frank App Memorial), San Diego and Los Angeles Councils, Castro Valley SC and Mountain High Snowsports Club.

The Foundation is further indebted for the support provided by the Sprock and Pavich families (Verne Sprock Memorial), George Kish, and numerous other individual contributors.

Women's Ski Jumping received a direct \$750 grant this year and WSJUSA was able to generate much more through their appearance at the 2017 convention. WSJUSA is a creation of the imagination of Dedee Corradini and sustained by the perseverance of Laura Sankey and Coach Alan Alborn. Our support over the years was a tiny portion of the total effort to field teams at the Sochi and PeongChang Winter

Olympics. As a result, the USA now has the 19th, 29th and 31st ranking women jumpers in the world! Congratulations Sarah Hendrickson, Abby Ringquist and Nita Englund! And thank you Sheri Parshall for your individual contribution toward women's ski jumping!

The Foundation has four main missions in its charter. One of these mission goals is enabling the disabled and the objective for adaptive skiing and snowboarding. Our support is directed to disabled ski schools, always one of which specializes in the rehabilitation of those wounded in military service. But our objective makes no discrimination as to age or nature of disability.

Funds for these grants are generated in part by a team led by Gloria Raminha and supported on a continuing basis by a Friend of the Foundation - Joe Harvis. They conduct the annual auction of wines personally contributed by them. In 2017, grants of \$500 were made to Alyeska Challenge and the Vail Veterans Program. Thank you Joe and Gloria and all the wine purchasers.

Athletic Scholarship Program

The Far West Athletic Scholarship Program, now in its 14th year as a means of making a positive contribution to junior racing, has continued to garner more support each year. Since 2004, the FWSA has awarded 123 scholarships for a total of well over 100,000. In 2017, FWSA awarded 19 scholarships totaling \$16,500. We express our thanks to our sponsors, Whitefish

Mountain Resort, Schure Sports, maker of the Karbon line of snowsports clothing, and Far West Racing Association.

We would also like to thank our partners, Skiyenti Ski Club, Mountain High Snowsports Club, Castro Valley Ski Club, Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs, San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, Northwest Ski Club Council and Sierra League and Council.

Finally, a special thanks to all the Far West members who have so generously contributed to the program.

United States Ski Association licensed cost \$5 each or five for \$20. junior racers in the U21, U19, and second year UI6 classes in states represented by FWSA affiliated councils are eligible for a scholarship. This year, junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming are eligible.

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need, competitive accomplishments, academics, and community service. National ranking in competitive skiing can cost well in excess of \$10,000 per season; a financial

challenge for even upper middle class families. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will continue to increase.

Convention attendees have the opportunity to support the Athletic Scholarship Program by participating in the auction of a ski and stay package donated by Whitefish Mountain Resort and Averill Hospitality, the silent auction featuring apparel by the U.S. Ski Team and finally, our raffle featuring an assortment of great prizes. Raffle tickets

All funds for the scholarship program are deposited with The Far West Ski Foundation, an IRS 501 (c)3 charitable foundation, that was incorporated as a partner of FWSA to provide a means of accepting contributions. The foundation qualifies contributions to the scholarship program as income tax charitable deductions.

SATURDAY, JUNE 10, 2017

The 85th Annual Meeting and Convention of the Far West Ski Association was held at Grove Hotel and Boise Centre, Boise, Idaho.

GENERAL SESSION

President Steve Coxen called the meeting to order on Saturday, June 10, 2016 at 8:00 am and welcomed everyone to the 85th Annual Convention. Welcomed Stephen Remillard of Mammoth Mountain for a brief presentation

Steve introduced the current 2016-2017 Officers, Trustees, Committee Chairs, Council Presidents, and FWSA Appointed Representatives and thanked them for their service.

Randy noted that FWSA has 3 CDs which total \$175,085. Randy explained that, due to large amounts of expenditures for convention and travel, the association requires a large amount of operation funds, especially as the Association is placing deposits for trips and travel taking place in 2019. Randy discussed income/expense, and pointed out we are working on a \$2,000 loss, against a budgeted loss of \$20,000. The travel programs did better than expected, and the functional programs did not expend as much of their budget as projected.



Committee Report Awards Program by Catherine Ohl, Chair

In a volunteer organization such as Far West Ski Association nothing happens without individuals contributing their time and talent to produce programs. These dedicated people could never be compensated for the contribution they make to the association. For volunteer organizations, recognition is the most valuable thank-you that can be offered. In many ways the maturity and stature of an organization can be measured by the value that individuals place on the recognition program. Far West has one of the broadest programs of any regional ski association in the country and there are many opportunities for aspiring individuals, dubs and councils to gain recognition.

The modern day Awards Program was initiated in 1966 and has witnessed a series of expansions and changes over the years. For 2007, optional electronic submissions and voting has been added to the Far West Service awards. The Charity and Community Service Recognition Award for Clubs and Councils was added in 2007. Historical recognition for clubs and councils was added in 2008. In 2008, under the direction of John Watson, the Snowsports Builder Award was initiated. The Environment Award was added in 2015.

There have been a number of changes to the Club and Council Recognition Awards since 2015. The intention is to bring awareness to our programs and make the awards easier to apply for. This year all application forms were again standardized and fillable electronically. The Communications Awards continue to be done through online or email submittals and were modified again in 2018.

1. Far West Service Awards

The Far West Service awards, sometimes referred to as "The Great Eight" are administered by Catherine Ohl, Awards Chair, with a committee consisting of Jane Wyckoff, Trustee, and Steve Coxen, FWSA President. Use of the Internet continues to be the popular and a most efficient means of submitting nominations and voting. Voting was permitted using the Internet, email or by the traditional snail mail. These awards are given to individuals or a team within the Far West Ski Association or Ski Industry. All accepted citations are archived at the Western SkiSport Museum in Boreal, California as a living history of volunteerism in the Far West Region. In addition to commemorative plaques and medallions, a permanent display of past recipients is showcased at the Museum. The Museum is administered by the Auburn Ski Club (<u>http://www.auburnskiclub.org/</u>), one of the founding ski clubs of the Far West Ski Association.

The Wentworth Award is administered by Paul Vlasveld and Cindy Krupp, under Jo Simpson, FWSA VP Councils. Each club and council is asked to submit one newsletter for judging.

Award for Outstanding Club and Council Web Sites

The Award for Outstanding Web Site is administered by Paul Vlasveld and Cindy Krupp, under Jo Simpson, FWSA VP Councils. Each club and council is asked to submit their web site URL for judging. Entries in the Publication Awards will have their web site automatically entered.

Classes for the Tollakson, Wentworth and Outstanding Web Site are based on a club's performance over the past four years that can vary slightly from year to year. A club may fall into a different class in each of the three categories.

5. Recognition Awards

Councils' Man & Woman of the Year

The Councils' Man and Woman of the Year Competition is administered by Sheri Parshall, under Jo Simpson, FWSA VP Councils. Each council is requested to submit a man and/or woman candidate who best represents their council. In addition, each council is required to submit one judge to help with the judging.

This award is presented to both an outstanding man and woman at the grassroots level. Selection criteria is based on each individual's involvement in snowsports; club, council, regional and national activities; and knowledge and enthusiasm for the snowsports. Candidates should have awareness of Far West programs and, in particular, its public affairs involvement. Emphasis has been shifted to Club participation over the past five years.

The Councils' Man and Woman of the Year is sponsored by Big White Ski Resort, BC, Canada since 2001.

Safety Person of the Year Award

This award is administered by Richard Lubin, Safety Chair, under the leadership of Paula Hazzard, VP Public Affairs. This award honors the person within FWSA who does the most to promote safe snowsports and safety programs at the club and/or council level. Individuals are judged through the utilization of organized events, educational forums, print and electronic media, on mountain activities and partnering with other, safety focused community and industry organizations.

The Safety Award has been sponsored by Telluride Ski Resort since 2015.

Western Ski Heritage Prize

This award is administered by John Watson, History Chair, under the leadership of Paula Hazzard, VP Public Affairs, and recognizes an outstanding effort in the area of ski history by historians in the identification of resource material, preparation of historical publications and/or recording or documenting of significant historical events. This award also recognizes interest in Far West's history through collection, preservation and protection of appropriate articles and material. This award acknowledges the utilization of all types of media and is not limited to FWSA members. This award has been sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corp. since its inception in 2000.

Environment Award

This award is administered by Paula Hazzard, VP Public Affairs, and is designed to encourage good stewardship of our environment. We want to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment. This award should recognize a special action that the applicant took, or something he or she put in place that made a difference. This award has been sponsored by Aspen Skiing Company, The Gant and Crestwood Condominiums since its inception in 2015.

Club and Council History Recognition Program

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the club with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week.

Lake Louise Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the council with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week. The trophy, donated by the Canadian Tourism Office in 1997, is on permanent display at the Western SkiSport Museum (<u>http://auburnskiclub.com/ski-museum/</u>) in Boreal, California.

Council Challenge

The first Council Challenge was held in Mt. Bachelor when the Bay Area Council challenged the Northwest Council (then known as Portland Area Ski Club Council) to a duel race. Teams consisted of the best 6 racers from each council. In Steamboat the Challenge was opened up to all councils. In a surprise move, Arizona beat out Northwest, Bay Area and Los Angeles. Today teams consist of 8 racers from each council and must be a mix of men and women. And if you can't beat them on the course, your team can compete for the best costume.

Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Responsibilities for the Industry Marketing Program include: producing the Silent Auction and Travel Expo, sponsorship development, serving on the Convention Committee, and promoting advertising sales for the Far West Skier's Guide. Debbi Kor, FWSA Vice President of Marketing, is responsible for the membership benefits program and product sponsorship development. Silent Auction

In 2018, we are celebrating the 86th Annual Convention, and the 33rd Silent Auction. FWSA highly values the working relationship our Association has developed with the ski and sports industries. The Silent Auction began back in 1986 at the Irvine Hilton and Towers, when the Balboa Ski Club of Orange Council of Ski Clubs, host for the 54th Annual Convention, organized the event as a fundraiser to be held in conjunction with the Convention. In 1990 the Travel Carousel was added to the industry Convention programs at the 58th Annual Convention, hosted by the Orange Council of Ski Clubs, when the Association returned to the Irvine Hilton. The format remained the same until the 2003 Convention held at the Rancho Las Palmas Marriott in Rancho Mirage, California, hosted by the San Diego Council of Ski Clubs. The Travel Carousel became the Travel Expo, and Passports replaced the Lift Tickets. Convention delegates now schedule appointments with industry representatives, meeting one-on-one in a timed sequence. Each year we look forward to seeing our industry friends at our Annual Convention, some of whom have attended for thirty years, and others who are brand new to our program.

The Silent Auction is the Association's major fund-raising effort and not only provides financial support for our programs, but also subsidizes delegate fees to the Convention. The Silent Auction and Travel Expo would not be possible without the assistance of many special people – many thanks go to this year's Hosts, Bay Area Snowsports Council and Sierra League & Council, as well as the many volunteers who do all the behind-the-scenes work and setup. The "Convention Team", tasked with production of the Silent Auction and Travel Expo includes Debbi Kor, Convention Chair and V.P. of Marketing and Sponsorship, Jeannine Davis, Silent Auction Chair, Michael Bouton, Travel Expo Coordinator, Randy Lew, Treasurer, and Jean McCasey, Convention Registrar. The team puts in countless hours to bring you an outstanding event for both club members and the industry. Our gratitude is extended to all the workers from the BAC and Sierra Councils, as well as the FWSA Board Members, friends and volunteers from other councils who assist with last minute preparations prior to the Silent Auction and Travel Expo.

CAN DO MS helps people with multiple sclerosis gain health and hope. One in 750 people has multiple sclerosis, a devastating, neurological disease in which a person's immune system attacks the brain and spinal cord. There is no known cause or cure for MS. The Can Do Multiple Sclerosis Center is dedicated to improving the lives of people and families living with MS through its interactive, educational programs unique to any in the world. All of the Center's programs are based on the philosophy that you can have a chronic condition AND have your health. By drawing on a wide range of medical professionals and focusing on all aspects of health - exercise, nutrition, social support and disease management - The Center helps people with MS learn how to live healthier, happier, more active lives. The Center's motto is "Be More Than Your MS". To honor their founder's positive spirit and legacy, Can Do MS has declared Jimmie Heuga's birthday, September 22nd, as CAN DO DAY. A wonderful way to help raise funds for the Can Do Multiple Sclerosis Center is participation with the Vertical Express for CAN DO MS. DISABLED SPORTS USA (DS/USA), with the motto "If I Can Do This, I Can Do Anything", was founded in 1967 by disabled Vietnam veterans to provide opportunities for individuals with disabilities to gain self-confidence, greater independence, dignity, and mobility through sports, recreation and educational programs. The organization is the nation's largest multi-sport, multi-disability organization serving more than 60,000 people nationwide. **Warfighter Sports**, formerly known as the **Wounded Warrior Disabled Sports Project**, is a part of DS/USA and offers 50 different sports rehabilitation programs in military hospitals and communities across the US through a nationwide network of over 100 community-based chapters. Programs take place at sites throughout the US, offering returning Warfighters the opportunity to integrate as participants and mentors in their home communities. **1,500 wounded veterans were served through this program just this past year**. Many Warfighters have returned home to our FWSA communities, and several of our councils and clubs have been including them in their chapter activities. FWSA clubs and councils have a long term relationship with several California Chapters of Disabled Sports USA: Achieve Tahoe - the Adaptive Ski School at Alpine Meadows, USARC - the US Adaptive Recreation Center at Big Bear, The Achievers - DSUSA Orange County, The Unrecables - the Los Angeles Chapters, and DSES - Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra at Mammoth Lakes. SPECIAL OLYMPICS relies on dedicated volunteers to provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for people with mental retardation. With 220 offices world-wide, the Special Olympics global community includes athletes, volunteers, coaches, family members and sponsors/ supporters. Research shows that there is an overwhelming consensus among Special Olympics athletes, coaches and family members that there is significant improvement in athletes' sense of self, social skills, and social interactions due to their participation in Special Olympics. Parents see health benefits that are critical, given the unmet health needs of people with intellectual disabilities. One individual shall be appointed by the club or council to be their contact person to promote and market the trip. The club or council's president shall sign an agreement and designate their contact person. That person will collect and review the registration documents, send to VP of Travel along with the initial deposit. This person will continue working with the FWSA Travel Leader as needed. This program will be available for the FWSA Int'l Ski Week trips and other selected trip opportunities. Nancy Ellis, VP of North American Travel and I along with our Travel Improvement Committee continued to work on goals and objectives and the implementation of such goals.

Goal #1: To increase "First Timers" trip participation by 10% annually (all FWSA trips combined)

Goal #2: To standardize the Implementation of the Travel Programs

Goal #3: To create a VP Travel Succession plan and a mentorship program

I attended Mountain Travel Symposium (MTS) in South Lake Tahoe April 11-15, 2018. This symposium provided me an opportunity to meet with various International Ski Resorts, Tour Operators, Office of Tourism and Industry Representatives to learn about their respective areas to see if these will be future destinations for FWSA. In addition, it is always beneficial to network with fellow travel leaders from across the US.

FWSA 2018 Int'l Ski Week to Les Trois Vallees/Brides les Bains, France

FWSA members appreciated skiing the "Largest Skiable Terrain" in the world! We stayed in Brides les Bains March 4-11, 2018 while skiing Les Trois Vallees. This trip was so successful that we oversold our primary hotel and were fortunate to acquire a second lodging property to accommodate the additional participants. Unlike the normal European lodging and meal package, were able to make special arrangements for all 113 of our members to have dinner together at the Grand Mercure Hotel des Thermes. Our diverse group came from 8 US states and 2 from Europe, flying from 8 different airports. We had 38% of the participants as a first timer on a FWSA int'l trip. Although large, the groups for both Ski Week and the Extension trip were orderly, respectful, timely, cohesive and very fun.

Brides-les-Bains is a charming quaint village where many took walks, browsed in shops, went snowshoeing or simply enjoyed the beauty of the location. The hotels were centrally located which provided an easy walk to the ski lockers, equipment rentals and a gondola to Meribel where you could ski anywhere from there. We had excellent snow conditions, lots of skiable terrain with many groomed runs and plenty of off-piste slopes for those avid skiers who hiked up hill for the exceptional ski runs. Several skiers enjoyed the daily live entertainment on the hill at the Folie Douce, including musicians, dancers, actors and a joyful party scene.

Midweek we offered an optional day tour to Annecy. It is the largest city of Haute-Savoie department in the Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes region in southeastern France. It lies on the northern tip of Lake Annecy, 35 kilometers (22 mi) south of Geneva. Annecy sits on along a beautiful lake in which the water is very clean and flows to the Rhone river. Olympians take on politics as they fear climate change is hurting their sport. Five Winter Olympians have traded in the slopes for briefing rooms to urge Congress to take action on climate change. As global temperatures continue to rise, snow-boarder Arielle Gold, along with skiers David Wise, Jessie Diggins, Stacey Cook and biathlete Maddie Phaneuf, traveled to Capitol Hill this week to brief lawmakers on how climate change is a growing threat to winter sports and outdoor recreation. <u>CNN</u> via Protect Our Winters

NSAA Names 2018 Sustainable Slopes Grant Winners. The National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) selected four member ski areas to receive its annual Sustainable Slopes Grants: Blue Mountain Resort, Pa., Mountain High Resort, Calif., POWDR Resorts, and Snow Creek Ski Area, Mo. The Sustainable Slopes grant program provides cash and in-kind funding to support sustainability projects at NSAA member ski areas. <u>Ski Area Management</u>

NSAA urges support for federal ski fee retention bill. The National Ski Areas Association is encouraging resorts on public land to help line up co-sponsors for the Ski Area Fee Retention Act of 2018, which was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate earlier this month. According to the NSAA, the bill would earmark a major portion of U.S. Forest Service permit fees, roughly \$22 million to \$24 million of the roughly \$37 million resorts on public lands pay in permit fees, for improving ski area permit administration, processing of ski area proposals, and addressing any backlogs in permit administration or processing. The fees can also be used for interpretation, visitor services and support of USFS Avalanche Information/Education. SAM

Smaller, independent ski areas join forces in the shadow of Epic-v-Ikon season pass battle. Independent ski resorts are laboring in the shadow of dueling giants to find their niche in an industry swiftly dividing into two distinct camps. High-profile independent resorts such as Jackson Hole, Crested Butte, Telluride, Alta and Snowbird have aligned with the brawling behemoths behind the Epic and Ikon season passes, which, at \$899 each, offer access to more than 50 of North America's 600-plus ski areas and host about a quarter of the continent's skier visits. More. The Denver Post via Inntopia/Destimetrics

Alterra Mountain Co. has \$555 million in ski-area improvements on the books, starting with a gondola at Winter Park and a bigger base restaurant at Steamboat. Alterra Mountain Co. plans to spend more than half a billion dollars on its 12 ski resorts in its first five years as a resort operator, including \$130 million in a spending spree this year that includes a new gondola for Winter Park and a restaurant expansion at Steamboat. Tahoe ski resort develops plan to adapt to low-snow seasons. Heavenly Mountain Resort's plan calls for widening a dozen trails and removing potentially hundreds or even thousands of trees. The hope is to reduce skier and snowboard traffic bottlenecks on busy days. Low-snow seasons are expected to become more common due to climate change. More. WTOP Radio, Washington, DC

High Fives Foundation brings 22 Veterans to Squaw Alpine for Military to the Mountain program. The High Fives Foundation in Truckee, Calif., the City of Reno Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department in Reno, Nev., and the Adaptive Training Foundation in Dallas, Texas are teamed up to host a program called Military to the Mountain. 22 injured US Military Veterans will train at their respective facilities for nine weeks to prepare them for a week of skiing at Squaw Valley Alpine Meadows in Lake Tahoe, Calif. from March 11 to March 17, 2018. The Veterans were instructed by Achieve Tahoe adaptive ski program. <u>More.</u> Ski Industries Association *(The High Fives Foundation was the 2016 Warren Miller Modern Media Award for their BASICS 5 Video.)*

NSAA Urges DOJ, Senate Guidance on ADA Lawsuit Abuse. More than 60 ski areas and resort companies have now been sued for allegations over inaccessible websites for the visually and hearing impaired under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), according to the most recent NSAA Capitol Watch. To combat this trend, NSAA representatives went to Washington D.C. to meet with key lawmakers and Justice Department officials who can help move regulation and guidance along. More. SAM

Skier Signed Liability Waiver, Court Rules She Can't Sue for Broken Leg. A woman taking a ski lesson at Keystone, Colo. resort breaks her leg as she tries to exit chairlift. Must the resort operator pay damages? Indeed not, says the Tenth Circuit. She signed a waiver waiving liability for lift-unloading accidents, and there's no sound reason to waive that waiver or to waive the other waiver that was printed on the back of her lift ticket. <u>More.</u>

NSAA 2017-18 Safety Award Winners. The National Ski Areas Association recognized six ski areas and one state association with Safety Awards for exceptional initiatives to educate guests and employees about skiing and snowboarding responsibly.

Of the seven categories, California had finalists in six of them, winning three: Mammoth Mountain as "Best Overall Safety Program" for resorts with 500,000 or more visits, Squaw Valley Alpine Meadows for "Best Employee Safety Program," and the California Ski Industry Association was recognized with the "Safety Impact Award." Squaw Alpine and Mammoth were finalists in two categories. Telluride, Colo., was also a finalist in two categories, but didn't take home the top spot in either this year.

Skier visits at U.S. resorts dip about 3 percent this season. Skier visits at U.S. resorts were down an estimated 1.5 million or 2.8 percent this season compared with the prior winter, the National Ski Areas Association announced Friday. A preliminary study showed ski areas tallied 53.3 million visits this year compared with 54.8 million visits in 2016-17. While the overall number was in line with the 40-year average, this season produced the lowest amount of skier visits in seven seasons, according to NSAA's data. In addition, it was the third-worst season in 18 winters. <u>More. Aspen Times</u>

Boreal, Bear Valley, (CA) and Crystal Mountain (WA) Win Golden Eagle Awards. Bear Valley Mountain, Calif.; Crystal Mountain, Mich.; and Boreal Mountain, Calif., won the 2018 Golden Eagle Awards for excellence in environmental initiatives. Sha Miklas of Arapahoe Basin, Colo., was named the "Hero of Sustainability" honoree for 2018. This year marks the 25th anniversary of the Golden Eagle Awards, which are overseen in a partnership between SKI magazine and NSAA. <u>More.</u> SAM

Director Report Racing by Bob Ellis, Vice President

This year started out very slow with very little snow, then, finally in March, we ended up with record snowfall. In spite of that, most of the races scheduled by most of the leagues were completed.

We had excellent snow and conditions at FWSA Ski Week at Banff, the races at Lake Louise went off smoothly with a very nice GS course for two days, the Council Challenge Race was cancelled due to too much snow, and everybody had a great time skiing the knee deep powder all over the mountain. This year the Phoenix Ski Club won the Joe Ross Award for most points in the races, with Cabernet Race in 2nd place, and Scottsdale in 3rd Place. Sierra Council won the Lake Louise All Councils Award for most points, Arizona was 2nd Place, and Los Angeles Council was 3rd place.

The Far West Championships were held in May at Mammoth Mountain, where we had two days of rain and high winds, but on Sunday the clouds left and the sun came out for some great racing conditions on Andy's Double Gold where we ran two GS races in the morning and the two Slalom races in the afternoon.

Those that hung around for the races were pleasantly surprised by the great conditions and the nice race courses. San Diego Alpine League won the Overall Points Award, Open League was 2nd, and ULLR was 3rd Place for adults. In the Junior Division, Open League won both the Overall Points Award and the Points Per Racer Award. The Roma McCoy Award for most points per racer for adults was won by ULLR League, with Open League in 2nd Place, and San Diego League in 3rd Place.

Committee Report Succession Planning by Todd Hood, Committee Chair

Welcome to the 86th Annual Far West Ski Association (FWSA) Convention!

The Succession Planning Committee is excited to have the opportunity to contribute to the FWSA's future by establishing succession planning initiatives. We will implement best practices for the FWSA, and will offer those best practices to our member councils and clubs. Strategic succession planning ensures your organization has a pipeline of talent for vision, viability, and vitality. Broadly defined, succession planning is a process that allows [organizations] to identify and develop internal candidates with a clear objective to fill senior-level positions as and when they become available. In other words, if well executed, succession planning becomes part of a risk management strategy, which aims to minimize [an organization's] exposure to skills shortage - especially in times of crisis, such as the sudden departure of a top [leader]. Minimizing the potential risk of personnel loss through carefully planned and executed succession planning models is crucial to an organization's continued success.

There are several ways to approach the creation of succession planning models, but regardless of choice, most plans would include the five essential steps outlined below:

- Identifying future service needs
- Identifying key positions and competencies of internal leaders
- Identifying and selecting internal candidates who have demonstrated high potential
- Selecting and implementing training and development activities for these individuals

Who should be responsible for leading your organization's Succession Planning activities? You should consider having someone that:

- Is an officer or active leader of the organization
- Knows the status and needs of the organization
- Understands the organizations goals, needs, resources, and challenges
- Has access to work with members of the organization
- Loves putting puzzles together

It is recommended that a vice president of your organization be assigned with the duty to execute succession planning. The vice president would tend to be best suited to have insight on the future needs and members of the organization, as well as time resources to assess member readiness for leadership roles in the organization. The chair of succession planning should know they are in the role and understand the role they need to play, the importance that they perform well, and what they need to do...keep the leadership matrix filled with names and updated based on current knowledge. New leaders should work to fill leadership matrix within 6 months of taking office, regardless of the length of the term in office. This gives the leader a chance to begin working with potential succession candidates for their role.

In an effort to create a foundation, the FWSA Succession Planning Committee established a Leadership Matrix that aligns the names of organization leaders and potential leaders with leadership roles in the organization. The Succession Planning Committee reviewed job descriptions for key leadership roles in the organization, and then assessed the readiness of all leaders for each of the roles. All leaders were rated for each Leadership Role as either 1) Ready Now, 2) Ready in 12 Months, 3) Ready in 24+ Months, or 4) Previously Held. Since interest can be conditional and changes, Leadership Matrix assessments were made solely on skills and experience, without consideration of interest. Open leadership roles were prioritized over those that have current leaders in place. Currently filled roles will begin to be assessed after this year's Convention to prepare for next year's elections.

If you would like to begin a Succession Planning Initiative, you will need 1) job descriptions for your leadership positions, 2) any recommended changes to skills and experiences (listed as required or desired), and 3) a slate of names members. The Succession Planning Committee is excited to announce that this year's Snowsports Leadership Academy will include Knock Knock...Who's There To Take Over - A Workshop session on Successful Succession Planning. The workshop will include practical activities that council and club leaders can employ to initiate their own succession planning programs. 


