

We Sailed in to San Diego

The 88th Annual Far West Ski Association Convention was a real success! Hosted by San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, at the beautiful San Diego Marriott Mission Valley, October 7-10, we were able to hold three of our activities onsite, on the west lawn of the hotel. With a lovely pool-side space, terraces with lots of chairs, sofas, and outdoor fireplaces, the Marriott provided many ways for guests to sit and relax, socialize, and enjoy being outside.

Many delegates arrived on Tuesday and Wednesday, to take part in the activities happening Wednesday evening and on Thursday, which included a walking tour of Coronado Island on Wednesday, and several activities on Thursday, including a bike ride on Coronado, as well as, a Harbor Cruise and lunch. Jean McCasey and Todd Hood led the group via trolley and ferry to Coronado on Wednesday evening, where we all gathered at the pier, and then disbursed in smaller groups to shop and dine in the many restaurants on the island. Thursday's activities were led by Debbie Schroeder (bike ride,) and Gunter Schrecker, who led the Harbor Cruise on San Diego Harbor.

The Pub Crawl, sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corp., and led by Leah Clark, was held on the West Lawn of the Marriott, and carried an Oktoberfest theme. The other activity was a ride on San Diego's Old Towne Trolley, driven by former San Diego Council member, Susie Vetter. Susie gave the guests a wonderful excursion through the Pacific Beach area, and up to the Mt. Sole-

dad Memorial for a quick stop. Following that, they went into La Jolla for lunch, then back to the hotel. Following these optional activities, the entire group met up at the Marriott's Pool for the annual Pool Party. Thank you to Mary Alexander, from Central Council, who, along with Dom Gagliardi (Jackson Hole Mountain Resort,) sponsor, put on this little party.

The Silent Auction and Trade Show, on Friday night, led by Teri Allard, Silent Auction Coordinator, was the time for delegates and visitors to visit with our Industry Partners, checking out the various ski areas, travel companies, lodging partners and tour operators to plan trips for the coming year. We had three special guests: Chris Anthony, our Keynote Speaker and producer of the movie, "Mission Mt. Mangart", along with Bruce Campbell and Howard Koch. Bruce and Howard, representatives of the 10th Mountain Division, were featured in the story. Bruce narrated a large part of the movie.

The Travel Expo, led by Mary Jo Lau, was held on Saturday morning, which gave delegates the opportunity to meet up with their selected resort and travel representatives to plan a winter trip for the coming season or a future trip for their club or council.

There were two terrific Snowsport Leadership Academy sessions to choose from this year: "Strategic Travel Planning... News, Insights and Updates", led by Debbie Stew-

art, Nancy Ellis and Tucker Hoffman; and "Race to the Finish ...JEDI On and Off the Slopes", led by Todd Hood.

An afternoon Public Affairs session was offered. The topic for that session was based on events of World War II. and featured Bruce Campbell and Howard Koch, veterans of the 10th Mountain Division, along with Chris Anthony, and two other World War II Veterans: Tom Rice and Gil Nadeau. They provided almost 2 hours looking into some of the happenings of WWII, and the taking of Riva Ridge. Tom Rice talked about parachuting into Normandy as a member of 101st Airborne Division, and again tandem-parachuting into Normandy on the 75th Anniversary of the D-Day invasion. He also parachuted (tandem) onto Coronado Island on his 100th birthday, on August 15 of this

year. Gil Nadeau talked about his experience trying to enlist in the Navy being only 4'11", a full 3 inches shorter than the minimum height. After basic training he was assigned to be a signalman on a Landing Craft Support (LCS) ship, a specialized gunship sent in to soften up the shoreline by shelling the enemy prior to the invasion of the Pacific Islands by the Marines. Steve Coxen was the moderator.

Saturday evening's banquet, "Paradise Found" offered an island theme, as shown by the attire of much of our crowd. The wonderful dance band, The Distractions, provided some great music to dance to for much of the evening. The highlights of the evening were the awards presented to a number of outstanding men and women throughout the Far West Ski Association, and our Industry Partners. Sunday morning was the time set for the General Session of our annual meeting and to elect new officers within the organization. Communication awards were presented to clubs and councils for their participation in the Outstanding Newsletters and Websites, along with the Charities and Our Communities Award. Thank you to the San Diego Council of Ski Clubs for hosting this annual event. Your time and efforts were deeply appreciated. To all the other clubs who volunteered their time.... thank you as well.

San Diego Council of Ski Clubs


Eileen Weiner and John Walsh


Ski Butlers, and Rent. Skis. If you are going to be traveling for your skiing this year, check out the Far West Benefits Page. We have many lodging part-

2022 NORTH AMERICAN SKI WEEK--ASPEN/ SNOWMASS RESORT

Our trip to Snowmass is sold out! We have 320 people going on the trip January 29—February 5, 2022 and they are from the following councils—Arizona, Bay Area Snow Sports, Central, Intermountain, Los Angeles, Northwest, Orange, San Diego, Sierra, and FWSA Direct Members.

Aspen Skiing Company (ASC) is enacting vaccination requirements for guests in certain venues and for certain activities. Guest vaccinations will be required for all ASC owned and operated hotels, full-service restaurantsevents, as well, Powder Tours, and additional experiences where prolonged close contact while unmasked might occur. Proof of vaccination is not required for lift access, ski and snowboard school lessons, market-style restaurants, rental shops, or ticket offices.

Pitkin County has additional requirements that they have implemented related to COVID. They require that people wear masks whenever indoors except when seated for dining and eating.

Our group is staying at properties that are not owned by ASC and are not affected by the vaccination requirements except for four guests staying at The Limelight Hotel. Our parties will be at The Collective in the lower base village. The Collective is a community-based area owned by the city of Snowmass and leased to East West Partners to manage. As FWSA's new VP Public Affairs, I had the opportunity to listen to four amazing WWII veterans that we had the honor of having on our Public Affairs Panel with Award - winning Documentary Producer Chris Anthony, on Saturday October 9, 2021, at the FWSA Convention held at the Marriott Mission Valley in San Diego, California.

Our distinguished guests were Bruce Campbell and Howard Koch, who were both in the 10th Mountain Division that battled the German Mountain Troops in Northern Italy. These men were trained in

skiing, rock climbing and working with mules and about whom Chris Anthony produced and wrote the movie "Mission Mt. Mangart", which details the area where Bruce and Howard fought in the Italian Alps.

Additional guests included Tom Rice, who was a paratrooper in WWII for the 101st Airborne Division. He fought several battles including parachuting into heavily fortified coast

of France's Normandy region on D-Day, June 6, 1944. He also is a Coronado local who recently tandem jumped from a C-53 Air Force Wing called "D-Day Doll" on his 100^{th} birthday, landing onto the sand in front of the Hotel Del Coronado in August 2021. He plans to jump in Normandy next year for his 101^{st} birthday in honor of the 101^{st} Airborne Division he served with.

Gil Nadeau, served in the Navy in the Pacific during WWII. He was a visual signalman aboard a Landing Craft Support.

These ships were small, but they were part

of the "Mighty Midgets". He spoke about these incredible ships he was on and that he was known to many as the "shortest sailor with the tallest tales".

These men were so impressive with their stories, and their memories of certain incidents that happened while they were serving the USA military as young soldiers in WWII, that we could listen to them for many hours. I hope that you enjoyed them as much as I did.

David Krupp Athletic Scholarship Chair

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is entering its 18th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$12,150 and 18 recipients in the 2020-2021 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is now \$165,000 to 116 recipients.

The program is designed to provide financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where FWSA has a presence. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with the United States Ski and Snowboard Association (USSA) and must participate in racing programs in states where FWSA has regional councils. These include California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, athletic performance, academic achievement, and community service.

Skiing is an expensive sport and the costs

involved in ski racing cannot be left up to the parents alone to incur. For younger athletes the costs are modest. However, for 16 through 20-year-olds, where competition becomes national and even international, the costs can be significant. Without the help of outside resources, many junior racers simply cannot compete. For a top competitor, expenses can reach \$20,000 per year. This is not a seasonal sport for these racers; it includes a full year of ski-related involvement. After the winter race competition has concluded, competitors engage in dryland training, then off to summer camps. Camps typically run about \$1,200 per week, not including transportation.

Winter training costs range from \$1,000-\$1,500 each season. Most applicants work part time to offset expenses. The demand on their time is significant. They must balance their time between training, competi-

tion, school, work, and community service. Despite these demands, the average GPA for these recipients consistently exceeds a 3.9 average. Our scholarships are modest compared to the need, but they do make a difference in the overall scope of the resources they require.

The funding of the scholarships comes from a number of sources: raffles, auctions, club and council partnerships, and direct contributions of club members, clubs, and councils. The FWSA has greatly benefitted from the generous support from its sponsors, including Whitefish Mountain Resort (www.skiwhitefish.com,) a year-round winter and summer resort; Averill Hospitality, a premier choice in mountain resort accommodations; Grouse Mountain Lodge in Whitefish, Montana; Schure Sports, Inc. (www.karbonmail.com,) maker of the Karbon line of snowsports apparel; the US Ski Team, and the Far West Racing Association. Their contributions of vacation packages, snowsports apparel, and cash bring in approximately \$10,000 per year as raffle and auction proceeds, as well as, direct cash donations.

In addition, our partnership program through clubs and councils affords us approximately one-third of our scholarship funding each year. Finally, the *Far West Ski Foundation*

(www.farwestskifoundation.org,) a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization, is a valuable resource for encouraging tax-exempt donations. For more information on the Far West Athletic Scholarship Program, please visit www.fwsa.org.

We all want our ski resorts to do their part Consider your ski clothing and other gear. for our environment, and they are doing a lot! From reducing the use of disposable products in the lodges, to using wind energy to help power the equipment, our resorts have made a commitment to do their part.

One might ask, "Am I doing what I can to be an environmentally conscious participant in snowsports?" Here are a few small things we can all consider that can have a positive effect on the environment.

Generally speaking, ski areas are located a significant distance from where the majority of us live, and transportation to get there is our biggest pollutant. Flying is the world's greatest polluter and should be avoided whenever you can. Shorter flights are better than longer ones, and driving is an even better option for the environment. Add carpooling and you've become even more environmentally supportive. Once at the resort, taking public transportation is a more environmentally positive option than either renting or driving your own car. We can't always exercise the best options, but it is good to make the best choice for the location we want to visit.

In thinking about your food and drink needs once at the resort, consider those massive disposables. Collapsible water bottles are an environmentally friendly option, as is bringing your own table service. Both will fit nicely in your backpack or jacket pocket.

If you can patch it, do you? Can you sell it or donate it when you are ready to replace it? Consider supporting sustainable brands. Lists of them can be found on the web. Lastly, consider shopping locally whenever you can. Once again, that will help reduce our carbon footprint.

Conduct or arrange an event(s) for your club, council, or the general public that focuses on the principles of "Protect Our Winters (POW)". The mission of POW is to engage and mobilize the snowsports community to lead the fight against climate change with a focus on educational initiatives, advocacy, and communitybased activism. Stage an event based on one or more of the seven actions of the POW pledge.

Work with your club or council and your local ski area to develop or improve your ski area's "Sustainable Slopes" program. This program was adopted by the ski industry in 2000. It provides an overarching framework for ski areas on sustainability and enhanced environmental performance.

Who is Eligible?

The Award is open to any individual who is a member of a Far West Ski Association Club or Council.

John Watson History Chair

The FWSA history program had it's beginning in the early 2000s when we realized we had a 75th birthday coming up in 2005. There had always been members who could speak of people, incidents, and times past. Then president Mike Sanford took the initiative to formalize an added committee concerned with our skiing history and he recruited several members to get it started, including Catherine Ohl, Chuck Morse, and John Watson (there were and are many others who have gems to share.) Mike later captured a sponsor for one piece of the program in 2004 – Steamboat.

Why have a history program? There are several reasons. First, to expose or educate members to the dynamic history of their sport. Second, to provide educational material for public use. Third, to promote the establishment, growth, and continuance of preservation in learning centers and museums. Fourth, to provide opportunities for research into snowsport history.

We started with the Ski Club/Council recognition patterned after the outstanding club competition. We laid out a detailed template for guidance on what could be in such a history. The competing entries would be judged by an expert panel. Criteria include support activity in the public community. Such histories show the pace

of Associations development (within the larger universe of ski industry development,) inform members — and conceivably be patched together into a broader history. It can be used for outreach and recruiting. Alas, we had no nominations made for this year's Club & Council History competition.

The amount of work that must go into a substantial history discouraged participation and caused us to create a recognition other than the original. So, we started the Historic Ski Club program for clubs who could prove operation for 50 years or more. This is a Recognition with a small r. Note that this now means formation before and operation since 1972. Just provide the History Chair an application available on fwsa.org, your proof of founding date and a good hi-res color logo. The HSC program proves the enduring attraction of clubs and the need for them to provide a basic information center at the grass roots. Clubs started in North America in 1861 with the Alturas Snowshoe Club but the longest operating clubs are the Cascade Ski Club of Portland and the Yosem-

Skii Association of the Skii A

ite Winter Club, both in 1928. We welcomed two additions to the HSC alumni this year at the convention in San Diego. Congratulations to Orange Council of Ski Clubs and Sahalie Ski Club of the Northwest Ski Club Council.

The HSC programs also include Ski Patrols and Ski Schools within the Far West region. If you know of a deserving Ski School or Patrol that has been in existence for 50 or more years, please, as above, contact the history chair with a completed application, available on www.fwsa.org and provide a good hi-res color logo.

The Western Ski Heritage Award is sponsored by Steamboat. The award is an historic odyssey. It was designed to recognize recent work to illustrate the the role of snowsport in the larger community. We have recognized many authors and research projects, all shown on fwsa.org.

There is still work to be done in the preservation of Association records and the trends that could be gained from them. If you read through our 90th history and factbook, you will see several possible historic sketches that need authors. Using the Secretary's minutes and reports from councils and committee chairmen, an annual narrative could be written. All good for recruiting.

First, I want to thank everyone involved for the privilege of being appointed to the position of FWSA Safety Chair. As this is my first safety article for this audience, I will offer an explanation of how I became involved in safety.

I hail from the Reno Ski & Recreation Club (RSRC) in the Sierra Council, which I joined in 2005, and soon realized that I should have joined years sooner, as it is a fun, active club with so many nice members. It wasn't long before I was recruited to be a member of their Board of Directors, and was on the board for approximately 10 years. During my 2 years as club president, I submitted entries for the Tollakson Award, and therefore had to judge for entries at other levels of the competition. When I realized that other clubs had safety on their agendas, and our club did not, I decided to create a "Safety Site" for our club newsletter and web site with the approval of the whole board. The following year RSRC received a first-place award. every day activities, such as battery stor-Most of my years on the board, I served as the VP of Public Relations, which I preferred, while also being the Safety Administrator, a non-board position.

My monthly safety articles have covered

numerous sports besides skiing, as RSRC is a year-round club with activities in skiing, snowshoeing, hiking, mountain biking, recreational biking, camping, kayaking, golf, tennis, and other group activities. Therefore, many of my safety articles have covered safety in these other sports. However, SAFETY IS NOT A PART TIME PRACTICE. Safety needs to be a full-time practice and a "way of life". It should be involved in basically everything we do. We also need to instill safety in our family, friends, co-workers, neighbors and fellow club members when we have the opportunity to do so. It is not enough for each of us to be safe, but we can also be affected if the people around us are not safe. Within the club I have reminded members that we can be skiing down the same run, hiking on the same trail, or driving on the same streets after happy hour, so safety needs to be shared with all.

My safety articles have covered many age, fire prevention, winter driving, bee stings, first aid kits, signs of stroke, black widow spiders, rattlesnake training for dogs (very important for hikers with dogs,) and more. Safety lessons need to be shared. A few years ago, I was asked

why my safety articles cover other subjects when we are a ski club. The reality is, that if we are not safe in everything we do, then an accident or carelessness could likely affect our ability to still continue skiing or other sports or activities that we enjoy. That has been my goal for safety. Safety is an "all the time" way of doing everything.

I started submitting safety articles for RSRC in November 2012, and will continue. I also try to promote more member involvement. A few years back I held a safety slogan contest for our club. More recently I arranged another club contest for members to send me real stories where either safety, or the lack of, created an accident or unsafe situation or a more positive result. All of these real stories were posted on our web site and newsletter over a period of several months. I like to include more members, because it can increase awareness when our friends in the club know what can actually happen to a fellow member and friend. It brings the situation to life, and not just words on paper.


