Far West Ski Association's 91st Annual Convention will take place June 6-9, 2024, in Reno, Nevada, and will be co-hosted by Bay Area Snow Sports Council and Sierra League and Council. The beautiful Atlantis Casino Resort Spa will be the host hotel for our stay while in Reno. Located just 10 minutes from the airport, the AAA Four Diamond Resort boasts free hotel shuttles, a Forbes Travel Guide Four-Star Spa, loads of entertainment, restaurants and both indoor and outdoor pools.

The City of Reno itself, known as the "Biggest Little City", will roll out the red carpet for us upon our arrival. The Reno Convention will serve as a gathering place for members coming from across the Far West region. This will show the skiing and snowboarding community coming together in camaraderie, sharing a passion for winter sports to exchange ideas, and forge lasting connections.

We will kick the weekend off with some exciting activities to get us all moving. Thursday's activities will begin in the morning, with a *Tahoe Adventure*, which includes a trip to Donner State Park, a stop at Palisades Tahoe for lunch and shopping, followed by a visit to the Tahoe City Boatworks Mall to check out the SNOW Sports Museum. On Thursday evening, we will make our way to the Reno Market Place, where we will enjoy food, drinks, games, and socializing galore, during the *27th Annual Pub Crawl*.

On Friday, the *17th Annual Michael*

German Memorial Golf Tournament will take place at Magic Carpet Golf, just a short walk or ride from the Atlantis. Here, we will enjoy 19 holes of miniature golf and plenty of fun! You will have an opportunity to team up, enjoy some keen competition for prizes, mingle with your fellow golfers, then finish up with a great lunch and awards and prizes. **OR**...you may choose to go on a tour of the *National Auto Museum*, located in downtown Reno. A collection of more than 200 vintage, classic, and rare one-of-a-kind automobiles, you'll see it all here! We will be finished with all this in plenty of time to get to the Pool Party on Friday afternoon, followed by the Club Happy Hour. Then the real fun begins...the *38th Annual Silent Auction and Trade Show* on Friday evening.

Network with your favorite ski resorts, meet with tour operators to plan future trips for your club and council, get trip details and pricing, and participate in a fantastic Silent Auction that can bring you a variety of hardware, soft goods, not to mention, a number of adventures for the coming season. A drawing will take place during the auction for two Trip Gift Certificates, valid for \$250 towards one of Far West's many skiing or adventure trips the following season.

On Saturday, the convention offers a wealth of educational workshops, seminars, and presentations designed to enhance attendees' knowledge and skills. We will have a hands-on session with two well-seasoned ski technicians,

Phil & Tricia Pugliesi, from one of the local area ski shops, and from the website "Ski Talk", where we'll learn about boot fitting, ski tuning, and the latest in gear. The morning Public Affairs Panel session will be "National Ski Patrol - Bringing Calm to Chaos" - how to handle stress on the mountain, with *Barbara Razo*, *Wayne Wong* and *Tony Margulies*. In the afternoon, we will feature, "Preserving Our Heritage - Western Snowsports Museums & Libraries," with four notable snowsports museum/library founders and historians: *Bill Clark*, Executive Director of the Auburn Ski Club, Inc., and Board Member of the SNOW Sports Museum Foundation, Olympic Valley, California; *Ingrid P. Wicken*, ski historian and founder of the California Ski Library; *Alan K. Engen*, Founder of the Joe Quinney Winter Sports Center with its Alf Engen Ski Museum at Utah's Olympic Park; and *John W. Lundin*, one of the founders of the Washington State Ski & Snowboard Museum, located in Snoqualmie Pass, Washington.

Among those being invited to speak at the 2024 Convention are: *Billy Kidd*, 1964 U.S. Olympic Silver Medalist, and Race Director at Steamboat Springs; *Wayne Wong*, former freestyle Ski Champion, as well as inductee in the Canadian and US Ski Hall of Fame; *Curtis Fong*, "The Guy from Tahoe," who has broadcast thousands of ski reports, hosted numerous TV Ski shows, and basically devotes his winter to covering the sport he loves. 




Years ago, I wrote an article for our *Northwest Ski Club Council Skier's Guide*, about winning the Far West Ski Association Councils' Woman of the Year award, about what an incredible honor it was to be selected by a panel of my peers and be recognized for my volunteer efforts for my club and council. To this day, my Councils' Woman of the Year plaque hangs on the wall at our mountain condo, alongside my husband, Dale's own Councils' Man of the Year Award. And, I think about the awesome trip we enjoyed, provided by Big White Ski Resort, our program sponsor.

This awards program is the only one among the many FWSA awards that recognizes our volunteers' hard work at the club and council level. So many times, I'm told "but I don't do anything for Far West Ski Association." And I always answer—"This isn't about FWSA, this is about what you've done

for council and club!" Sure, there are a few extra points given if someone participates at the Far West and National level, but that's a miniscule part of the application process.

FWSA 2024 International Ski Week – Madonna di Campiglio, Italy

This year’s annual International Ski Week was to Madonna di Campiglio, Italy from February 24-March 3, 2024. This beautiful resort is located in a valley between the scenic Dolomites and the Italian Alps with the ability to ski both. We enjoyed spring skiing conditions with warm weather and soft snow. We skied on long runs surrounded by tall evergreen trees, a nice change from much European skiing that is above the tree line. It was an easy walk from our hotel to the gondola to get up onto the mountain. It snowed most days, so much on Wednesday that the lifts did not open but only lightly on other days. Madonna di Campiglio is so scenic and fun that it is easy to see why it is considered one of Italy’s most famous ski resorts.

In addition to skiing, our group of 68 enjoyed staying at the Hotel Relais des Alpes right in the town. There were many shops and restaurants nearby. At the hotel, we had huge buffet spreads with many choices for both breakfasts and dinners. There were multiple locations to meet for happy hours plus a pool and hot tub; several in the group got massages. We stored our skis in a large ski room. Our Welcome Orientation and Farewell Event was held in a beautiful historic room which provided fun socializing in the Far West tradition.

Our optional day tour was to Bolzano, the capital city of South Tyrol, Italy. The South Tyrol Archaeology Museum is dedicated to the life and mysterious death of Otzi the Iceman, the Copper Age glacier mummy whose remains were discovered in 1991. We really enjoyed our city guide who was highly informative with a great sense of humor. We had no idea how interesting and beautiful Bolzano would be. All 40 participants enjoyed this day tour and would like to come back to explore the area more deeply.

After Madonna di Campiglio Ski - Northern Italy Extension Adventure Tour

We had a group of 41 people on the extension trip in Northern Italy, including four who joined the group only for that tour. We stayed 2 nights in Milan where we visited Milan Cathedral, which is the largest church in the Italy Republic, Sforza’s Castle, Teatro La

Scala exterior, and the historic Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II. The architecture and art in northern Italy span many centuries and styles and create much beauty.

Our walking tour of the town of Como, known for its excellent silks, showed us some of life in the area including shops with wonderful pastries and gelato. We had a beautiful warm day for our boat tour on scenic Lake Como. It was reminiscent of a Hollywood tour with the local guide pointing out villas owned by the rich and famous from various parts of the world, including George Clooney.

After Milan, we stayed in Verona for 2 nights, the largest city in northeastern Italy. The city walking tour included the ancient Roman amphitheater called the Arena where operas were performed, the City Wall, San Fermo Maggiore Church and more.

Next, we went to La Spezia where we stayed for 3 nights. On our way there, we had three interesting culinary tours where we learned the complex process for making Parmesan cheese, the many ages, and flavors of balsamic vinegar, and in Parma the varieties of cured meats including prosciutto.

The next day we toured the medieval town of Porto Venere, a UNESCO World Heritage site and one of the most picturesque towns in Italy. It is known for its colorful narrow, multi-story vertical houses with steep stairways. We also toured Genova, the busiest port in Italy and a major economic center. The historic art in this city, much of it in bank buildings, is terrific.

For our last adventure day, we went by train with a guide for a day tour in Cinque Terre, which is famous for their little villages perched high along the rugged cliffs of the Italian Riviera. We stopped at three of the five villages along the Ligurian coastline. These

scenic villages and the surrounding hilly areas form a part of the Cinque Terre National Park that was designated as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1997. We walked many steps and climbed many stairs in Italy. For many, Cinque Terre was their fa-

vorite location of the tour.

We returned to Milan for our flight back to the USA. What a pleasure it was to stay at the Sheraton Malpensa Airport Hotel. It is located inside the airport so we could walk to our gates.

Sunshine Village is in Banff National Park and 15 minutes from the town of Banff. Sunshine is higher in elevation than the other two resorts and often gets the most and fluffiest snow of the three. It has 75 percent of its terrain designated as beginner and intermediate and has some of the area's best expert and extreme terrain, with two off

-piste zones off the Continental Divide chairlift.

Lake Louise is known for "biggest" Banff skiing. It has 25% beginner terrain and a green run accessible from every chairlift, 45% intermediate terrain, and 30 percent expert terrain. It has terrain for every level and is great for large groups and families.

Banff National Park is a UNESCO World Heritage site which shouldn't be missed. It has some of the world's most beautiful sites such as Lake Louise Lake, breathtaking mountain peaks, and all kinds of wildlife. It is a unique and special destination.



The Far West Public Affairs program covers a variety of topics of concern to snowsports enthusiasts. These topics include Ski Area Development, Consumer Advocacy & Trends, Snowsports Safety, Environmental Issues, and Snowsports History. I will address ski area development in the Fall Issue of *The Councilman*.

Consumer Advocacy & Trends – Ski Resort Passes

Ikon (Alterra) – The Ikon pass went on sale March 14 for the 24/25 ski season. The pass will offer 58 global destinations across the Americas, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and Japan. Ikon pass holders will now get two additional Friends & Family discounts, for a total of 12 for the 24/25 winter season. Each Friends & Family discount provides a minimum of 25% off the single day lift ticket price posted for the day the discount is used to ski or ride at an eligible Ikon Pass destination. Epic (Vail) – The Epic pass allows unlimited access to 42 resorts including Vail, Breckenridge, Park City, and Whistler Blackcomb plus limited access to partner resorts in North America, Europe, and Japan. The full Epic pass price is \$982 with discounted pricing for the Epic Local pass and Epic 4-Day pass. For pricing options go to <https://www.epicpass.com>.

Indy – The Indy pass is currently sold out. The Indy pass is expected to provide two-day access to 200+ Alpine and Nordic resorts across the US, Canada, Europe, and Japan for the 24/25 ski season. Recognition Programs and Awards

History Program – Far West Ski Association was founded in 1930 as the California Ski Association. From the very beginning, the Association has been actively involved in the development of skiing as we know it today. Every year we recognize an individual who has made an extraordinary effort to collect, archive, preserve and share the contributions of snowsports to the community at large. This individual will receive the Western Ski Heritage Award which will be presented at the Convention in Reno, June 6-9, 2024.:

Other Far West history programs include:

The Club & Council History Recognition Award – In 2008 Far West launched this program to develop club, league, and council histories. The objective of the annual program is to capture important information about skiing from the skier’s perspective and especially that of the club skier.

Historic Ski Clubs, Councils, Ski Schools, and Ski Patrols – Organizations falling in these categories with

over 50 years of operation may receive a FWSA Historic Recognition designation.

Safety Program – We emphasize safety at all levels of Far West, council, club, and especially individual responsibility. Each year we recognize an individual member of Far West who has made a significant contribution to safety at the Club and/or Council level. The Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year honors the person who has done the most to promote safety through safety articles, on mountain activities, presentations, public speaking, working ski patrol, and more. The 2024 Safety Person of the Year will be announced at the Convention in Reno, June 6-9, 2024.

Environment Program – This program encourages development of awareness and programs that educate club and council members about sustaining snowsports through conservation and protection of our environment. The program encourages individuals, clubs, and councils to help spread awareness of effective ways to mitigate climate change and protect our environment by supporting snowsports industry initiatives such as the National Ski Areas Association “Sustainable Slopes” program or the Snowsports Industries America “Climate Policy Agenda.”

So What About the Environment?

It’s very hard not to notice our climate is changing. In the not too distant past,

David Krupp Athletic Scholarship Chair

US Ski Team member, AJ Hurt, has surprised the world with her recent World Cup results which included a podium 3rd in Slalom in Kranjska Gora, Slovenia on January 7, 2024 and another podium 3rd in Giant Slalom on February 10, 2024 in Soldeu, Andora. These are the best Woman's US Ski Team results by anyone not named Shreffin!

AJ has been a six-time recipient of the Sierra Council Frank App Memorial / FWSA Athletic Scholarship (2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020). Her parents were so appreciative of the scholarship grant as they were both working two jobs to help support her dreams of making the US Ski Team. She started skiing at a young age and racing with the Squaw Valley Race Team. At age 15, AJ was invited to be part of the National Training Group and was showing great results for her age group.

AJ is one of the four FWSA Athletic Scholarship recipients which have been on the US Ski Team and started World Cup Races. Lila Lipanja (2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014); Garret Driller (2011, 2013); and Foreste Peterson (2011) have also competed at the highest level. Lila has won multiple NorAm and Europa Cup races and continues her World Cup aspirations as the #1 ranked independent female slalom ski racer.

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is ramping up for its 20th year, growing from an initial \$1,000 in scholarships in 2004 to

\$10,250 and 14 recipients in the 2023-2024 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is \$203,500 to 146 different recipients. The program is designed to provide financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where FWSA has a presence. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with the United States Ski and Snowboard Team and must participate in racing programs in states where FWSA has regional councils. These include California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, athletic performance, academic achievement, and community service.

Skiing is an expensive sport and the costs involved in ski racing cannot be left up to the parents alone to incur. For younger athletes the costs are modest. However, for 16 through 20 year olds, where competition becomes national and even international, the costs can be significant. Without the help of outside resources, many junior racers simply cannot compete. For a top competitor, expenses can reach \$20,000 per year. This is not a seasonal sport for these racers; it includes a full year of ski-related involvement. After the winter race competition has concluded, competitors engage in dry-land training; then off to summer camps. Camps typically run about \$1,200 per week, not including transportation.

Winter training costs range from

\$1,000-\$1,500 each season. Most applicants work part time to offset expenses. The demands on their time is significant. They must balance their time between training, competition, school, work, and community service. Despite these demands, the average GPA for these recipients consistently exceeds a 3.9 average. Our scholarships are modest compared to the need, but they do make a difference in the overall scope of the resources they require.

The funding of the scholarships come from a number of sources: raffles, auctions, club and council partnerships, and direct contributions from club members, clubs, and councils. The FWSA has greatly benefitted from the generous support from its sponsors including **Whitefish Mountain Resort** (www.skiwhitefish.com), a year round winter and summer resort and **Grouse Mountain Lodge** (www.glacierparkcollection.com/lodging/grouse-mountain-lodge/) in Whitefish ; **Schure Sports, Inc.** (www.us.karbon.com), maker of the Karbon line of snowsports apparel; the US Ski Team, and the **Far West Racing Association**.

The National Ski Patrol Safety & Wellness Team Hits the Road! We are pleased to share that some of the crew of the NSP Safety & Wellness Team from the NSP Far West Division will be presenting at the Saturday Morning 06-07-24 Public Affairs Panel Session at the 91st FWSA Convention in Reno Nevada.

The NSP Safety and Wellness Program was founded in 2022. This program was brought to life under the initiatives of the National Ski Patrol Wellness Task Force. Their mission statement is as follows.

National Ski Patrol is committed to creating and supporting a culture of wellness, safety, and resilience for all our members and those whom we serve. Honoring NSP core values, we will provide our community with awareness, leadership, guidance, education, and resources.

The Safety & Wellness Program movement was designed by patrollers for patrollers. Its aim is to promote wellness strategies that focus on the 3 E's: Educate, Engagement, and Empowerment. The program includes various behavioral techniques, such as effective

communication, eye contact, modality matching, mirroring, and the use of global words. By incorporating these techniques into our wellness strategies, we aim to create a more positive and empowering workplace culture specifically tailored to the needs of patrollers.

Their mission extends beyond the slopes, with an aim to empower FWSA leaders and members to not only become healthier, more composed skiers but also better family members, life partners, employees, citizens, and ultimately, better humans.

Staying Fit in the Off-Season

Hopefully, most skiers know the importance of ski conditioning in the fall as we anxiously await the first major snowfall and the beginning of a successful and fun filled ski season. However, unless we continue our adventures in warmer weather with sports like hiking, road biking, mountain biking, tennis, pickleball or golf, or exercise at home or in a gym, then we need to do more body strengthening before the snow falls. This is much easier if we can continue the outdoor sports fun in the ski off-season.

Some say it is too hot in the summer,

but if we can either start in the early morning or wait until the sun is lower in the sky in the early evening, these outdoor activities can help you stay physically fit year-round. If you have a friend or group of friends to do this with you, it is more fun and encourages you to continue and not skip the outings. Some ski clubs, such as the Reno Ski & Recreation Club that I belong to, have fun activities year-round. Besides skiing and snowshoeing in the winter, we enjoy hiking, tennis, outdoor concerts, biking, and other fun activities.

If you have children, take them with you if they are old enough to partici-

pate. It is good to instill healthy activities outdoors and less time watching television or electronic devices or games.

Be sure that your skis have been cleared of road dust from riding on rooftop, waxed and stored in a cool dry place like an inside closet. A hot garage can cause damage to your skis. Also check your helmets, goggles, boots, etc., so that any repairs or replacements can be done before opening day at your favorite resort.

ski resorts were experiencing low snowfall during the season. Many areas have been looking for ways to improve their snowmaking capabilities. Some areas did not open at all during the season and some areas closed permanently.

More recently, ski seasons have started later in the year. In the Northwest, 2024 was one of the latest (if not the latest) ski resort openings on record. Not only is this discouraging to the snowsports enthusiasts, but it has a huge effect on the resorts and their employee base. On the other side of the coin, once the snow begins to fall, we have seen record snowfalls re-

cently during the winter months. In the past, when many ski areas have wound down their operations, usually in April, they are now confronted with a large snowpack. Ski area operators are confronted with the decision of whether or not to stay open into late spring or early summer.

One of the many consequences of climate change is that extreme snow conditions create safety issues. Per Monica Palmer, our Safety Chair, avalanche deaths are on the rise. Monica reports so far in the 2023-24 winter season, **11 people** have been killed by avalanches in the United States, according to the Colorado Avalanche Information Center. Last season, 30 people died. A vast majority of skiers

who are killed in avalanches die in backcountry areas. Our clubs and councils need to be diligent and resourceful in promoting safety on the mountain.

What can we do about the changing environment. First of all, get involved. Read the NSAA "Sustainable Slopes" initiative and the SIA "Climate Policy Agenda." Look for activities at the local level government and projects to mitigate climate change at your local ski resorts. Spend some time researching what bills are pending at the state and federal levels regarding the environment. Write to your representatives. Be active.



What a Great Idea...We Need Someone to Work on That...Would You Be Willing to Help?

As a leader, you have undoubtedly found yourself in a discussion with a complainer. They may approach you with something like; "I've been meaning to talk to you about something," "I've been thinking that..." or "I have a bone to pick about..." While some leaders may cringe when they hear complaints or recommendations from people on the sidelines, these are prime opportunities to engage new leaders, who may be passionate about their concerns.

Instead of being defensive about the complaint or recommendation, the opportunistic leader listens with the intent to involve. Hear them out to understand if they are just complaining, or are presenting a potential solution, with intent to address. Some complaints are just complaints, while others may be

attached to potential solutions.

Instead of bristling at the complaint, try the following: "that is a great idea that we might be able to consider. Of course, you know that we are limited in the number of volunteers, but if you would be willing to help, I'd like for us to investigate it. Would you be willing to help?" Most times they will decline, but when you get someone that is willing to step up, it will be well worth all those that decline. In the best case, you will receive an engaged volunteer that may become a future leader. In the worst case, they will have been heard and challenged to be a part of the solution, not the problem.

Have your club leaders "overstayed their welcome"? No one wants to say it, but at some point in time, leaders have to turn over the reins. It is best to relinquish control while you have someone who is ready and willing to serve.

In its newest Value of Volunteer Time report, Independent Sector, with the Do Good Institute, announced on April 19, 2023 that the latest value of a volunteer hour is estimated to be \$31.80, which is a 6.2% increase from 2021 to 2022. As a leader in your respective organization, you know the value of a dependable leader is PRICELESS. So why don't we spend more time investing in our volunteers to become dependable, effective, and accomplished leaders.


LAC’s small but intrepid group had a great time in Steamboat, CO at the end of January, going with FWSA, as we usually do. Next Year – Banff!

As evidenced by the great turnout our Council's Irish themed Pre-St Patrick's Day Happy Hour at Bully's East on March 14, our members are excited to



get together. We are looking forward to the Convention in Reno in June.


