Hope everyone had a great and SAFE Ski Season. Please let your clubs know that the Safety Person of the Year Award (SPOY) deadline is approaching..... Remember the winner gets a one week paid trip to Aspen for two. Please go to fwsa.org for more information.

In my recent experience in a rehab hospital, I have met two individuals; one is paralyzed from skiing and the other is now a paraplegic from snowboarding. Both individuals were injured on intermediate slopes. This is often the case with serious ski related injuries. This emphasizes the importance of being ever conscious even under ordinary conditions.

The snow is waning....you should be waxing!! Although wax is normally perceived as a performance issue, in the spring it's actually a safety concern. Why? Because inconsistencies in snow conditions can cause rapid deceleration leading especially to ankle and knee injuries. Additionally, if you're a boarder you might find yourself cross-country snowboarding. Bring a skier, just in case, to pull you through those slow spots.



VP of International Travel FWSA Back From Austria, Munich, Prague

Mary and I are still getting over the jet lag. We were at Bad Gastein, Austria for our annual ski week with its Munich/Prague extension. Bad Gastein is a wonderful historic little village in the Gastein Valley. It's not only known for skiing but also as a renowned health spa resort. The slopes were a little icy to begin with, but we were blessed with snow during the



week, so skiing was good. The Bad Gastein ElizabethPark hotel served great food and the rooms were big and comfortable.

After Bad
Gastein those that

stayed for the extension were off for three nights in Munich. Munich has so much going for it, Marien-platz square, frothy beer halls (Hofbrauhaus), first class museums and so much more that it would take weeks to see.

After Munich we bussed to Prague. Prague, like Munich has so much to see and do. The day after arriving we were given a guided walking city tour, which gave us our bearing to really enjoy the city. It's a place you can't see enough of and feel you must return.

We closed this trip out with a going away party that had more than expected hors d'oeuvres, so much that I don't know of anyone going to dinner after. This trip was a great success. We will announce next year's international ski week by the end of April. Look for it at www.fwsa.com.

This summer we are off to Argentina/Chile. This "Ski & See" Trip, Aug 10 to 29, 2009, will start with a pre-trip extension to Valle Nevado, Chile. Valle Nevado is the newest Chilean winter resort; it is also the largest and most modern. Located 37 miles from Santiago; Valle Nevado boasts a skiable area of 21,600 acres and a 2,656-ft. drop. Together with La Parva and El Colorado-Farellones, these three ski centers form the largest skiing area in South America. After three nights and four days of skiing we bus

to Santiago Sheraton Hotel for three nights.

Day trips to Portillo are available. Portillo, home of world ski championships, lies in a bowl surrounded by towering serrated black moun-

tains, some reaching 19,000 feet. Portillo is located a two and a half-hours drive from Santiago.

Please note that we've been asked for the Chile portion of the trip only and it is available, but you must add on air from LAX to Santiago. Contact me if interested.

After Chile, those on the pre-trip meet up with the basic Argentina tour group. The tour starts at Bariloche. It is Argentina's oldest and most famous ski area. The town has Alpine architecture and is known as the *Little Switzerland of South America*. The ski area consists of three side-by-side mountains located eight miles from Bariloche. There are forty miles of trails served by



thirty-three lifts including a cable car. After 5 nights in Bariloche, we fly to Buenos Aires, the home of the Tango. After Buenos Aires, it's home or off to an optional extension to Iguazu Falls, a massive array of over 200 separate waterfalls. We hope you can join us on the exciting summer skiing and sight-seeing adventure.

FWSA North American and International Travel have contracted with "The Cruise Company" for a Scandinavia & Russia Cruise, Sep. 13 to 23, 2009, On the Emerald Princess. winner will receive \$200 to be donated to the winners' name to the charity of their choice. A memento will be awarded to the selected submission(s) and all applicants will be recognized at the FWSA convention. Applicant may be invited to prepare a tri-fold board display at the convention.

It is more important to capture your history than to *check off* all the squares. Liberal use of photos and graphics is encouraged.

These digital submissions should be readable with standard applications from CD or DVD. It is recommended that an *executive summary* be prepared in PowerPoint format not to exceed 20 slides. This will be your "presentation" as a speaker.

The bulk of the history material will be appended in sections as shown below. Submissions should try to cover as much detail as available against these roughly weighted criteria.

- Basic organizational identity, location and service area, corporate status, and mailing address, both postal and electronic (5)
- Objectives and purposes of the organization, mission and vision statements (if available), plan for the future (10)
- Membership profile, numbers, demographics (10)
- Timeline. Founding, significant events during your history to date (20)
- Annual event menu and descriptions recreational, social, competitive, community service, travel (20)
- Description of major events and achievements from your timeline (20)
- Highlighted member profiles and special interest connections (5)
- Appendices may include governing documents such as by-laws, articles of incorporation, operations manuals, of ficer and member rosters, both historic and current (5)
- Accessing information on your media, ease of navigation, indexing (5)

West. It recognizes outstanding effort in the area of ski history to find, preserve, document and share the history of skiing in the West.

The award is open to an individual or a group leader (it is not restricted to Association membership) and can be self-nominated or nominated by a club or club member. Materials and history programs will be evaluated against the objectives of the program by individuals selected for their knowledge of the history of Western skiing and that of the Association. Evaluations of history efforts will be conducted each spring in preparation for the annual convention.

A variety of methods may be used to achieve the objectives of the program. This can include any of the following: original documentation of facts of snowsports (in the legendary Bill Berry tradition); organization histories (club, council, league, company, etc); videos; photos; books; field trips; speaker programs; descriptions of past major events.

The winner of the Western Ski Heritage Award will be provided a 5 day vacation for two at Steamboat and will be announced at the FWSA convention.



The award will be presented at this year's Convention in Reno this June, where one of our wonderfully caring groups will receive a \$100 recognition from FWSA to be donated to their favorite charity. It is very exciting to see so many charity and community service activities happening within our FWSA family, and that so many clubs and councils are taking the time to participate in this official FWSA charity recognition.

Hopefully, your club and/or council has already sent me an application, which was due on March 15th. The top three competing groups will bring their photos and charity activity descriptions to convention to be displayed on picture boards. This way our FWSA delegates, our Industry friends and other convention guests will be able to get an idea of just how our FWSA clubs and councils have chosen to be involved with charities and community work. Thank you and congratulations to the clubs and councils who have applied. You are already our winners!

As a reminder to all groups: This FWSA Community Service Recognition is presented to encourage charity and community involvement for all our FWSA councils and clubs, to recognize a club or council for its outstanding financial and/or volunteer support to one or more charitable organiza-

tions, to show the ski world how much the FWSA encourages volunteerism and charity involvement, and to show our Industry partners what a big and kind heart the members of FWSA have. This award will be presented to the FWSA club or council, that has shown an outstanding effort in donating time and/or financial support to one or more charitable organizations.

If your club/council missed the deadline and has not sent in the application for this annual recognition, you can look forward to applying next year. FWSA will continue to offer this recognition in future years. Please take time to check out the displays at this year's convention to give you an idea of what kinds of community activities these very active groups have done this past year.

Community involvement updates: This comes to us from Lennia Machen of Idaho Falls Ski Club in the Intermountain Ski Council: IFSC has collected funds for a gift to the school district's education foundation *Learn-to-Ski Program*. They sponsor 10 skiers at \$100 each, and hope to increase this number with the support of private donations.

At the completion of the annual ski sale they will give about \$10,000 to their race team, Kelly Canyon Ski Team, to offset costs for travel and team membership for local skiers. This all-volunteer team sent three J2-J3 skiers to the regional Olympics last season. They were the only volunteer team attending and placed well against professionally coached and spon-

sored teams from Sun Valley, Park City, Jackson, etc.) With the club's support the cost of joining the team is reduced considerably, making it affordable for local kids to enjoy racing and learning to ski.

The IFSC also donates time and materials to provide two fully appointed wall tents as warming huts in the local Kelly Canyon Nordic Area. In addition, members groom trails and provide maps and trail guides free of charge. The huts are open to the public for day and overnight use.

The club also subsidizes lessons for kids to learn to ski. Grand Targhee offers them their normal half day group lessons for only \$25. Members then pay for the lessons for any kid under 14, taking any level lesson, skiing, boarding, nordic, etc. They offer the same deal to adults for only \$5, since the club subsidizes the rest. There are 8 lesson opportunities each year, with 3 other trips to small, local ski areas costing only \$15 to \$19 for lift tickets, all levels of lessons, and ski rentals for beginners. The club also subsidizes about \$25 a day for members attending their organized trips. This makes the trips affordable to the community. Idaho Falls

Making a Difference

Three FWSA scholarship recipients joined Far West revelers at the Big Sky awards banquet on 31, January 2009. Anton Hilts from Bend, OR; Macaulay Lyon from Woodinville, WA; and Jake Perkins from Truckee, CA; happened to be competing in the USSA Junior Nationals qualifier for DH and SG in Big Sky. They were more than happy to have the opportunity to introduce themselves to the Far West members at the banquet. Putting a face on the names of scholarship winners must have had a beneficial effect on people's enthusiasm for the scholarship program, because there was a surge in raffle sales following their introduction. The raffle brought in approximately \$3000, a new record. Mike Sanford was the lucky winner of the Karbon snowsports outfit. The Far West Ski Association again owes a debt of gratitude to Schure Sports, the maker of Karbon clothing, for their continued support for this very worthwhile program.

We've often drawn attention to the high cost of alpine ski competition. Training, equipment, lift tickets, travel, housing and meals, etc., can raise the price of competing to well over \$10,000 per season. For some competitors and their families, the cost is too great and aspiring young athletes may have to curtail, suspend, or even terminate their quest for excellence. Today with the recession, the need has never been greater. Far West established the scholarship program in an effort to, in some small way, ameliorate these expenses. However, there are other benefits to athletes that have here-to-fore gone unnoticed.

While trying to connect with our scholarship recipients at Big Sky, I had the pleasure of meeting one of their mothers. She expressed her profound appreciation for the scholarship, but surprisingly, she did not emphasize the financial benefit. She described how much the scholarship boosted her son's self- steem and sense

of accomplishment. He has had a tough journey in having to overcome severe injury and now he is bounding back to top ranking as a junior competitor. Our scholarship was the first time he had been recognized for his determination and hard work. In effect, our scholarship was praise and support for this young promising athlete.



Lindsey Vonn (age 24) is the first U.S. woman to win the world cup overall title twice and with 22 world cup wins (U.S. record of 9 wins in this season eclipsing 8 season wins by Phil Mahre 1982) is now 3rd on the all time U.S. list behind Bode Miller (31) and Phil Mahre (27). She competed with her right hand duct taped to her pole for the final month of races after slicing the flexor tendon of her right thumb. Vonn also won her 2nd back-to-back world cup downhill season title (matching the U.S. record set by Picabo Street 1996) and her 1st world cup super G season title with 4 super G wins (matching world cup women's record set by Katja Seizinger 1998 and Renate Goetschl 2007). With these 3 world cup titles in one season, she matches Phil Mahre's U.S. record from 1982. FIS Alpine World Cup 2009 season women's rank for Lindsey with last year's rank in parentheses: Overall 1st (1), Downhill 1st (1), SuperG 1st (6), Combined 2nd (2), Slalom 3rd (32), Giant Slalom 8th (13). She also first became the first American woman in 57 years to win 2 gold FIS Alpine World Championship medals (SG & DH) in the same year since Andrea Mead Lawrence won SL & GS in 1952 at Oslo, Norway.

Actress Natasha Richardson fell without a helmet during a lesson in the middle of a beginner slope (Nansen trail at Mt Tremblant in Canada) with reportedly slushy and sticky conditions. After declining medical attention from the first ambulance, she complained of a headache a few hours later at her hotel room when a second ambulance arrived, she was transported to various hospitals, and later died from an epidural hematoma. Natasha age 45 is survived by her mother Vanessa Redgrave, husband Liam Neeson and two sons Micheal and Daniel. Make an informed choice about helmets and become educated about concussions.
