and verify that your passport does not expire until after September 2008 to ensure you will be able to enter Canada and re-enter the United States after our Ski Week.

Whether you're flying or driving to Whistler, you'll enjoy the ride along the newly widened Sea to Sky Highway with the beautiful scenic views of the mountains and ocean between Vancouver and Whistler.

Lift tickets will be accepted at both Whistler and Blackcomb Mountains. Whistler has even given us a bonus by offering us a sixth day lift ticket for free. The Whistler Village at the base of Whistler Mountain offers an enchanting pedestrian-only Village, alive with entertainment, shops and bistros.



There are two mountains, Whistler and Blackcomb that rise up a mile out of the valley (5,280

vertical feet) and access over 7,000 acres of prime mountain terrain including 12 alpine bowls, three glaciers and more than 200 marked trails through 33 state of the art

The presentation focused on the pioneers of our industry, the returning WWII vets of the fabled 10th Mountain Division. The heroes of the 10th are credited with winning the ultimate battle for one of the most treasured and heavily fortified areas in Northern Italy, Riva Ridge, and

Present for the session was Purple Heart Veteran Captain Percy Rideout, who came home to be one of the founders of Aspen Ski Corp. Percy regaled us with stories of his adventures and how he came

to be an American skiing pioneer. Also

present was Abby Kealy, Movie Producer/Director and Director of the movie “The Last Ridge”.

The second half of the session jumped forward with exciting videos of the current state of the industry, where extreme skiing champion and Skier Cross Gold Medalist Reggie Crist resides. A veteran and champion of half-pipe competitions and the relatively new and hot sport of Skier Cross, Reggie provided very cool video proof of the excitement generated by the “new generation.”

These two contrasts in our sport created the “Book Ends” of skiing as we saw it develop in the past and as we know it today.

Other notable special guests attending the luncheon included Kathy Hubbard, Director of Administration, California Ski Industries Association; Jim Pena, Deputy Regional Forester for State

Travel the World with FWSA

Now that the exciting FWSA Santa Clara convention is over, it's time to start thinking about your next international tour.

FWSA International Travel is off on a 15 or extended 21 day trip to China/Tibet starting on September 14, 2007. We have a full exciting itinerary which includes all the prominent sites in Beijing and the Great Wall. A quick summary of the highlights follows: We fly to Lhasa, Tibet from Beijing where we will visit the Dalai Lama's Potala Palace and experience Tibetan life. From Lhasa we fly to Chengdu and visit the Panda Research Institute. From Chengdu the 15 day'ers fly to Xi'an and a visit to the world famous Terracotta Warriors. Then off to tour Shanghai and finally a ride on the 350 mph train to the airport and home. The 21 day'ers leave Chengdu for Lijiang, one of 29 world heritage sites in China. Then on to visit the old town of Dali. From Dali to Kunming, "City of Eternal Spring." We coach through the bamboo, water chestnut, sugar cane and rice fields to a Li River cruise passing through scenic Yangshuo. Finally we are off to Shanghai for touring and high speed train, then home. This is a

trip of a lifetime. We can still take a limited number of new participants until August first. Contact me if interested.

We have two great FWSA International trips scheduled for 2008. On March 7th we fly to Les Trois Vallees, France for our 2008 ski week. Les Trois Vallees is the largest ski area in the world. We stay at LaTanya located a short distance between Meribel and Courchevel, France.

Les Trois Vallees has 200 lifts and 540 square miles of terrain. Something for every skier.

Our post

trip extension includes 3 nights

in Aix-en-Provence and 4 nights in Paris before finally coming home. I'm sorry to say that we just filled the Les Trois Vallees trip as I write this article, but we do have a waiting list and expect some cancellations before August 1st. Participants can cancel without penalty up to August 1st.

FWSA's second international trip will be a Greek Isles Adventure Trip in the first two weeks of October, 2008. We plan a 17 day tour

with a week extension for those who can afford

the time. We have

designed this to be an adventure where we mix with the locals and not just tour and shop. We begin our trip with a few days in Rhodes, ferry to and spend several days in Crete, take a high speed boat to Santorini, tour the ancient volcano island, take a high speed boat to Mykonos for a few days, and take a private caique to Delos for an exciting day. From Mykonos we fly to Athens for a visit to the Acropolis, National Museum and old town. We leave for home on the 17th day. We are working on a week's extension, probably Turkey. We should confirm this by the end of July. The

Greek flier will be posted on the fwsa.org site when specifics are final.

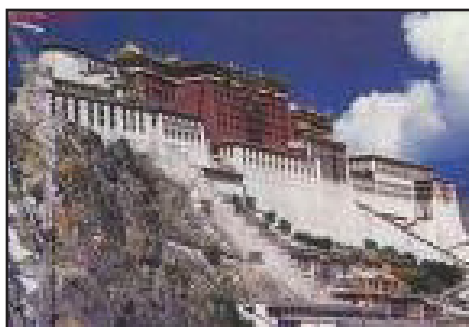
On all our International trips, we accept all placements based on the order deposits are received by FWSA International Travel. It's very important to us that as trips are

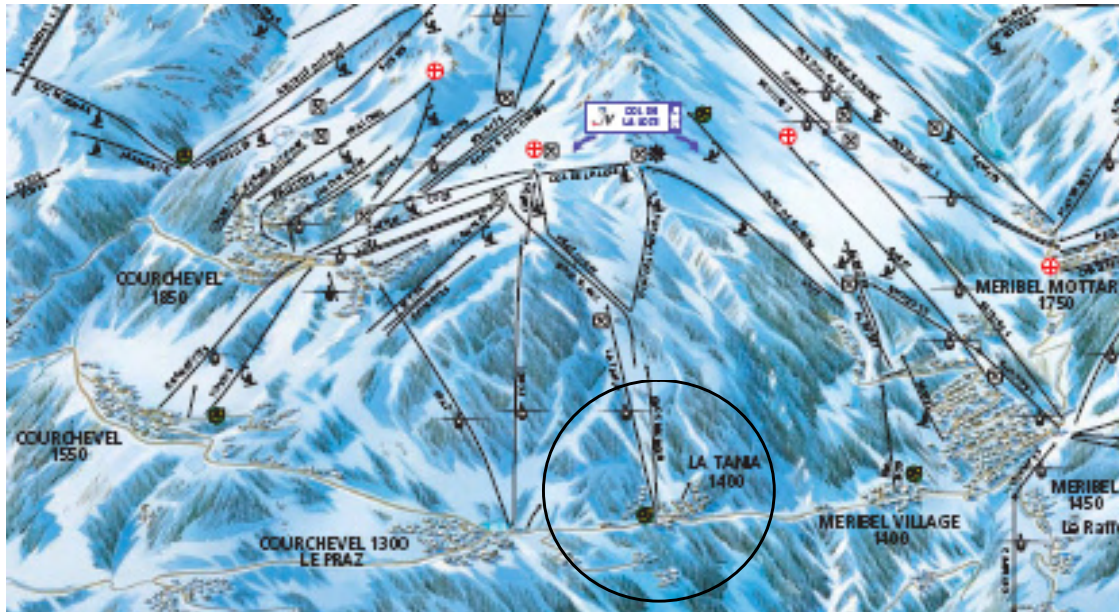

Congratulations Skiyente Ski Club

The first “FWSA Charity & Community Service Recognition” was awarded to Skiyente Ski Club in the Northwest Ski Club Council. This is a very small, all-women’s ski club, with only about 40 active members, but all members seem to have a huge heart. They donate 100’s of hours of volunteer time to community organizations and 1,000’s of dollars to their favorite charities. The Recognition Award was a \$100 check to be donated to Skiyente’s favorite charity.

Skiyente Ski Club’s charity and community service work is focused primarily on local women-related issues and the mountain community. Their longest supported charity is their own Erin Nicole Scholarship, which is administered by the NW Snow Sports Foundation. Annually, for the past 15 years Skiyente has provided a scholarship to an up and coming local female junior racer. The scholarship is in honor of one of the member’s daughter who was lost to SIDS.

The Mt. Hood Cultural Center and Museum is the organization that Skiyente has helped the most in the past few years. Members volunteer at the Museum’s annual Heritage Day by selling raffle and dinner tickets and working the silent auction which helped the museum raise about \$15,000 this year. They also act as function hostesses, docents and are members of the Board of Directors. In addition, the club has donated over \$1,000 this year to the museum.

Other mountain-related charities that have benefited from Skiyente this year are the Mt. Hood Ski Patrol and The Portland Mountain Rescue, helping with Mt. Hood rescues. The club also does a highway clean-up, picking up trash twice a year on the State Highway near their favorite ski area.

For the third year in a row, Skiyente has donated to Portland Rescue Mission’s Shepherd’s Door, a local women’s and children center that is known globally for its successful program. This year, as well as donating money, they gave clothing and personal supply

items. In addition, the club supports cancer research through American Cancer Society’s Relay for Life of Gresham, the Oregon Cancer Ski-out, and the Komen’s Race for the Cure. Skiyente Ski Club is a real powerhouse of energetic women who give back to the community and mountain they love so dearly. Congratulations Skiyente Ski Club members!

At this year’s convention, the top three FWSA Charity & Community Service groups displayed picture boards of their charitable activities. Wow, was that ever impressive! Thank you Skiyente Ski Club, Phoenix Ski Club, and Bay Area Council for presenting beautiful displays of your wonderful charity and community service activities.

The Phoenix Ski Club in the Arizona Ski Club Council supports the Multiple Sclerosis Society by participating in their MS 150 Bike Ride, a two day event, helping to raise around \$20,000 annually. The club is also involved with the Adopt-a-Highway program, where club members clean a 2.5 mile stretch of highway 2-3 times a year. Another favorite charity is the Box Ministries/ St. Vincent de Paul Ozanama Manor. Club members collect many different items and donate goody bags to this homeless shelter at Christmas, Easter, Mothers Day, and Fathers Day. Congratulations Phoenix Ski Club members!

Bay Area Council did a phenomenal job hosting this convention! Thank you everybody for a wonderfully fun weekend! Besides organizing this convention, the council also put together a picture board of their charity activities. 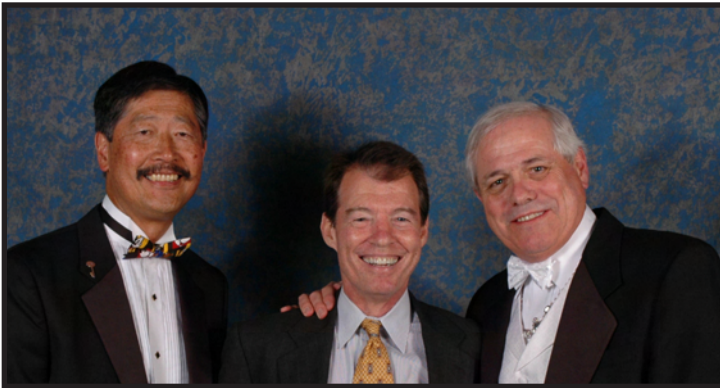

BY-LAWS TO BE STREAMLINED - OPERATIONS HANDBOOK TO BE COMPILED

J. Watson, Chairman, By-Laws Committee

The mission of the Bylaws Committee is to streamline and reduce the bylaws and transfer all operational detail to an Operations Handbook (OH). Our target date for completion and approval is the 2008 annual meeting. This is an initiative launched by the Board of Directors/Board of Trustees at their first meeting in the Association's 2006 year. It was expected to take two annual cycles to complete and was launched using Directors sitting as ad hoc

committee members at each Board meeting. The Trustees have oversight for bylaws maintenance and this preparation phase as well. The committee participants include Bob Ellis, Robb Margrave, Ken Calkins, Cliff Young, George Kish, Mike Rogers and all roster executives. I serve as committee chair and keep other interested parties informed.

The streamlining and transfer mission stated above should reduce the bylaws from 14 pages, not including the change diary, to about

8. There is no hard objective regarding number of pages. Certain articles in any set of bylaws are irreducible and are required by the laws of the state in which the organization is incorporated. Process information should be transferred to an operations handbook. The main process work will be in rewrites for and organization of the OH.

The Operations Handbook will have many sections, only part of

Dave Tollakson's activities in club leadership, racing and committees mark him as the finest that organized skiing can produce. Dave's involvement in Far West started in the mid-60s with the Rokka League. He trained, skied, took lessons and practiced. Concurrently, he took up patrolling with the National Ski Patrol [NSP] at Goldmine and trained in first aid, evacuation and winter survival. He was a major force in the development of search & rescue and ski mountaineering with the Southern Region NSP. Dave's climbing was related to this activity and the climb on which he met his death on Mt. San Jacinto training with Steve Reneker on a 1995 assault on Everest. Steve completed the climb and carried the Far West banner and Dave's ashes to the top. In 1995, the Outstanding Club Award was named in honor of Dave. In an effort to recognize the recreational skier, Far West awarded the first outstanding ski club in 1963. The criteria used then was based on the percentage of members who belonged to Far West, amount of money donated to Far West, number of members holding Far West offices, and number of members passing the Uniform Ski Test. Today, the Tollakson Award is presented to an outstanding club based on an evaluation of their structure, organization, skiing, sports, social events, and giving to the community.

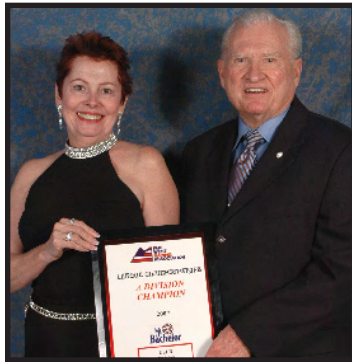

which will deal with policies and practices transferred from the former bylaws. Transferred material will cover both issues that require compliance and issues that are best practices. It is envisioned that changes to the OH would require majority approval by the Board of Directors. Notice of changes to sections of the OH would have to be provided to the membership, preferably using the web pages as a primary vehicle. The bylaws are on the website now.

The schedule for further bylaws activity is as follows:

- A circulation draft will be presented to the Board of Trustees/Board of Directors in July
- The reviewed draft will be circulated using the web and through councils and a final draft prepared in December-January
- Dissemination draft. Final draft posted and presented to clubs and councils January-April
- Notice requirements for a 2008 approval at Seattle will be satisfied using the dissemination draft.

• Concurrent with the bylaws activity will be completion of the compliance and practices sections of the Operations Handbook.

We are trying to separate out any new initiatives so that they can be considered on their merits without holding up the approval of the new set and its accompanying OH. It should be noted, however, that if there are new ideas or procedures that need to be incorporated, that this is a good time to do it. Feel free to submit suggestions to any of the committeemen identified above, either for the bylaws or the OH.

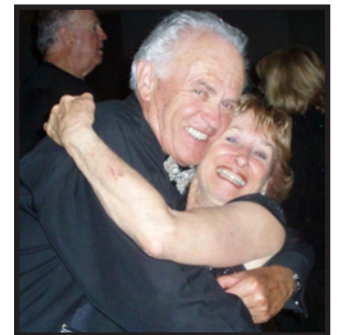
