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


2012 FWSA Travel Starts with Annual North American Ski Week to Jackson Hole, Wyoming

Far West Ski Association's Travel VP and Travel Staff are working with Spencer Long from Jackson Hole along with Mike Hibbard and Sara Clemons with Sports America Tours to plan a week of activities (welcome party, pub crawl, day trip to Grand Targhee, mountain lunch, alpine racing, banquet and dance and après awards party). The theme for the 2012 Ski Week is a "Country/Western Hoedown", so be sure to come dressed in your best western outfits. With one of the

With one of the highest vertical rises of any ski resort in the U.S. and an epic annual snowfall of over 400 inches, Jackson Hole Mountain Resort, with its impressive 2,500 acres of inbound terrain, will offer our ski week participants some of the best ski and snowboard experiences in the world. Known for its steep terrain, consistent fall line, deep light powder and endless back-country, Jackson Hole also allows beginners and intermediates to excel at their own pace on a variety of groomed runs and open bowls. Jackson Hole offers one of the most advanced lift systems in the country, which includes both an eight-passenger gondola accessing intermediate and family terrain and the iconic 100 passenger aerial tram leading to the expert's winter playground.

In 2011, we visited Switzerland, Bulgaria & Romania. In 2012, we are headed to Chamonix/Mont-Blanc, & Morocco.

Last year's Ski Week to Switzerland was a great success. We were blessed with a foot of new snow when we reached Engelberg, and it held up wonderfully until we left Interlaken at the end of a long week of snow fun. After the Switzerland Ski Week, we headed for Bansko Ski Area, Bulgaria for a few more days of cold, but great skiing. Finally, for those who could afford to be away for three weeks, we toured Romania for the adventure of a lifetime.

During the fall of 2011, a group, lead by Gloria Raminha, toured Australia and New Zealand: Auckland, Rotorua, Wellington, Queenstown and the Cairns Great Barrier Reef.

Although the FWSA is primarily a ski organization, more adventure and scuba trips are being planned. A dive group headed to Honduras in October. Next, we are off to Chamonix/Mont-Blanc, France for our 2012 Ski Week.

Chamonix / Mont-Blanc

Chamonix, situated at the foot of the magnificent Mont-Blanc, is on the Swiss-Italian border. Chamonix is the world capital of mountaineering and a world renown ski resort. Chamonix hosted the first Winter Olympic Games in 1924 and consecrated the valley as a winter Mecca. Chamonix today, is a popular tourist destination that links Italy via the Mont-Blanc tunnel. The town meets both tourist and transport demands; and preserves an exceptional natural environment. Chamonix is dotted with architectural heritage sites where traditional and modern styles co-exist. You can see hotels and palaces from the golden age, Art Deco façades, traditional farmhouses, colossal villas and chalets adding to Chamonix's unique charm.

The beauty of Chamonix is its slopes for intermediates and beginners, plus renowned challenging runs for advanced and expert skiers and snowboarders. The area is divided across six resorts, each with its own specific feel and diverse terrain. The six resorts are; Brévent, Flégère, Grands Montets/Argentiere, Les Houches and Le Tour. Together, the six resorts cover over 87 miles of groomed runs that are connected by a free bus service. Skiers will find Chamonix Valley snowsports outstanding.

Chamonix offers snowshoeing, paragliding, speed skiing, cross country skiing, hiking, ice skating and romantic horse drawn sleigh rides. They also have indoor swimming, indoor tennis or squash, tenpin bowling or you can watch a movie at the theater.

A must is catching the Aiguille du Midi Cable Car for a panoramic trip to the Plan de l'Aiguille located at over 12,600 feet above sea level. It is the lookout point for Mont-Blanc, the highest mountain in Western Europe. The

view of Mont Blanc, and the surrounding mountains, is breathtaking. A café, restaurant and souvenir shop are located in the complex. The Mer de Glace rack railway train departing from Chamonix Station goes up 6,276 feet to Montenvers at the base of the Mer de Glace glacier, the largest glacier in France. You can explore inside the glacier in a manmade tunnel or sip hot chocolate in the lookout restaurant. Chamonix village has all the top name skiing and snowboarding equipment and rental stores.

We are still taking reservations for Chamonix. Most participants have already signed up, so space is limited. This promises to be an exciting ski week. Get in on this trip before it's too late.

A Post Trip to Morocco is Planned After the Chamonix Ski Week:

Morocco is a mysterious land of ancient ruins, sacred mosques, Kasbahs, noisy souks, endless Sahara desert and rugged Atlas Mountains. We will explore Morocco for one or two weeks, starting March 17 in Casablanca, then travel through the country and end in Marrakech. The one week Morocco trip is for those who can't take two weeks away from the job or home and still want to experience Morocco. The one and two week tours will take separate buses, routes and have separate itineraries. Both Morocco trips are followed by an overnight stay in Geneva on the way home. The average Moroccan temperature during March is mid 70's Fahrenheit. This is a perfect time to be travelling in Morocco.

Here's a sample of what we'll experience on the one week tour.

We will visit Casablanca's masterpiece Hassan II Mosque. and explore the UNESCO cultural heritage site in the Roman city of Volubilis. Visit Fes Medina, the ancient walled city with a labyrinth of hidden treasures. Experience the Sahara Desert "one of the most amazing places on earth". We will travel to Merzouga sand dunes in 4x4 vehicles, ride a camel to a small oasis, enjoy a tagine dinner around a campfire and sleep under carpeted Berber tents. The next morning, we will see the sunrise over the sand dunes. Then off to the "door of the desert," Ouarzazate, visit Kasbah Ait. Jemaa el Fna square, Marrakech, where you will encounter snake charmers, music, dancers, exotic food and intrigue.

The two week tour has everything in the one week tour, plus a lot more.

There'll be more time to study, shop, relax and enjoy the country. We'll visit the old international city of Tangier, Tetouan coast, Chefchaouen in the heart of the Rif Mountains, the Jewish holy city of Quazzane, and more. We'll also spend more time traveling through mountains, Berber villages, ancient sites and exploring the Sahara.

We have a two week Morocco only tour, which joins up in Casablanca with those coming from the Chamonix Ski Week for the two week extension. Those joining the two week extension group will have separate flights to and from Morocco and spend their final night in Paris rather than Geneva going home.

2011 Dive Trip Routan, Honduras

The Roatan, Honduras dive trip led by Randy Lew was held October 22 – 29, 2011. Last year's Cozumel Dive Trip was such a success that we planned the Roatan dive.

Roatan is the top of an underwater mountain range, about 40 miles long and three miles wide. It's located on the edge of the Cayman Trench that provides clear water visibility - consistently good from 80 to 100 feet. You will see animals such as whale sharks, turtles, dolphin, and rays. The trench drops thousands of feet right off the end of the island. Water temperature averages in the low eighties.

Roatan is surrounded on all sides by a living coral reef containing nearly every species of coral growing in the Caribbean Sea, including rare black coral, and sponges of all colors and shapes.

The reef is home to seahorses, queen angel fish, stoplight parrot fish, blue tangs, and fairy basslets. It slopes gently from shore providing excellent snorkeling and diving from nearly any point on the island. The reef stretches out to sea and then drops off an underwater cliff. Roatan is famous for its wall dives. Many crevices, chimneys, and caves punctuate the reef creating an impressive and varied topography.

Innsbruck, Austria March, 2013 Ski Week

with a pre-trip to Garmisch, Germany

Innsbruck hosted the winter Olympics in 1964 and 1976. It's called the "Capital and heart of the Alps" with good reason. Alpine views are everywhere and ski slopes just a funicular ride from the center. Its Tyrolean medieval Old Town is home to imperial palaces, world-class galleries and Zaha Hadid's avantgarde designs.

Innsbruck is dominated by mountain sports. An underground train links the historic 'Old Town' of Innsbruck with the Nordpark ski area, however, there are ski resorts on all sides of the city. From it's train hub, St. Anton and Kitzbuhel are an hour away, Italy is just to the south and the biggest glacier skiing in the Alps, Stubai Glacier is close by.

Garmisch-Partenkirchen is in the Upper Bavarian Loisachtal Valley, framed in an Alpine setting for culture, nature, sports and recreation. It's just 56 miles from Munich and 34 miles from Innsbruck. Activities include skiing, hiking and mountain climbing, classical music festivals and of course, the world famous Neuschwanstein (Sleeping Beauty's Disney Castle).

Garmisch has Germany's highest peak, Zugspitze Mountain (9724 feet) and it's known worldwide. In 2011, it hosted the Alpine Skiing World Cup and International Ski Jumping. Skiers will have 53 cable cars, lifts, and a cogwheel train going to the mountain tops. When not skiing, you will find theaters, art exhibits, tobogganing, spas and many city excursions.

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

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The Far West Ski Association founded its Athletic Scholarship program in 2004 to provide financial assistance to deserving young ski racers. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers licensed by the United States Ski and Snowboard Association (USSA) and participate in racing programs in the states represented by the councils of the FWSA. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, academic performance, competitive achievement and community service. Additional information is available at: *www.fwsa. org.*

Last year's program helped fifteen young athletes from Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada. All but four finished last season in the top ten in their year group in one or more disciplines. Most notable of these was 16 year old Lila Lipanja from Incline Village, NV, who scored a second place in Slalom at the J-2 Nationals, and after a creditable performance at the U.S. National Championships, was invited to join the U.S. Ski Team's Development Team.

This year, 45 eligible athletes applied for scholarships. These include 25 junior women and 20 junior men from seven western states. Nine are former scholarship recipients. Ninety-six percent have a 3.5 or better grade point average (GPA) with 19 having 4.0s.

Over 80 percent rank top twenty in their year group for one or more ski racing disciplines. We anticipate that the number of scholarships for the 2011 – 2012 season will be maintained at 15; approximately 33 percent of the applicants. Members of the Far West Ski Association take pride in the scholarship program and its contribution to junior ski racing. The FWSA looks forward to the day when it is able to support all the deserving scholar-athletes. Donations to the program through the tax exempt Far West Ski Foundation are welcomed.

One of the program's greatest achievements in 2011 is the growth of the partnership program. Scholarship program partners are clubs, councils or commercial enterprises that pledge to contribute a minimum of \$500 per year for at least three years to support an athlete. The partners set the criteria, usually based on the athlete's residence. For example, Skiyente Ski Club of Portland, OR, our first partner, has specified that the award shall go to the top female racer in the Pacific Northwest. Last year, we were pleased to welcome the Mountain High Snowsports Club of Portland, OR, the Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs, and the San Diego Council of Ski Clubs as new partners.






The FWSF aims to support four principal objectives and has been active in all four in the past year. This January, organizers have set a goal of getting 150,000 people to sign up for lessons. In the multimedia presentation on Saturday afternoon Steve Bellamy talked about the challenges of founding The Ski Channel and The Tennis Channel.

He has produced, directed, written and hosted numerous television shows and films. The film he recently wrote, produced and directed entitled "The Story" about a diverse group of people who have devoted their lives to the mountains, is garnering critical awards and is being pushed through the Academy Award nomination process. Ski clubs and ski racing are 150 years young in 2011, based on the historical research done by the Plumas Ski Club and the Plumas County Museum. Their research unearthed documentary evidence of this sesquicentennial of clubs and racing in North America. Racing began with longboards in the gold mining camps of the Sierra and Plumas continues this longboard tradition with races and a world championship each year. The Association commemorated this anniversary with the "Making History" theme for the 2011 FWSA Convention and commissioned a DVD of the same title. See the Far West Ski Foundation article on page 25.

Entries for the Steamboat Western Ski Heritage prize made 2011 the best in the history of the

program. All of the five entries easily qualified and the final selection came down to detailed evaluation on each of the criteria for the prize. Entries: Jane Wyckoff, Judith Miller and Steve Markman, Single Ski Club of Los Angeles for its 50th Anniversary History; John James for the history of the early years of Far West Ski Week and the development of both Alpine and Nordic intramurals; Jane Jackson for her video on the early days of skiing in Arizona; and Emilio Trampuz for the history of the Mt. High Ski Club. The winner for 2011 was the historic pioneer San Diego Ski Club with its web presentation, pre World War II newsletters and history. SDSC's Past President, Erin Barber, was present to receive the prize.

The Snowsports Builder Awards: 2011

The Far West Ski Association launched The Snowsports Builders Award Program in 2008 to recognize individuals or teams that have made an indelible and beneficial impact on the sport. This impact has made a positive difference that changed snowsports forever. Such contributions are not limited to any particular sector of industry, society or the sports. They can come from manufacturing, athletics, travel, journalism, electronic or print media, government, academia, ski teaching and safety. The award may be made annually. The Builders Award is intended for services primarily outside the Association and is independent of any other honors programs. Three Snowsports Builders were recognized in 2011.

in the 1950s. Martha has a track record of tireless service to the many programs of the FWSA and especially to traveling members, many of which are her commercial customers to this day. As a member of the Far World Ski Club in the 1950-60s, she dispatched as many as eight charters per year since 1955. Her work ethic was recognized early on by Association Presidents Dick Goetzman and Carl Grover, and she was hired in 1968 to manage the FWSA Flight Program, a responsibility she carried out for the next 10 years. This included finances and liaison with the airlines and other vendors. Charters, however, ended in 1974 with the upgrade of the airline fleets. FWSA contracted with a travel agency until 1978, when it developed its own in-house travel agency. During this decade, she managed the Los Angeles office of the Association, as well, and was invaluable in support of the Southern Council and the recurring functions of the entire Association. Her efforts were recognized with the Hans Georg Award in 1990.

Martha continued her travel services in the industry in a joint venture with Norbert Olberz, in Sportours, a subsidiary of Sport Chalet, commencing in 1980. This arrangement continued for the next 16 years. Mr. Olberz is a parallel 2011 honoree as a Snowsports Builder. Martha has stayed in the travel industry to this day under several companies as they gained new owners. For the last 10 years with Skicom, she has served many customers who have stayed with her for decades.

Martha is the finest example of long term support to skiing, both as a professional in industry and as a multi-talented, dedicated volunteer.

FWSA Recognizes Clubs with Over 50 Years of Service

Many clubs within the Far West Ski Association have a surprisingly long history of service to members and their community. In 2010, the FWSA launched a program to recognize clubs and councils with over 50 years of service as *"Historic Ski Clubs"*. Startup dates appear to have been in waves: the 1930s on the West Coast, post World War II in the 1940s, and then the recreational bloom associated with the 1960 Olympics at Squaw Valley. A club desiring such designation must request it by letter accompanied by an executive summary of its history of operations and providing proof of existence prior to 1961. Incorporation is not required. The rolls are always open for further requests for designation. Historic Ski Club designations were made for eight ski clubs and certificates tendered at the FWSA Convention. The following ski clubs received Historic Ski Club, FWSA 50 Year Recognition Certificates in 2011.

NORBERT OLBERZ Founder, Sports Chalet

Four days after the Snowsports Builders Award was tendered at the FWSA Convention, Norbert passed away at age 86 on June 15, 2011.

In 1959, a 30-something German immigrant named Norbert Olberz heard about a little ski shop for sale, located in a town called La Cañada, just north of Los Angeles, California. Norbert and his new wife, Irene, plunked down all of their savings and set up shop. During the first year, Norbert and Irene slept in the back of the ski shop, taking showers at night with a garden hose through a screen door. Its name: Sport Chalet.

From the beginning, Norbert was a pioneer. Norbert knew that customers had a lot of questions they needed answered. He knew that customers wanted top quality equipment to enhance their sport. He knew that they required a friendly place to bring their equipment to be sized and repaired, and that they wanted experts to help them.

One day, a customer ventured into his store and told him of the opportunities in SCUBA. Sport Chalet became one of the first sporting goods stores to sell SCUBA equipment. This was a big leap of faith, given that his store was at the bottom of the mountains and two hours from the Pacific Ocean. He then made the decision to be one of the first sporting goods retailers to offer a wide array of equipment for the then-obscure sports of rock climbing and backpacking - at the time only available in catalogues.

In 1974, Norbert opened a 30,000 square foot store across the street from the original location, where he built a mountain inside that included a ski ramp so skiers could hone their skills. In 1981, Norbert doubled the size of Sport Chalet by opening a store in Huntington Beach, California, and began to build a loyal following of beach customers. In 2001, Sport Chalet expanded beyond California for the first time, entering Nevada. In 2005, he opened three stores on one day in Arizona. In 2007, Sport Chalet expanded once more by opening their first store in Utah. Today Sports Chalet has over 55 stores in four states and is still growing!

Currently, a typical Sport Chalet boasts 45,000 square feet of premium sporting goods equipment, apparel, and footwear. Each of the stores features a collection of specialty shops offering brand name apparel and equipment for beginners to experts. These shops include traditional sporting goods like golf, tennis, biking, fitness, in-line skates, baseball, and athletic footwear along with specialty sporting goods mer chandise such as mountaineering, SCUBA, skiing, snowboarding, wakeboarding, and ocean kayaking.

Norbert started many businesses:

- Opening a hotel at Mammoth Mountain named Sport Chalet
- Starting a travel agency Sportours, with Martha Perez as a principal employee
- Starting a manufacturing company making outdoor gear Camp 7
- Opening a wholesale import boot company Lowa
- Creating a mountaineering and sport fashion mail order catalogue
- Product design and inventor, giving his advice freely to manufacturers to improve their products

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DAVE McCOY Founder, Mammoth Mountain

Dave McCoy was born in Los Angeles on August 24, 1915 to William Thomas McCoy and Edna Rachel Metcalf. Until the age of six, Dave lived a quiet life in El Segundo, California where his father worked in an oil refinery. His next nine years were spent traveling throughout California with his parents, living in various towns along California's Highway 99 while his father worked as a highway construction contractor.

In 1928, when Dave was twelve years old, his mother took him to Independence, California, a small town south of Bishop, for a visit. He instantly fell in love with the area and decided this was the place he wanted to settle.

After graduating as valedictorian of his class in the eighth grade, Dave moved to the state of Washington to live with his grandparents. During this time, he often worked with his grandfather who was a supervisor in a coal mine. During his high school years, Dave traveled between California and Washington doing odd jobs to support himself while attending school in both locations. He worked on pig farms, grocery stores, grape vineyards and a variety of other places.

It was during his time in Washington that Dave was introduced to skiing by a group of Norwegian ski jumpers. Their motto was, "Just point 'em down the hill and ride!" Dave took every op portunity to hike up White Pass Mountain and ski straight down as fast as possible. His love affair with skiing had begun. ally marry. 'I was working as a soda jerk when the Bishop Cheerleaders stopped in on their way to Lone Pine to a game. I took one look at this girl and knew she was something special. I didn't even get to ask her name."

Roma recalls telling her sister, "One day Im going to get a date with that guy." It wasn't until two years later when Dave was living in Bishop that he was introduced to Roma. In those days, Dave and a friend would tie their skis to the back of a motorcycle and take off for the mountains. As fate would have it, Dave's friend had a sister, and when he finally introduced Dave to her, she happened to be the Bishop cheerleader he had seen two years earlier. At the time, Roma was living with her grandmother and aunt, and was working to help support them. Dave and Roma dated for four years before they were married. The couple has since raised six children.

In March of 1937, Dave was asked to go to work for the Department of Water and Power (DWP) as a hydrographer. The job required collecting and interpreting data from snow surveys to predict future water supplies for Los Angeles. Dave's extensive ski experience coupled with a strong work ethic allowed him to excel in his position at the DWP where he remained for 18 years.

Dave's passion for the sport led him to skiing pioneers Tex Cushin and Corty Hill at McGee Mountain. As a member of the Eastern Sierra Ski Club, Dave helped keep the cable-sling lift maintained and running. Dave and two friends from the DWP, Sam Griggs and Ben Boyd, built the first portable rope tow in the Eastern Sierra. They took a Model "A" Ford truck, pulled the drive wheel off, locked the brake, jacked up the rear end and ran a rope up the mountain to a pulley. This "portable" rope tow allowed the club to ski anywhere in the valley from Independence to Bridgeport searching for hidden stashes of powder.

In 1941, Dave obtained a roving permit for his own portable rope tow. The Eastern Sierra Ski Club began losing interest in running their own lifts and agreed to sell their portable rope tow to Dave for \$85. To raise funds for the equipment, he tried to borrow the money against his Harley-Davidson motorcycle but the bank refused his loan. Upon leaving the bank, the secretary was able to convince them that Dave was a good risk. Little did the bank know that the kind-hearted secretary was also Dave's soon to be wife, Roma Carriere.

His extensive knowledge of snow pack and snowmelt gleaned from his hydrography job enabled Dave to set up his lift where the snow was the best. When the weather would allow it and the roads were clear, he took his portable rope tow to Mammoth Mountain. Dave and his friends were skiing at Mammoth on December 7, 1941 when news of the bombing on Pearl Harbor reached Mammoth. The skiers packed up the rope tow and loaded it into the truck. Skiing essentially came to a halt in the Eastern Sierra and Dave considered joining the Navy with his friends even though his hydrographer position exempted him from service. Ultimately, a ski injury would take the decision out of his hands.

Dave's love of skiing led to an interest in competitive ski racing. During the late 30's he emerged as a top competitor and was something of a local racing hero. In April of 1942, Dave made a spur of the moment decision to drive to Sugar Bowl, California to compete in the state championships. During the race he took a nasty fall, shattering the bones in his left leg. The doctors counted over 38 fractures and wanted to amputate, but Dave would not allow it. It took almost four years for Dave to rehabilitate his leg. Although he still walks with a slight limp, he continues to lead a very active lifestyle.

Eventually Dave returned to his surveyor job and resumed operation of his roving rope tow. The majority of the time the rope tow was stationed at Mammoth Mountain. The Main Lodge's

predecessor known as "the Snake Pit," a 12' x 24' building with a dirt floor and outside toilet, served as combination first aid station and snack bar. The Forest Service decided to put the permanent permit to operate at Mammoth Mountain up for bid but no one bid on it, including Dave, because he didn't have the money. In 1953, the Forest Service awarded Dave the permit free of charge on the condition he begin developing the mountain. He already had a thriving rope tow business and soon Mammoth was entertaining more skiers than any other California operation, including those with chairlifts.

Dave went to the bank and asked for \$135,000 to build a chairlift, add on to the existing hut and pay salaries for a year. This time the bank thought it was too much of a risk and turned him down. Walter Martinoni, who built chairs for Donner Summit and Snow Summit, had built a chair for a client who decided he didn't want it. The two agreed that if Walter gave Dave the chair. Dave would install it himself and pay Walter as soon as he made money. Dave and a group of hard-core skiers built their own crane, dug the tower holes by hand, mixed the cement and installed the motor, brakes, clutches and drive system. Mammoth Mountain's first chairlift opened on Thanksgiving Day, 1955, just in time to meet his permit requirements. Since 1955, Dave and his crew have installed an average of one lift annually.

Dave soon relocated his family to the small community of Mammoth Lakes where he skied, ran the business and coached young racers. Coaching 19 of his team members to the United States Olympic Ski Team, including two of his own children, Dave has been one of the most successful racing coaches in ski history. Dave's coaching success helped put Mammoth on the map as a great ski area. Parents began sending their children from all over the country to ski at Mammoth under Dave's tutelage.

After building his first chairlift in 1955, Dave went on to build one of the largest ski resorts in the country. In 1986, Dave bought nearby June Mountain, ensuring the future of great skiing in the Eastern Sierra. Today, Mammoth Mountain has 27 lifts, four day-lodges, four hotel properties, four restaurants, a large maintenance facility and much more. Now a four-season destination resort, Mammoth Mountain is busy during the summer months as a world-class Mountain Bike Park and Adventure Center, and operates a golf course and fly fishing guide service.

Dave McCoy has been called one of the last great entrepreneurs in the skiing business. The FWSA is honored to recognize him with a Snowsports Builder Award.



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This is the first year of the FWSA "Community Service Awareness Program". Our eleven councils were challenged to have each of their clubs involved with at least one charitable organization by the 2011 FWSA Convention. This was a very positive experience, and our councils encouraged their clubs to make community involvement a priority with their membership, a priority right after skiing, of course!

Congratulations to our two winning councils: *San Diego Council* and *Arizona Council*. Both councils received the "almost 100%" award, since more than 80% of their clubs were involved with charitable activities. FWSA's aim for this year is to reach 100% involvement with charities by Convention 2012! Keep up the great work to reach this goal!

This was our fifth year of the other very important community service program within the FWSA family: "Charity & Community Service Recognition". At the FWSA Convention in June, this annual recognition was awarded to Monterey Ski & Social Club of Bay Area Council. The other two finalist groups, who were also asked to present a photo display of their wonderful charity activities, were Action Ski & Snowboard Club of San Diego Council and the **Bay Area Snow** Sports Council. Three other clubs were also recognized for their charity and community service involvement: Castro Valley Ski Club of BAC, Torrey Pines Ski Club and Off Your Rockers, both of SDCSC. Monterey Ski & Social Club received a FWSA \$100 check to go to one of their many favorite charities, Alliance on Aging. With just under 100 members, MSSC seems to thrive on volunteer activities. It's easy to see why this club has received this special FWSA recognition for the second time.

This past year, MSSC has supported these very lucky organizations: the Monterey Food Bank, Alzheimer's Association, Operation Christmas Cheer, Christmas in the Adobes, the Monterey Sea Otter Classic, the Concours d'Elegance and, the Monterey Beer Classic; the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am Golf Tournament at Pebble Beach; the Pebble Beach Food & Wine

Community Involvement



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The Far West Ski Association (FWSA) www.fwsa.org is a non-profit, volunteer organization with a wide range of programs. Many people are familiar with our programs such as travel, membership and councils. An area of interest that is becoming much more well known is the Public Affairs area. FWSA, as the Association for organized recreational skiers in the 13 western states of Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming represents approximately 11 regional councils, 180 ski clubs, with over 51,000 recreational skiers and snowboarders representing countless visits to ski areas in the United States. Additionally, FWSA has about 150 supplier donor partners who provide equipment, goods, and services for the advancement of organized recreational skiing/snowboarding and competition. FWSA is also a member of the National Ski Council Federation (NSCF) www.skifederation.org, an organization with 29 regional councils and about 330,000 recreational snowsports enthusiasts nationwide. As the "Voice of the Western Skier", FWSA has been very active in a whole host of areas that affect ski area development, safety, volunteer liability, transportation, taxation, ski history, and consumer advocacy.

The Public Affairs portfolio of programs is designed to present to the outside world the positions of the FWSA. A wide variety of subjects interest the membership. Topics such as airline luggage rules, reduced prices for season passes, news about ski country direct flights and the ever-increasing tendency of areas to develop along the lines of the European ski village environment are of interest to membership. Also, we attempt to better educate our membership in areas such as the impact of changing demographics and the need for increased diversity, snowsports industry efforts like the Model for Growth to address trial and retention, regulatory efforts to modernize state ski laws similar to the Colorado model, expanding snowmaking capabilities, the development of e-commerce in the snowsports industry, resort developments focused on consumer tendencies, the analysis paralysis forced on the Forest Service in resort development, and the need to meet a visiting family's variation in ages and interests.

In summary, the width and breath of the

FWSA Public Affairs program is significant and the FWSA is committed to do its part in communicating issues and educating membership on the wide and interesting variety of Public Affairs topics. Of most significant importance over the last year has been our involvement in area development, consumer advocacy, safety, transportation and history.

We strongly encourage you to get involved now in the issues that affect you by writing letters/emails to appropriate government officials, newspaper editors, and other key influencers; to attend public meetings; and share your views with others in a wide variety of situations including on the chairlift. To stay informed about relevant issues visit *www.fivsa.org* and subscribe to the no-cost FWSA News (monthly electronic newsletter).

Area Development

The most prominent topic in Public Affairs is area development, which covers ski area expansion and enhancement, proposed new areas, and the preservation of potential areas for future skiing or recreational use. Action in this arena affects all snowsports enthusiasts; has long-term implications; requires unified regional action; involves the ski industry with us; and can be exasperatingly tedious and drawn-out, as well as very costly. Generally, the Association must deal with county, city and even state governments, the US Forest Service, community organizations, area operators or permittees, and an ever-changing spectrum of organizations interested in protection of the environment.

The Council on Environmental Quality has been working to modify the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) as appropriate to reduce process gridlock. To further improve the expensive and time consuming NEPA, the National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) has suggested categorical exclusions for certain onmountain activities such as lift replacements following the same alignment, additional snowmaking on trails that are already treated with man-made snow and use of existing service roads and trails for new uses like mountain biking.

We maintain an active network of "issue watchers" in strategic areas of the western states. There are currently several expansion issues we are keeping close watch on such as the *Arizona*

Snowbowl; Eldora Mountain, CO; Homewood Mountain, CA; Las Vegas Ski & Snowboard Resort, NV; *Mt Spokane*, WA; Snowbird, UT as well as logging issues such as Forests with a Future. We have been aggressively involved in letter writing campaigns to ensure "The Voice of the Western Skier" is heard as an even handed proponent for rational development.

In addition to specific expansion issues, we are strong supporters of responsible resort management and have endorsed the NSAA "Environmental Charter" and the "Sustainable Slopes" initiative.

■ Keep Winter Cool, a joint effort of NRDC (Natural Resources Defense Council) and NSAA (National Ski Areas Association) launched in 2003, continued its 9th season as part of NSAA Sustainable Slopes initiative. Examples of this initiative are that 88% have some sort of conservation initiative in place, 38% purchase green power for their operations, 33% are using some sort of renewable energy on-site, and 12% offer guests renewable energy offsets.

■ Arizona Snowbowl: Save the Peaks Coalition filed an injunction in January 2011 and the opening brief in April 2011 in the 9th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals to appeal the December 2010 ruling by U.S. District Judge, Mary Murguia in Phoenix that Save the Peaks Coalition which opposes snowmaking waited too long to file their new lawsuit (Save the Peaks Coalition v. U.S. Forest Service filed September 2009) and that the U.S. Forest Service adequately considered the risks of using reclaimed water to make snow. A separate March 2011 emergency injunction to stop tree cutting and construction in furtherance of snowmaking pending the outcome of the appeal was denied in April 2011 by the U.S. 9th Cir cuit Court. In May 2011, after review of construction plans and site designs, Coconino National Forest Supervisor, M. Earl Stewart, authorized the implementation of the Arizona Snowbowl water pipeline construction project for snowmaking and the building of new ski runs. Construction began in May 2011 on an initial \$1.3 million underground segment of the 12-inch-diameter 6.5 mile pipeline from Highway 180 - along the Snowbowl Road corridor to the Snowbowl - of the total 14 mile long pipeline project from Flagstaff. Phase 1 is expected to provide snowmaking for 134 acres of the approved 205 acres starting in the 2012-2013 season. In June 2011, six protestors were arrested after locking themselves for a few hours to construction equipment and to each other in the pipeline trench. Arizona Snowbowl had won approval of its snowmaking plan when in June 2009, the U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear the previous case - Navajo Nation et. al. v. U.S. Forest Service (originally filed June 2005) - that had been decided in Arizona Snowbowl's favor at the U.S. 9th Circuit Court level.

■ Land Management Planning Rule: Provides an overall framework of assess, revise/ amend and monitor for forest plan developments, revisions and amendments which includes recreation and multiple use among the priorities. National roundtables were held in April, May, and July 2010, and a science forum was held in March 2010. ■ The Proposed Ski Area Recreational Opportunity Enhancement Act will allow seasonal or year-round natural resource-based recreational activities that encourage outdoor recreation and enjoyment of nature while harmonizing with the natural environment provided that such activities are located within the developed portion of the ski resort. Activities expressly permitted include zip lines, mountain bike terrain parks and trails, frisbee golf courses and ropes

courses. Excluded activities are tennis courts, water slides and water parks, swimming pools, golf courses, and amusement parks. Bill S. 382 was sent to the full Senate in July 2011 and bill H.R. 765 was sent to the House of Representatives in June 2011.

American Dream Meadowlands (formerly Meadowlands Xanadu) is a \$2.7 billion megamall project in East Rutherford, NJ. It includes a 700 foot indoor ski slope which was approved in May 2011 for \$200 million in state tax breaks for its new developer. Triple Five of Canada owns the 4.2 million square foot Mall of America in MN and the 5.3 million square foot West Edmonton Mall in Alberta, Canada. This three million square foot development is expected to open Phase 1 in fall 2013; and Phase 2 in spring 2014. It is predicted to serve 55 million visitors annually. Plans includes shops, restaurants, nightclubs, a 26-screen movie theater, a 3,000-seat performing arts theater, indoor glassdomed amusement and water parks; and a skating rink in addition to the indoor ski slope.

Antelope Butte, WY. Nonprofit **Antelope Butte Foundation** (Mark Weitz, Chairman) plans to reopen the ski area which has been closed since 2004 between Shell and Dayton, WY for the 2012-2013 season. The 250 acre ski area has an annual snowfall of 200 inches, a summit elevation of 9,400 feet with a vertical drop of 1,000 feet, two double chairlifts and a rope tow. www.facebook.com/AntelopeButteFoundation

Battle Mountain, CO. Planned ski area near Minturn, CO with 4-5 fixed lifts, plus 3-4 snowcats to take skiers to the top of lifts, about 170,000 square feet of commercial space (coffee shop, ski shop, chili shacks). In April 2011, the Colorado Supreme Court had agreed to hear a case, Town of Minturn v. Sensible Housing, Inc., Case No. 10SC670, involving an annexation dispute between the Town of Minturn and a company claiming an ownership interest in the parcels to be annexed. Minturn has an agreement with Crave Real Estate to annex 4,300 acres into the town for the project. In December 2010, the developer Crave Real Estate won key water rights for its proposed 1, 210 acre-foot reservoir at Bolts Lake, south of Minturn which would

provide water for up to 1,700 housing units. In 2009, Crave Real Estate (part of Lubert-Adler investment company of Philadelphia, PA) took over the project from Florida developer Bobby Ginn which started this project in 2005.

Consumer Advocacy

Advocacy on behalf of all recreational skiers consumes a large part of the effort made during FWSA member's visits to all ski areas. But not only is it important to express the consumer's opinion while "on the mountain", it must also be expressed back home, in the communities that only think of snow skiing in the winter. As the "Voice of the Western Skier", the Far West Ski Association takes its duties very seriously. The association continues to keep close tabs on a variety of consumer advocacy issues ranging from safety, helmet usage, avalanche awareness, women's ski jumping, Congressional Ski and Snowboard Caucus, injury liability initiatives, youth snowsports development programs, and luggage regulations.

Snowsports Trends & News Update

Snowsports market sales for August to March versus year ago were up 12% in dollars to \$3.3 billion and +8% in units. Alpine skis (flat skis sold without bindings) in the 80mm-110mm waist width category are up 74% in dollars on more than 74,000 units vs. 47,000 units for the same period last year. Reverse/Mixed camber ski sales are up 134% in units and +129% in dollars to 54,000 units. Reverse camber snowboard sales are up 42% in units (accounting for 45% of all snowboards sold) and +46% in dollars. AT/Randonee equipment sales increased 90% in dollars sold and +87% in units sold.

Skier visits increase +0.6% (Northeast +4.0%, Rocky Mountain +1.7%, Midwest +1.0%, Pacific Northwest +0.3%, Southeast -3.6%, Pacific Southwest -5.0%) from 59.8 million to 60.1 million visits (second best season ever only just below record of 60.5 million visits in 2007/08) for the 2010-11 season based on preliminary estimates from the National Ski Areas Association released May 2011.* This still represents a +4.1% increase over the 10 year season average annual skier visits (Pacific Northwest +7.0%, Northeast +5.3%, Southeast +4.8%, Rocky Mountain +4.0%, Midwest +2.2%, Pacific Southwest +2.0%). Overall snowfall was up 27% and was the highest recorded in 20 years of Kottke research (Pacific Southwest +43%, Northeast +37%, Rocky Mountain +31%, Midwest +26%, Pacific Northwest +9%, Southeast -42%). www.nsaa.org/nsaapress/1011/kottke-2011-prelim.asp

***Note:** Nearly a dozen ski areas were open on July 4th and had more than 50,000 visits on that one day alone. The late season resulted in a record breaking skier visit totals for the 2010-2011 season according to NSAA.

Women's ski jumping was finally approved by International Olympic Committee (IOC) Executive Board in April 2011 for the 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi which will be the first gender-equal Winter Games in Olympic history after a seven year battle. IOC Sports Director, Christophe Dubi, said the increase in quality and depth in women's ski jumping from the 2009 World Championships to the 2011 Worlds was the main reason for approval of a women's event now. Forty-three athletes from 15 nations competed in Oslo in February at the 2011 World Championships in front of nearly 10,000 spectators compared to 36 athletes from 13 nations in Liberec, Czech Republic in 2009. Participation in women's ski jumping on the FIS Continental Cup increased to 182 women from 18 nations in 2010 from 83 women from 14 nations in 2006. The IOC also approved in April 2011, five other new events for Sochi 2014: freestyle ski halfpipe (men and ladies), biathlon mixed relay, figure skating team event, and luge team relay. Dubi said consideration of Olympic events inclusion "is driven

by remaining appealing and remaining relevant to what people do every weekend, especially the youth." www.wsjusa.com

International Olympic Committee (IOC) Executive Board approved slopestyle skiing, slopestyle snowboarding, and snowboarding parallel special slalom disciplines in July 2011 for 2014 Winter Games. IOC President Jacques Rogge said "Such events provide great entertainment for the spectators and add further youthful appeal to our already action-packed lineup of Olympic winter sports."

Pyeong Chang, South Korea was selected by the International Olympic Committee in July 2011 to host the 2018 Olympic Winter Games. Locations include Yongpyong Resort (alpine skiing: slalom and giant slalom), Jungbong (alpine skiing: downhill, Super G and combined), Bokwang Phoenix Park (freestyle skiing and snowboard), and Alpensia Resort (ski jumping, nordic). Sochi, Russia is hosting the 2014 Olympic Winter Games.

Lindsey Vonn won Best Female Athlete ESPY (Excellence in Sport Performance Yearly) in July 2011 for the second straight year becoming the second ever back-to-back winner of Best Female Athlete ESPY (Annika Sorenstam won in 2005/2006). In 2010, Lindsey was first skier, male or female, to ever win the top ESPY Award which began in 1993 and to ever win the top AP Athlete of the Year Award which began in 1931. This is Vonn's 4th major 2011 recognition outside of alpine skiing. She also won the 2011 Laureus World Sport Award, 2011 Nickelodeon Kids Choice Award for Favorite Female Athlete, and 2011 Preis Herbert Award (public figure who has promoted the Alps region through their work in the media). These awards cap the 2011 season where Lindsey captured the following FIS Alpine World Cup season long titles: 4th downhill title, 3rd Super G title, 2nd super combined title, and was only three points (1725) from winning her

4th overall title from Maria Riesch of Germany (1728). She added eight FIS World Cup wins this season to reach a career total of 41 which ranks 5th all time among women and 1st all time for the U.S. list ahead of Bode Miller (32) and Phil Mahre (27). Vonn was also nominated for the 2011 Teen Choice Award for Best Female Athlete. Shaun White won the 2011 Best Male Action Sport Athlete ESPY. In January 2011 Lindsey Vonn was named U.S. Olympic Committee's SportsWoman of the Year for 2010 - the second consecutive year Vonn has earned this honor. The last female alpine skier to achieve this USOC SportsWoman of the Year honor was Vonn's childhood hero, Picabo Street, in 1998. Vonn is the first woman since track and field legend, Jackie Joyner Kersee, (1986-87) to win the award back-to-back.

Lindsey Vonn was named by the International Olympic Committee as the first ever Winter Youth Olympic Games Ambassador for the 2012 Winter Youth Olympic Games in Innsbruck, Austria to be held January 13-22, 2012. Vonn said 'I know the importance of strong role models. When I first met my hero, Picabo Street, it was a huge thrill and an unforgettable moment for me. She inspired me to become what I am today. If I can have even half that effect on some of the young athletes I come into contact with, it will be worth it. I'm really looking forward to it."

Innsbruck 2012 is expected to attract over 1,000 top athletes aged 15-18 from about 70 countries competing in alpine (slalom and GS), cross country, freeskiing (skicross and halfpipe) nordic combined, ski jumping and snowboarding (halfpipe and slopestyle). Athletes will also participate in a Culture and Education Programme (CEP) with activities providing guidance on topics such as Olympic values, the benefits of leading a healthy lifestyle, and the prevention of sports injuries. www.innsbruck2012.com.

Ted Ligety, USA won a gold medal in giant slalom at the World Championships at Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany in February 2011. This is the 4th World Championship GS gold medal ever for the U.S. and 2nd career World Championship medal for Ted Ligety (bronze medal in GS at Val d'Isere, France in 2009). He becomes the 6th American to win both Olympic and Worlds gold, joining Barbara-Ann Cochran, Phil Mahre, Picabo Street, Bode Miller and Lindsey Vonn. Ted also won his 3rd FIS World Cup giant slalom season long title in four years becoming the first American to win three World Cup GS titles and beating Phil Mahre's record (1983 & 1982 GS titles).

Nolan Kasper, USA earned a slalom podium in a tie for 2nd place at Kranjska Gora, Slovenia in March 2011 and his first podium ever in five completed FIS World Cup races. Bode Miller in 2008 was the last U.S. male slalom podium and aside from Bode Miller and Ted Ligety, the last U.S. male to win a slalom podium was Felix McGrath in 1988. Nolan joins other American male slalom podium winners including Tyler Palmer, Bob Cochran, Rick Chaffee, Billy Kidd, Spider Sabich and Jimmie Heuga (1967-1972) plus Phil Mahre and Steve Mahre (late '70s and early 80s).

Learn to Ski and Snowboard Month in January 2011 had extreme skier and snowsports ambassador, Glen Plake (three time World Hot Dog Ski Champion, Down Home Tour ambassador) plus Bode Miller (five Olympic medals, two overall World Cup titles, four discipline titles) as the national ambassadors who communicated the excitement and lifestyle benefits of snowsports participation and why it helps to take a lesson from a pro when starting out or trying to improve. Over 60,000 lessons were provided to adults and children as part of this initiative which also generated over \$4 million in general media coverage for snow sports. The theme was "Humans were never meant to hibernate" with the message "Bring a friend".

Volcom (snowboard, surf and skate apparel brands) of Costa Mesa, CA was purchased by PPR SA (French parent of Gucci and Puma brands) for \$607.5 million in May 2011 to be integrated into its Sport & Lifestyle Group. This price is a 7.5x multiple of Volcom's EBITDA (earnings before interest, depreciation and amortization).

U.S. Alpine Ski Team nominations for the 2011/2012 season were received in June 2011 by two of the 2010 FWSA Athletic Scholarship recipients - Keith Moffat of Berkeley, CA (C Team) and Lila Lapanja of Incline Village, NV (D Team).

Former all-state ski racer, Keegan Bradley, age 25, wins golf major (PGA Championship) on his first try in August 2011. Only two other golfers, Ben Curtis (2003) and Frances Ouimet (1913), have ever won a major on their first try. Keegan raced in Vermont as a young USSA racer in VARA and finished 3rd in GS as a high school junior at the 2003 Vermont alpine state championships when he attended Woodstock High School.

Safety Update

■ Helmet use increased to 60% of all skiers and riders (up 4 points from 56% in prior season) according to National Ski Areas Association National Demographic Study 2010/11 preliminary results released May 2011. In comparison, in the 2002/03 season, only 25% of all skiers and riders wore helmets and only 18% of young adults 18-24 wore helmets. Helmet usage by age group with point change vs. year ago: 91% (+5 points) of children under 10, 77% (+2 points) children 10-14, 74% (+3 points) adults +65, 48% (+5 points) young adults 18-24. www.nsaa.org/nsaa/ press/1011/helmet-usage.pdf

■ Uvex Funride ski helmets were recalled in July 2011 due to insufficient shock absorption and resistance to penetration. The interior label on affected helmets has the code "S-58B" or "S-58C". For more info, contact Uvex at Swix Sport USA at (800) 343-8335 or visit www.uvexsports.de/en/recall.

■ New Jersey became the first state in April 2011 to require helmets for children at ski resorts starting with the 2011-2012 season. Parents or supervising adults can be fined \$25 for the first offense and up to \$100 for subsequent offenses if the child under the age of 18 is not wearing a securely fitted protective helmet. The police are responsible for enforcement; not ski resort operators who are also protected from liability in connection with this new law. Geraldine Link (Director of Public Policy for the National Ski Areas Association) said "It is the individual's responsibility to improve core safety. Go ahead and wear a helmet, but don't ski and ride differently. Act as if you're not wearing a helmet."

■ CA Senate Bill 880 which requires helmets for children under 18, resorts to post informational signage, and fines up to \$25 on parents was approved by CA Senate in June 2010 and moved to CA State Assembly. CA Assembly Bill 1652 which requires helmets for children under 18, enforcement of the law by ski resorts, filing of annual safety plans and monthly reports about injuries and deaths was approved by CA State Assembly in June 2010 and moved to CA Senate. California Governor, Arnold Schwarzenegger, vetoed CA Assembly Bill 1652 and signed CA Senate Bill 880 in September 2010 which effectively killed the helmet initiative.

■ FIS approved major changes for alpine ski specifications (turn radius m / ski length cm) in July 2011 for the 2012/2013 season with men's world cup GS turn radius jumping from 27m to 40m and GS ski length (185 to 195cm) and women's world cup GS (23 to 35m / 180 to 188cm). Men's SG (33 to 45m / 205 to 210cm) and women's SG (33 to 40m / 200 to 205cm). Men's DH (45 to 50m / 215 to 218cm) and women's DH (45 to 50m / 210 to 215cm). No change for SL. www.fis-ski.com/data/document/specifications-ski-length-radius-profile-width-standing-height-final.pdf

■ Two Canadian snowboarders (25 year old Kyle William Veith of Banff, Alberta and Colin Mathew Mansell of London, Ontario) were fined C\$297 each by the RCMP for crossing a closure rope into Sunshine Village's Wild West area where they triggered an avalanche in 2/11.

■ FIS signed a memorandum of understanding in January 2011 with body protection manufacturer Dianese to investigate the potential of air bag technology for skiing.

■ FIS safety research project managed by University of Salzburg in Austria focuses on three of five main injury risk factors for alpine ski racing - snow conditions, course setting/speed, and equipment (combination of ski, binding, plate and boot) as part of FIS Injury Surveillance System (launched in 2006). Forerunners at ten world cup events as of February 2011 were equipped with GPS devices and sensors to evaluate impact of course setting and snow conditions. Also a FIS equipment safety project is developing special ski prototypes with testing underway of downhill and giant slalom skis.

Taxation/Insurance/Risk Management Update

All tax exempt organizations are required to file an annual return 990; or for those that qualify, an electronic notice 990-N, to avoid the automatic revocation of tax exempt status for organizations that fail to file for three consecutive years. May 17, 2010 deadline imposed by Pension Protection Act of 2006 which effectively required filing by almost all tax exempt organizations through the elimination of the old minimum annual revenue requirement for filing of \$25,000. IRS Commissioner, Doug Shulman, said that the IRS will be providing additional guidance on how it will help these organizations maintain their important tax-exempt status even if they missed the May 17 deadline. IRS Commissioner Shulman urged these organizations to go ahead and file - even though the May 17 deadline has passed.

■ American Eagle Airlines added daily, nonstop seasonal service to Aspen, CO from both Dallas, TX and Los Angeles, CA during the ski season 12/15/11-4/2/12; and summer season 6/14-8/20/12. In the fall of 2010, United Airlines announced a second daily nonstop flight from San Francisco, CA.

Continental Airlines added new winter service to Gunnison-Crested Butte, CO from Houston, TX for the 2010-2011 season.

■ The U.S. Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame Class of 2010 inductees named in November 2010 with induction ceremony held in April 2011 at Sun Valley, ID. Daron Rahlves (world champion ski racer with nine downhill victories, the most decorated U.S. downhiller), Glen Plake (skiing legend with three World Hot Dog Ski Championships), Shane McConkey (Big Mountain freeskier, inventor of Spatula and Pontoon skis), Muffy Davis (paralympic medalist and world champion), Bobby Cochran (Olympian from Vermont, 1st male U.S. skier to win a World Cup GS), and Earl Holding (resort builder – Sun Valley, ID and Snowbasin, UT).

■ The 150th Anniversary of the first organized ski races and ski club in America (Plumas Ski Club) was celebrated in March 2011 with the Historic Longboard Revival Series races held at Eureka Bowl at Plumas Eureka State Park in Johnsville, CA. ■ The 8th Annual Vermont Antique Ski Race benefit was held at Suicide Six Resort in Woodstock,VT on 2/13/11. 

BERNID RHSCHER SALE BAVANRIAN ALES

Bernd Ritschal is one of the top -mountain photographers in the world.

I pulled off the Garmisch-Partenkirchen Autobahn, and pointed my Jeep toward the little Bavarian village of Kochel am See, the home of Bernd Ritschel. Bernd is a colleague of mine—a fellow photographer—and he had promised to show me around on skis in his little corner of the world.

To have Bernd Ritschel as a guide in the Bavarian Alps is like having Winston Churchill show you around 10 Downing Street or Beethoven give you music lessons.

Bernd's early connection with the mountains of his native Germany, and many other ranges, came from his climbing. Climbing is still his first love, but he has also spent the last fifteen years or so photographing most of the mountains of the world. He and his camera have visited 65 different nations, almost always with the purpose of photographing the most prodigious peaks of those lands. But, there is no part of the world with which he is more familiar than the Alps around his hometown. Who can photograph them from more different, unusual and odd angles than a climber? Nobody! So, it was with no small amount of anticipation that I pulled up to the home of Bernd and his wife, Ela.

A quick tour around Bernd's home left no doubt about his vocation and his avocation. His cellar served as his mountain equipment warehouse. One wall was home to a dozen pairs of downhill skis, one pair of telemark skis, two pairs of cross-country boards and an odd set of 130-centimeter-long skis used for winter mountaineering. This gear was complemented by fifteen pairs of ski poles, twelve backpacks of various shapes and sizes, 25 pairs of ski boots, eight pairs of snowshoes, four sets of crampons and five ice axes.

Whereas his large cellar was adequate for all of Bernd's mountain equipment, it took two full rooms of his house to accommodate his photography gear. Bernd's family includes thirteen different cameras, 29 lenses, and nineteen camera bags and rucksacks. By the time you read this article, it will certainly have grown beyond that. Alongside all his equipment are 140,000 slides—neat and well-ordered.

Ela is not left out of the loop. She keeps very busy working on layouts for much of Bernd's work, which so far has included 23 books composed solely of his own photos and 50 additional books to which he has contributed photos. Keeping track of the number of magazines, newspapers, advertising brochures and other publications in which Bernd's work has appeared is beyond his computing skills. Suffice it to say that there are few photographers in the world who have been more industrious and productive in the field of mountain photography than my host, and I felt honored to be his guest.

When I first contacted Bernd, asking him for advice about skiing in Germany, he merely said, "Come down to me–I will show you the best skiing my country has to offer."

Our first day, Bernd drove us to nearby Garmisch-Partenkirchen, his favorite German ski resort. Garmisch is the German equivalent of Chamonix in France, St. Anton in Austria or Cortina in Italy. It is the grandfather of German skiing, a ski location treated with reverence by even the most atheistic of the New Age snowsports culture. Besides having hosted the Winter Olympic Games in Hitler's day, Garmisch is the annual venue for the famous January 1 ski-jumping competition, still held on the same jumping hill that was built for those Olympic games.

The ski areas that make up the Garmisch region include the Hausberg, Kreuzeck, Eckbauer, Wank and Zugspitze, Germany's highest mountain. While all five of these lift systems provide reasonably good skiing, the Zugspitze rises head and shoulders above its neighbors in altitude, as well as stature. It was not surprising, then, that Bernd chose to show me this spectacular peak.



The charming village of Mittenwald is located approximately 16 kilometers to the southeast of Garmisch-Partenkirchen. It is situated in the Valley of the River Isar, on the northern foothills of the Alps. It is famous for the manufacturing of violins, violas and cellos. The newly renovated Violin Museum has a priceless collection. The most significant landmark is the church of Saints Peter and Paul towering over the landscape. Surrounding buildings, decorated with elaborate fresco paintings on the exterior walls makes this historic upper Bavarian village a tourist's treasure.

It is hard to avoid all the historical aspects of the Zugspitze. One can access the mountain by three different means, and two of the three are also quite old. The Tiroler Zugspitzbahn, which ascends from the Austrian side, was the first method of reaching the Zugspitze, having been originally constructed in 1926.

Shortly thereafter, in 1930, a cog wheel train up the mountain from Germany was completed, and in 1963, the 46-passenger Eibsee Seilbahn gave a third option for ascending Germany's highest peak.

Garmisch, however, has not attempted to rest on its laurels and be satisfied to serve as a ski-history museum. It has definitely kept up with the times, offering one of the best halfpipes and terrain parks in the Alps. With the help of one of Germany's three glaciers, the Schneeferner, the season here ordinarily lasts until the end of June, and the end of the season is nowadays well known for its large snowboard camps.

We rode up the spectacular Eibsee Cable Car, which rises 1950 meters up the ominous looking north face of the mountain. From the top, I took a few minutes to admire the scenery from the large lookout platform. Directly below, the Eibsee lay frozen in the morning shade. Beyond the lake to the south, the Alps peter out into flat farmland, while the Zugspitze rises dramatically above its pastoral surroundings.

Bernd and I turned toward the ski area and scouted the slopes with our eyes. Most of the region is comprised of blue and red pistes that are perfectly suited to high-speed cruising, but we also noticed a nice slope of powder with plenty of virgin lines still available. This was surprising to me because there had been no new snow for the past five days.

We traversed high from the Weisses Tal Lift. If one dared to peer over the cliffs on the back side of the mountain, one was afforded a view straight down onto the Seefeld ski region of Austria. We skied the old powder and cruised some runs on the well-prepared pistes to warm up.

Riding on the lift in between runs, Bernd told me more about his life as a photographer. He shoots between 1000 and 1500 rolls of film in an average year, and keeps only 25–30 percent of the images. His photos cover the gamut of mountain activities including skiing, touring, snowshoeing, mountain biking, ice climbing, rock climbing and mountaineering. Although the mountaineering photos have the lowest marketability, it is that endeavor that Bernd prefers over all others.

"I could earn twice as much money shooting

golf and keep my fingers warm to boot, but that is not where my heart is," explained Bernd. "As a fashion photographer, I could earn three times the money, but the mountains are my world."

Despite the fact that he could earn even more money in other branches of photography, he has received as much as 4000 Euros for a photo—not too bad for doing what one enjoys.

As we arrived at the top of the lift, the mountain goat emerged in Bernd. He had seen a few tracks snaked into the snow high above us. He led me over to a staircase of boot notches etched into the snow and began to ascend. There was nothing for me to do but follow.

The hike was no more than a few hundred meters long, but most of it was very steep. It was more of a ladder than a staircase. While the snow we were heading toward for our descent was soft and powdery, the route up had a somewhat different exposure, and was rather firm. A misstep here would be equivalent to an ignominious and potentially painful tumble back to our starting point. To make matters worse, whoever had created this stepladder had a much larger leg span than I, so the steps were spaced too far apart for me. I found myself having to kick a fair number of new toeholds into the snow pack.

While I struggled around the halfway mark, my companion had almost reached the top. For Bernd, of course, this was a walk in the park, while it looked like the last leg of Everest to my unfit body.

Finally, we both arrived at the top, traversed into the sun and were ready to match the nice pair of tracks that had lured us onto this slope. Here too, on the way down, I was no match for Bernd. He laid a set of turns into the snow that one could look back at and admire. I, on the other hand, was doing my first real skiing of the winter, and had not yet found my 'ski legs'. I would have liked to have an eraser to delete my tracks from the landscape, but that would have to wait for the next dump of snow.

Bernd pointed out the start of the Gatterl descent, a south-facing route that finishes in the village of Ehrwald, over 1800 vertical meters of skiing. He also spoke of the Fenster Riffelriss, a seldom-skied run from the middle station of the cog wheeled train back to the village.

"Oh, and over there is where one begins the Neue Welt (New World) descent," Bernd added, pointing to the west. "Now that run is really interesting," he said with a twinkle in his eye. "It includes a mandatory rappel and has numerous sections of 45 degrees or more, but it is too danger-

ous at this time of year. Normally, one only skis Neue Welt during the spring, in corn snow."

Such excursions and endeavors would have to wait for another time, and considering my current condition, I was relieved. Bernd, however, still had an ace up his sleeve for the following day. On tap was a visit to the village of Mittenwald and the Dammkar run, where Bernd and I were joined by one of his buddies, mountain guide Christof Schellhammer.

Both Mittenwald and the Dammkar are strange places that exist in a bizarre time warp. They are anachronisms, but although they coexist side by side, they are rooted in different centuries from each other.

Mittenwald is a Hansel and Gretel village pulled right out of a 17th century fairy tale. Narrow, cobblestone streets wind their way among ancient houses, most of which have murals depicting medieval life painted on their walls. Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, Germany's most prolific writer, referred to Mittenwald as a "living picture book" way back in 1786, and the village has not lost any of its charm since then.



Don't be intimidated. Although most of the terrain shown in this article is steep, Garmisch offers other areas for all ski / snowboard abilities.

The town is home to a lovely baroque church, and it has been famous for its violins ever since Matthias Klotz started a violinbuilding tradition way back in the 1600s. In the following century, Klotz's nephew is said to have made Mozarts concert violin here. Still today, one can see the craftsmen in their little workshops and at Mittenwald's 140-yearold violin-builders school, turning out beautiful string instruments of all sizes.

The Dammkar is also a relic of a bygone era, but its ski history goes back only as far as the last century. After World War II, it became extremely popular among the Bavarians to hike up to the top of the Dammkar and ski back down. It is hard to imagine why this particular mountain became the goal of the local skiers, as it is extremely steep and does not lend itself very well to touring. A Sunday outing on the Dammkar was definitely no stroll in the park.

Be that as it may, skiing the Dammkar became so popular that on given days as many as 500 skiers hiked up the 1300 vertical meters to the top. The long snake of people known as the Dammkar Wurm (Dammkar worm) zigzagged back and forth up the mountain on a regular basis every winter for about twenty years. Then, in 1966, the worm died a merciful death, as the Karwendelbahn was completed, rendering the hike no longer necessary.

For the rest of the century, the Dammkar attempted to compete head-to-head with the growing number of ski resorts in the Alps, without much success. After all, a mountain offering one steep and difficult descent is no match for the many larger resorts that abound in the Alps. What had flourished as a unique mountaineers' peak had transformed itself into a lift-accessed mountain with very little to offer ordinary skiers.

At the outset of the new century, however, the Dammkar took a step backward to move into the future. It trashed its winchdrawn piste machine that had attempted, with great difficulty, to keep a vague semblance of a piste prepared on this rather extreme mountain, and turned the area into a freeride mountain. Similar to La Grave in France and Alagna in Italy, the Dammkar would henceforth offer a skiing experience imported from a previous era. It was early in the season, and the rocky mountain had not accumulated enough of a base on the lower regions to open for the season, but my local friends had the connections to get us up the mountain in spite of the minimum snow cover. As we emerged from the cable car at the top, we proceeded for a ways through a long tunnel. This feature had been added to the top station in 1977, after numerous people had plummeted to their death on the initial traverse during the first years of the cable car's operation.

The current entry and beginning of the descent was also no piece of cake, but at least it avoided the treacherous traverse above exposed cliffs that had sealed the fate of a number of skiers in the '60s and '70s. There was no shortage of snow at 2244 meters, where we began trying to negotiate some difficult wind crust.

Soon, we dropped below the wind-exposed section of mountain and were greeted by fresh powder. Our bodies shifted into a smooth, rhythmic, bouncing motion. The scenery was stunning. The mountain was reminiscent of the Dolomites, as dramatic, sheer rock faces stretched upward from the rather narrow valley in which we skied. I could understand what had drawn enthusiasts from all over Bavaria to make this arduous ascent so many winters ago.

I came away from my Bavarian weekend having experienced two new mountains and having made one new friend. Bernd and I had found much common ground in our few days together—skiing, mountains and photography. Bernd had shared his favorite slice of the Bavarian Alps with me, and I came away with a clear comprehension of why my new friend photographs mountain activities and leaves the more profitable golf photography to someone else.

That someone else would not be me. I may never earn anything close to 4000 Euros for one of my ski photos, but there is no higher salary than the mere opportunity to work with something you love.

Councils serve different purposes for different clubs. Large clubs often have their own travel programs, insurance, etc. and feel they really don't need councils. Smaller clubs rely on their councils more heavily for travel options, weekend ski trips, etc. For all clubs, councils offer information and options. The individual clubs choose how much of the information filters down to their members, and how many of those options they want made available to the membership. At a minimum, most clubs offer their members the benefits made available by the council, Far West Ski Association, and the National Ski Council Federation. If you are a club member, and you haven't heard about the benefits and options available to you, inquire at your next meeting, or contact your council president or membership person directly.

Central Council is typical of many councils throughout the western United States. The council serves both large and small clubs throughout the central California area. The larger clubs in Santa Barbara, Fresno, and San Luis Obispo have excellent ski travel programs and a variety of summer options available to their members. For those clubs, Central Council is a broker of information, with a few members from each of those areas opting for a council or FWSA trip in addition to what their club is offering. The smaller clubs in Bakersfield, Exeter, and Salinas rely on council and FWSA organized ski and travel programs more heavily.

Central Council sponsors four main events every year. An early weekend of skiing at Mammoth Mountain kicks off the ski season each year. The council also sponsors the FWSA North American Ski Week held the end of January or first of February each year. In addition, there are two council-sponsored summer events: a camping weekend and leisurely float trip, and a fun-filled, fund raising weekend at the Salinas Air Show.

With only six clubs, we are a small council where it is easy to get to know everyone. Check us out as a stranger and plan to leave with many life-long friends. 
