WHO & WHAT'S NEW FOR 2015-2016

<u>Sun Valley Joins Mountain Collective:</u> Sun Valley is now part of *The Mountain Collective* along with *Alta, Snowbird, Aspen/Snowmass, Jackson Hole Mountain Resort,* Whistler/Blackcomb, Alpine Meadows, Squaw Valley, Lake Louise, Sunshine Village, and Mammoth Mountain. What a great way to change up your skiing opportunities. Passes for 2015-2016 are on sale now.

<u>Steamboat is MAXing Out:</u> A great snow experience is to be had through the *MAX Pass* which is now being offered at *Steamboat*, as well as 21 other resorts throughout the U.S. Ski or ride 5 days at each of these locations, for a total of 110 days on the mountain. You can purchase your 2015-2016 pass now. Areas included are: *Steamboat, Mt. Bachelor, Big Sky, Winter Park, Copper Mountain, Crystal Mountain, Brighton, Boreal, Las Vegas Resort and Summit at Snoqualmie,* and *Cypress Mountain* in the West; *Blue Mountain, Boyne Mountain, Boyne Highlands, Killington, Loon Mountain, Pico Mountain, Snowshoe, Stratton, Sugarloaf, Sunday River* and *Mt. Tremblant* in the East.

Colorado Skier Visits Up Mid-Season: Colorado Ski Country USA reports an increase in skier visitation in January and February. Skier visits to Colorado resorts were up by 3.7 percent during the second period of the 2014/2015 season (January 1, 2015 through February 28, 2015), compared to the same period of the prior year. "At the start of the season we set a strong pace in visitation, and that pace continued through the second period, exceeding expectations given some bouts of unseasonable weather in January," explained Melanie Mills, president and CEO, Colorado Ski Country USA. "The steady pace of skier visits speaks volumes to Colorado's reputation for having consistent, reliable snow conditions and being the top ski destination." With great spring skiing conditions all around the state, resorts are welcoming spring break visitors and guests from all over the world. "Looking ahead we're cautiously optimistic; especially since we still have a lot of ski season left. March and April are typically very snowy months in Colorado and we'd be thrilled to see this pace continue," said Mills.

Warmer Climate Creating Havoc at Ski Resorts: As New England areas confront sidewalk avalanches and digs itself out from underneath a blizzard, West Coast skiers are dealing with the opposite problem. Squaw Valley, which averaged 450 inches of snowfall per year between 2008 and 2014, has received less than a third of that amount this season, according to a February snow report. The snowpack situation is so dire there that the International Ski Federation canceled the skicross and snowboardcross World Cup two weeks before it was scheduled to launch, in early March.

Much has been made about the impact of global warming, but nowhere is it felt deeper than at ski resort towns, whose economies depend almost entirely on snowfall. If it doesn't snow, no one comes to town to ski, which means no one attends après activities, or buys groceries or gasoline, and the town loses a revenue stream it depends on. This is happening across the entire western high country.

"It's a bigger issue than, 'Oh, we can't ski,'" says Diana Madson, executive director of the non-profit *Mountain Pact*. "It's loss of jobs and major environmental degradation." The country's \$12.2 billion winter tourism industry can't survive on snow-gun slopes. Ski resorts account for 36 percent of winter tourism-related employment. In order to protect winter—and the hundreds of thousands whose livelihoods depend upon a snow-filled season—we must act now to support policies that protect our climate, and in turn, our slopes.
