Saturday morning, June 6th

GREETINGS DELEGATES!!

Welcome to the 7th Annual Far West Travel Expo. Whether you've participated in past Travel Expos or are new this year, here are some tips to help you get the most out of participating in Travel Expo.

WHAT IS TRAVEL EXPO?

Travel Expo takes place on Saturday morning of Convention. It is a forum where delegates [voting and non-voting] can meet with the ski industry [resorts, operators, and suppliers], in a pre-scheduled 10-minute appointment format. The Travel Expo is the Ski Industry's time for focused 1-on-1 time with our delegation and membership leaders. Our relationships with our Industry Partners and their participation in our Convention are invaluable. Their future participation and support is influenced by return value. In addition, the Travel Expo serves as a venue that attracts new vendors who will be willing to support our Conventions and FWSA Programs in the future. It is our goal to insure that our time with them is a positive and worthwhile experience.

SIGNING UP FOR APPOINTMENTS

These appointments are held every 10 minutes from 8:45am to 10:40am, giving you eight opportunities to meet with ski industry. We are asking that delegates take advantage of all eight opportunities. You will have opportunity to sign up for appointments on Friday night at Silent Auction as well as on Saturday morning-just before Expo starts. Each delegate will have a PASSPORT, with appointment times that match industry Sign-Up Sheets.

There will be a maximum of 4 people per appointment. In some cases, the Industry may choose to meet with fewer than 4 people. Please respect their wishes. We are asking that no one club take all four spots for any one meeting unless the Industry requests it.

Two opportunities to sign up for Travel Expo **Appointments:**

- During Silent Auction on Friday from 6:30 pm - 10:30 pm
- On Saturday morning from 8:30am 8:45am during the time prior to the start of Travel Expo.

We strongly recommend that you schedule a few resorts, at least one tour operator, and a supplier that you have not visited or used before.

Expo time should not be used for finalizing a trip already in the works. Use the time Friday night for this purpose. or schedule time with Industry later during the weekend.

Bring club BUSINESS CARDS with you to pass out to the Industry. To facilitate the meeting process, bring a ONE-PAGE CLUB PROFILE to leave with Industry. Copies should be made for each delegate to give out at every appointment. The profile should include:

Club Name, Address, Internet Address, Email, Phone President & Travel VP Contact Information # of Trips Taken Each Year Average # of Participants Per Trip Where Your Club Traveled In 2008-2009 What Trips Your Club Is Planning For 2009-2010

Remember, even if you are not your club's travel person, you are representing your club and will be bringing information and recommendations back to your board.

There will be separate instructions for those involved in the Far West Ski Bidding, the Man and Woman of the Year judging, and the FWRA meeting. These meetings are by invitation only.

For those of you who meet with **ALL EIGHT** appointments, and get all the Industry signatures on your Passport, you will be entered into a drawing for many prizes, including the



Bill Clark

Executive Director, Western SkiSport Museum



Executive Director of the historic Auburn Ski Club, Inc. Directs the Auburn Ski Club Training Center and Western SkiSport Museum on Donner Summit. The ASC Training Center is home to Alpine, Nordic and Snowboard programs and annually hosts competitions in all disciplines including the 2004 NCAA XC National Championships and the 2005 and 2009 USSA XC Junior Olympics.

Bill began skiing as a Jr. Far West racer with Auburn Ski Club and was a four-way competitor at Sierra College. Program director/head coach of the ASC Alpine program 1979-1990. Former member of the US Ski Hall of Fame selection committee, Far West Skiing Alpine and Far West Nordic board of directors. Currently a board member on the new Squaw Valley Olympic Museum Foundation working to establish a new Museum by 2012

and committee member of the 1960 50th anniversary Olympic Heritage Celebration January 8-17, 2010.

The Western SkiSport Museum www.auburnskiclub.org was founded in 1969 by the Auburn Ski Club. Its mission is to collect, preserve and exhibit the history of winter ski sports in the western United States. Featured exhibits include: Auburn Ski Club, Snowshoe Thompson; California Gold Camps and the Longboard skiers; 10th Mountain Division "Ski Troops of World War II"; Yosemite Winter Club, Sun Valley and Alta Ski Areas; U.S. Ski Team and Olympic history; Sugar Bowl, Ski Jumpers of the 1930 and 40's; Dodie Post — Olympic skier from Reno, NV; Dick "Maddog" Buek— Legendary skier from Donner Summit; Western Ski Hall of Fame; Jeff Hamilton — Auburn Ski Club skier, 150 MPH world record speed skier, 1992 Olympic Bronze medalist; U. S. Forest Service; Roy Mikkelsen — Auburn Ski Club jumper and Olympic ski jumper in 1936; Archives and library by appointment; Ski Movies dating from 1919; Publications: "The Lost Sierra — Gold, Ghosts and Skis".

Deedee Corradini

President, Women's Ski Jumping USA; former Salt Lake City Mayor



Deedee Corradini is a leader in the Olympic movement and one who is a champion of women in the events of the Winter Olympics. Her journey has not been a long one, but it is an interesting one and one which brought the Winter Olympics to the USA only for the third time.

When the selection of Salt Lake became official, she served on the Salt Lake Olympic Organizing Committee (SLOC) from 1995-2000 and in that time she was instrumental in helping to get women's bobsled and skeleton into the Olympics. She was included as a member of the USOC delegation when the Olympics came to Utah.

Deedee Corradini conducted a decade-long effort to bring the Olympics to the USA. She has spent untiring effort to bring women's events into the Olympic Winter

Games, as well as her current leadership in WJUSA. She has now directed her attention to the litigation aimed at making women's ski jumping an event in Vancouver 2010.

She is the President of Women's Jumping USA (WSJUSA) www.womensskijumping.com, continuing her campaign to get women ski jumpers into the Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver 2012 (ski jumping is the only event in the Olympic Winter Games that does not allow women—men's ski jumping has been part of the modern day Olympics since 1924). WJUSA filed suit in Vancouver to force the Vancouver Olympic Organizing Committee (VANOC) to allow women's ski jumping as an event. The FIS had already voted 114-1 in 2006 to allow a women's World Championship under its sanction, as well as inclusion in Vancouver 2010; four months later the IOC Executive Committee voted in the negative after a 5-year battle.

Born in Rhode Island, she spent her early years in Lebanon and Syria where her father was an educator at the American University of Beirut and President of two colleges in Lebanon and Syria. In those years she was fluent in French and Arabic. After returning from the Middle East, she went to high school in Maine, and completed her B.S. and M.S. at the University of Utah. Her skiing in the northeast was less than satisfactory. She served two Members of Congress as a Press Secretary and Special Assistant after her education was completed.

She returned to Salt Lake City in the 1970s, working as Assistant to the President of Snowbird Ski Resort, and there her skiing improved to its current expert level. As Mayor of Salt Lake City, she became part of the effort to bring the Olympics to Utah, losing the 1998 bid by only 3 votes, but winning the 2002 Olympic Winter Games on the first ballot, which is rarely done. She is the only woman ever to hold the office of Mayor, and served for two four year terms, from 1992-2000. She and her family are now living in Park City.

Ralf Garrison

President, The Advisory Group



Ralf has some 35 years experience in the ski resort business, which has led to his recognition as an expert on the supply-side of destination resort tourism.

In 1978, Ralf founded, and still remains co-owner of, the Mountain Travel Symposium which has grown to become the definitive annual meeting of the snow-sports travel industry.

At about the same time, Ralf founded, and still actively runs, the Central Reservations Association of Mountain Resorts.

Ralf's consulting company, The Advisory Group www.adv-grp.com, focuses on strategic marketing for destination resorts, and the related infrastructure. This has evolved over time, and included the creation of modern-day centralized reservation systems.

In his presentation, Ralf will give an overview of the state of mountain resorts and the outlook for next year which is derived from MTRIP, the Mountain Travel Research Program, his latest venture, which supplies comprehensive, industry-wide research.

This strategic information is created specifically for those management and marketing professionals who must make informed decisions in the mountain resorts industry. He will focus on making this information relevant to ski club and ski council decision makers.

Jessica Jerome

6 Time U.S. National Ski Jumping Champion



Jessica Jerome, 22, finished in sixth place at the recent World Championship. Jess has been ski jumping since age 7 and competing internationally since she was 14. She has won US National Championship titles six times (2002, 2003, 2005 and 2008) and has 19 Continental Cup podium finishes. Jessica's longest jump is 138m at Lillehammer K120 jumping hill. She is studying economics at Westminster College in Salt Lake City, working part-time and "training six days a week to be ready for 2010 in Vancouver."

Jessica, J.J., or "Baby Deer Legs" was drawn to try ski jumping at the age of 7 when the local ski jumping club came to recruit the crazy kids in elementary school. Her nick name Baby Deer Legs came from the likes of Bambi. She is a crasher!! Jessica's countless injuries include a ruptured spleen, a blown out ACL, dislocated elbow, a few concussions (maybe more but she doesn't recall), many ice facials, and enough cuts and bruises to go around. She crashes because she is persistent, and is not afraid of the aftermath. Fine qualities for an elite athlete, and ski jumper. Jessica's persistence and hard training has led her around the world, and to the

results that she has achieved...

When Jessica is not traveling, or flying through the air she likes to shred the gnar, cook, run, and hang out with her siblings. She also enjoys photography music and art.

Jessica also starred in 'Jump like a Girl' - a documentary that follows the struggles of Lindsay Van, Jessica Jerome, and their peers as they push for a women's division in ski jumping at the Olympic level. The film is a compilation of news footage, home videos, and video that chronicles over two years in the lives of Van and Jerome. The film records key moments in women's ski jumping like the first ever Continental Cup for women and a bitter battle between the International Ski Federation (FIS) and women ski jumpers over their right to ski fly (ski jumping off of a hill larger than K180).

Jessica is one of 15 plaintiffs suing the Vancouver Olympic Organizing Committee in the Supreme Court of British Columbia for women ski jumpers to be included in the 2010 Winter Olympic Games. The court hearing took place in April and the plaintiffs are awaiting the judge's decision. Ski jumping is the only sport in which women are not allowed to compete in the Winter Games.

Billy Kidd

1964 Olympic Slalom Silver Medalist



When you think of legends in American skiing the name **Billy Kidd** is at the top of the list. He became America's hero back in the 1964 Olympics when he and teammate Jimmie Heuga became the first American men to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing — a silver for Kidd and a bronze for Heuga in the slalom at Innsbruck, Austria.

Although his racing is confined mainly to the "Legends Races" now, he continues his involvement in the sport as Director of Skiing at Steamboat; TV commentator at the Olympics; Head Skiing Coach for Special Olympics as well as equipment design, books, videos and movies.

Kidd grew up in Stowe, Vermont and raced internationally for nine years on the U.S. Ski Team. While racing, he studied at the University of Colorado and graduated in 1969 with a degree in economics. After establishing his prominence in the ski world in the 1964 Olympics,

Billy marked yet another "first" for American men by becoming the first person to win both Amateur and Pro World Championships in a single year-1970. Kidd went on to win the Amateur World Championship in Val Gardena, Italy. Then Billy turned pro and two weeks later won the World Pro Championships.



Billy has made his home Steamboat Springs, Colorado since 1970 and spends much of the winter as Director of Skiing at the Steamboat Ski Area and running his Billy Kidd Performance Center. The Center features a personal "hands-on" approach, using on-slope video analysis and a Personal Skiing Profile. Billy and his coaches guarantee they'll make you a better skier.

Billy also leads Steamboat's Ute Future Olympian program, which brings Native American youngsters from Utah reservations to Steamboat, where they build self-confidence by learning to ski and snowboard. His efforts with Native American youth recently earned him the Texaco Star Regional Award.

Because his Olympic teammate and long-time friend Jimmie Heuga has MS, Kidd is also involved in fundraising for Multiple Sclerosis and is on the board of directors of the Jimmie Heuga Center for the Reanimation of the Physically Challenged.


After a lifetime of skiing Kidd still enjoys helping people ski better. Along with coaching at his camps, he hosts a free daily clinic at 1:00 on the slopes at Steamboat.

This all adds up to a total commitment to the sport of skiing. Kidd skis for enjoyment and excitement--two things that are as much a part of skiing as the name **Billy Kidd**.

Loren Kroeneke

National Winter Sports Manager, U. S. Forest Service

Loren accepted the National Winter Sports Manager position with the Forest Service in August 2008 which gives him national Forest Service policy input on a wide array issues. Issues may include ski resorts summer use criteria (S.607 Ski Area Recreational Opportunity Enhancement Act of 2009 bill introduced by Mark Udall in March 20009); winter travel management policy for motorized and non-motorized recreationists in high use/multi use areas (focus on trailhead management and development to help disperse recreationists and diffuse conflict); Alta's Flagstaff Peak ski lift avalanche control proposal; and film permit process for backcountry film shoots with

small crews (Warren Miller Entertainment a citation in January 2009 for the movie Children of Winter).

Previously as Salt Lake District Ranger for the Wasatch-Cache National Forest, Loren has been involved with issues that included Utah heli ski operator permit approval; Albion Basin motorized winter travel management plan; hazardous fuel reduction plans; and land acquisition along the Bonneville Shoreline Trail with Trust for Public Land to preserve open space, protect wildlife, and provide recreational opportunities

Loren worked at the Forest Service Holy Cross Ranger Station in Colorado as the project manager for Vail Associate's 4,000-acre expansion on public lands in the Two Elk Creek roadless area (the back bowl area south of Vail – now Blue Sky Basin) in the White River National Forest.

Loren was a 2006 nominee for Forest Service Excellence in Wilderness Stewardship Award which recognizes an employee who has made outstanding contributions to wilderness stewardship across the National Forest System over several years.

Arthur Chelton Leonard

10th Mountain Division Veteran & Skiing Enthusiast

From his beginnings as a high schooler at Reno High School Chelton Leonard was a leader. As a member of the football and Ski Team member he went on to become a Class officer and he organized the "Sierra Interscholastic Ski Federation" (which still sanctions high school meets).

Starting in 1941 Chelton entered the University of Nevada. In 1943 he was chosen to act as a double for Lou Costello in the ski movie "Hit the Ice", which involved trick skiing.



With World War II in full swing he became a volunteer inductee to the U. S. Army's 10th Mountain Division, Camp Hale, CO as a Ski Instructor, Corporal. After seeing action for three years he was separated, having had the success that lead to his promotion through the ranks to the level of 2nd Lieutenant.

The soldiers learned at Camp Hale to breath and climb to 14,000 feet using skis and snowshoes while carrying 90-pound rucksacks and heavy weapons. It was a grueling regime that built muscle and endurance, as well as character and grit. They marched more than 20 miles a day, yet there was always a lot of singing. Winter weather in the Rockies can be brutal, and the men were often cold, wet and hungry. At the end of one period of tactical training in Feb. 1944, known as the D-Series, 30 percent of the participants were recovering in the infirmary from frostbite or exhaustion.

Leonard noted the worth of the WWII mountain soldiers as opposed to the mules they used. "We were cheaper than mules," said Leonard, noting his salary was \$50 a month, compared to the \$800 a month for the upkeep of the mules.

After the war Chelton entered the University of Oregon and in 1947 began ski race training in Sun Valley, ID. In 1948 he became a member of the University of Nevada Ski Team. During his tenure at University of Nevada he became the Ski Team Coach and Staged the 1st sanctioned NCAA Intercollegiate Ski Championship, originated the "All American Ski Team", was recognized as the "Ski Coach of the Year" by the Western Winter Sports Writers, coached his team to 5th Place at the 1959 NCAA Ski Championships in Winter Park, Colorado and another 5th place finish at the 1960 NCAA Ski Championships at Bridger Bowl, Montana. From 1956-60 he served as the Secretary, NCAA Ski Rules Committee.

From 1958 to '60 Chelton served as the Assistant Sports Technical Director, 1960 Winter Olympics in Squaw Valley, CA. and as Chief Gatekeeper and as a member of the Competition Jury for Alpine Events. He was also appointed as Advisor to Nevada Governor Grant Sawyer for those Winter Olympics.

After the Olympics Chelton was appointed to the position of Executive Director, National Ski Association of America (now USSA) where he served for two years. During that time he also served the U. S. Olympic Committee as Chairman of the International Ski Competition Committee. During the decade of the '60's Chelton also served as University of Nevada, Ski Coach, as a certified official of USSA and the FIS, as Convention Director for John Ascuaga's Nugget and as Chairman, Public Relations Committee, Nevada Area Council, Boy Scouts of America.

In 1967 Chelton was recalled to the U. S. Army and served as Major and Staff Specialist. He subsequently retired from the Army as a full Colonel.

In 1975 and for the following fifteen years Chelton served as a ski instructor and Director of the Luggi Foeger Ski School at Diamond Peak, Incline Village NV.



Chelton founded the 10th Mountain Division annual biathlon race at Auburn Ski Club in 1982 which celebated the 28th anniversary of this annual race on April 19, 2009.

Chelton's other recognitions and offices held include President, Sierra Nevada Chapter, 10th Mountain Division Association, "Distinguished Service Award", 10th Mountain Division Association and Chairman, International Federation of Mountain Soldiers X CONGRESS.

In 1992 Chelton was inducted in to the University Of Nevada Athletic Hall of Fame. In 1996 he was Awarded the "Professional Achievement Award" from the University of Nevada Alumni. For three years from 1995 to 1998 he served

as Secretary General of "International Federation of Mountain Soldiers". In 2007 Chelton was Awarded the Wendell Robie Award by Auburn Ski Club for "Lifetime Outstanding Service".

Chelton's service also includes a stint as Certified Official, Chief of Race, Referee and Chief Timer for Far West Ski Association, United States Ski Association and the International Federation of Skiing. He also served on the Advisory Board for University of Nevada Ski Team and currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Western Ski Sport Museum in Donner Summit, CA., where the official records and awards are held for the Far West Ski Association.

Fred Liebel

Dave McCoy

Founder, Mammoth Mountain

A Man and His Mountain

Mammoth Mountain's founder, leader and inspiration



Dave McCoy was born in Los Angeles on August 24, 1915 to William Thomas McCoy and Edna Rachel Metcalf. Until the age of six, Dave lived a quiet life in El Segundo, California where his father worked in an oil refinery. His next nine years were spent traveling throughout California with his parents, living in various towns along California's Highway 99 while his father worked as a highway construction contractor.

In 1928, when Dave was twelve years old, his mother took him to Independence, California, a small town south of Bishop, for a visit. He instantly fell in love with the area and decided this was the place he wanted to settle.

After graduating as valedictorian of his class in the eighth grade, Dave moved to the state of Washington to live with his grandparents. During this time he often worked with his grandfather who was a supervisor in a coal mine. During his high school years, Dave traveled between California and Washington doing odd jobs to support himself while attending school in both locations. He worked on pig farms, grocery stores, grape vineyards and a variety of other places.

It was during his time in Washington that Dave was introduced to skiing by a group of Norwegian ski jumpers. Their motto was, "Just point 'em down the hill and ride!" Dave took every opportunity to hike up White Pass Mountain and ski straight down as fast as possible. His love affair with skiing had begun.

Dave graduated from Buckley High School in 1934 and instead of taking a job in the apple orchards of



Washington he set out to pursue his dreams. He hitched his way working odd jobs (picking cherries, gold mining in Sierra City and tying flies for fishing) to pay his way back to Independence. He finally arrived late in the afternoon on Labor Day in 1935 and began working that night as a dishwasher and waiter. The owner of the restaurant let him live in the garage, where he stayed for two years. Dave believes that "Some power, some force kept holding me near Mammoth."

While working in Independence, he caught his first glimpse of the woman he would eventually marry. "I was working as a soda jerk when the Bishop Cheerleaders stopped in on their way to Lone Pine

to a game. I took one look at this girl and knew she was something special. I didn't even get to ask her name."

Roma recalls telling her sister, "One day I'm going to get a date with that guy." It wasn't until two years later when Dave was living in Bishop that he was introduced to Roma. In those days, Dave and a friend would tie their skis to the back of a motorcycle and take off for the mountains. As fate would have it, Dave's friend had a sister, and when he finally introduced Dave to her, she happened to be the Bishop cheerleader he had seen two years earlier. At the time, Roma was living with her grandmother and aunt and was working to help support them. Dave and Roma dated for four years before they were married. The couple has since raised six children.

In March of 1937, Dave was asked to go to work for the Department of Water and Power (DWP) as a hydrographer. The job required collecting and interpreting data from snow surveys to predict future water supplies for Los Angeles. Dave's extensive ski experience coupled with a strong work ethic allowed him to excel in his position at the DWP where he remained for 18 years.



Dave's passion for the sport led him to skiing pioneers Tex Cushin and Corty Hill at McGee Mountain. As a member of the Eastern Sierra Ski Club, Dave helped keep the cable-sling lift maintained and running. Dave and two friends from the DWP, Sam Griggs and Ben Boyd, built the first portable rope tow in the Eastern Sierra. They took a Model "A" Ford truck, pulled the drive wheel off, locked the brake, jacked up the rear end and ran a rope up the mountain to a pulley. This "portable" rope tow allowed the club to ski anywhere in the valley from Independence to Bridgeport searching for hidden stashes of powder.

In 1941, Dave obtained a roving permit for his own portable rope tow. The Eastern Sierra Ski Club began losing interest in running

their own lifts and agreed to sell their portable rope tow to Dave for \$85. To raise funds for the equipment, he tried to borrow the money against his Harley-Davidson motorcycle but the bank refused his loan. Upon leaving the bank, the secretary was able to convince them that Dave was a good risk. Little did the bank know that the kind-hearted secretary was also Dave's soon to be wife, Roma Carriere.

His extensive knowledge of snow pack and snowmelt gleaned from his hydrography job enabled Dave to set up his lift where the snow was the best. When the weather would allow it and the roads were clear, he took his portable rope tow to Mammoth Mountain. Dave and his friends were skiing at Mammoth on December 7, 1941 when news of the bombing on Pearl Harbor reached Mammoth. The skiers packed up the rope tow and loaded it into the truck. Skiing essentially came to a halt in the Eastern Sierra and Dave considered joining the Navy with his friends even though his hydrographer position exempted him from service. Ultimately, a ski injury would take the decision out of his hands.

Dave's love of skiing led to an interest in competitive ski racing. During the late 30's he emerged as a top competitor and was something of a local racing hero. In April of 1942, Dave made a spur of the moment decision to drive to Sugar Bowl, California to compete in the state championships. During the race he took a nasty fall, shattering the bones in his left leg. The doctors counted over 38 fractures and wanted to amputate, but Dave would not allow it. It took almost four years for Dave to rehabilitate his leg. Although he still walks with a slight limp, he continues to lead a very active lifestyle.

Eventually Dave returned to his surveyor job and resumed operation of his roving rope tow. The majority of the time the rope tow was stationed at Mammoth Mountain. The Main Lodge's predecessor known as "the Snake Pit," a 12' x 24' building with a dirt floor and outside toilet, served as combination first aid station and snack bar. The Forest Service decided to put the permanent permit to operate at Mammoth Mountain up for bid but no one bid on it, including Dave, because he didn't have the money. In 1953, the Forest Service awarded Dave the permit free of charge on the condition he begin developing the mountain. He already had a thriving rope tow business and soon Mammoth was entertaining more skiers than any other California operation, including those with chairlifts.

Dave went to the bank and asked for \$135,000 to build a chairlift, add on to the existing hut and pay salaries for a year. This time the bank thought it was too much of a risk and turned him down. Walter Martinoni, who built chairs for Donner Summit and Snow Summit, had built a chair for a client who decided he didn't want it. The two

agreed that if Walter gave Dave the chair, Dave would install it himself and pay Walter as soon as he made money. Dave and a group of hard-core skiers built their own crane, dug the tower holes by hand, mixed the cement and installed the motor, brakes, clutches and drive system. Mammoth Mountain's first chairlift opened on Thanksgiving Day, 1955, just in time to meet his permit requirements. Since 1955, Dave and his crew have installed an average of one lift annually.

Dave soon relocated his family to the small community of Mammoth Lakes where he skied, ran the business and coached young racers. Coaching 19 of his team members to the United States Olympic Ski Team, including two of his own children, Dave has been one of the most successful racing coaches in ski history. Dave's coaching success helped put Mammoth on the map as a great ski area. Parents began sending their children from all over the country to ski at Mammoth under Dave's tutelage.

After building his first chairlift in 1955, Dave went on to build one of the largest ski resorts in the country. In 1986, Dave bought nearby June Mountain, ensuring the future of great skiing in the Eastern Sierra. Today Mammoth Mountain has 27 lifts, four day-lodges, four hotel properties, four restaurants, a large maintenance facility and much more. Now a four-season destination resort, Mammoth Mountain is busy during the summer months as a world-class Mountain Bike Park and Adventure Center and operates a golf course and fly fishing guide service. Dave McCoy has been called one of the last great entrepreneurs in the skiing business.

Dave's commitment to the Mammoth Lakes community never waned. When he was asked to help establish a college in the Eastern Sierra, he joined with other town leaders to introduce the nonprofit Mammoth Lakes Foundation to pursue this goal. The Eastern Sierra College Center (ESCC) opened in 1996 with seed money from the McCoy family. ESCC, a branch of Cerro Coso Community College, fulfilled the Foundation's mission to develop higher education and cultural enrichment in the area. Associate degree programs, professional and technical training as well as special interest programs are available. Long-term goals include bringing upper division courses to the school as a 4-year university and construction of student housing, a performing arts center and a 19,000 square foot campus building. Dave's tireless support contributes greatly to the success of the Foundation.

In the 1930s, Dave McCoy and his friends envisioned a bright and promising future for Mammoth. Dave took that vision and built upon it, making Mammoth an integral part of California's burgeoning tourist economy. The legendary founder of Mammoth Mountain saw Mammoth as one of North America's best-loved ski destinations, but also as an extraordinary four-season resort playground. Dave has teamed with Intrawest, the leader in mountain resort development, to bring his vision to life with Project Sierra. An estimated \$800 million master plan will see the convergence of natural beauty, exceptional resort amenities and international standards of excellence. Dave's visions are continuing to become realities this year with the opening of the Village at Mammoth and the Village Gondola.

Dana Miller

Amateur Historian, Hans Georg story

Dana Miller is an Owens Valley native from Bishop, California. He now resides in San Mateo, California located in the San Francisco Bay Area where he works as a Finish Carpenter for Peninsula Custom Homes. His grandparents Joe and Opal Miller, longtime Valley residents, were early members of the Eastern Sierra Ski Club since the mid 1930's and good friends with Hans Georg. When he passed away in 1965 they made sure that he got a proper burial and tried to send his relatives his effects but ultimately it remained in their garage until they passed away. Mr. Miller, with the help of family, friends and fellow historians, has taken up the task to assemble the volumes of files, photos, and artifacts in an effort to tell Hans' story. Hans Georg was 10th Mountain Division veteran who won a bronze star for his service in Italy in the Apennine Mountains and Po Valley. Hans also served as a ski instructor at Camp Hale for the 10th Mountain Division and was a ski instruction author. His presentation Hans Georg: A Life Carved in Snow at the 2009 International Ski History Congress marked his first effort as an amateur historian to tell the story and hopes to continue in his research and conservation.

Robin Morning

Olympian & Author – Mammoth Mountain



Robin Morning, researcher on Mammoth and principal biographer of Dave McCoy and his family. Her book "Tracks of Passion: Eastern Sierra Skiing, Dave McCoy & Mammoth Mountain" traces not only the development of Mammoth Mountain and the roles of the McCoy family in its development. It is also a history of the Eastern Sierra area and the era of ski development and related activity over many decades. This book took 10 years to write, more than 250 interviews, and thousands of pictures and clippings.

Also Robin's display "For the Love of It...Skiing, Racing & Working on Dave McCoy's Mammoth Mountain: 1955-1969" may be viewed at the Mammoth Ski Museum. This exhibit expands the story of Dave, Roma and MMSA by introducing the family of skiers,

racers and workers that build, shape and move MMSA from a one chair hill to one of the nation's most beloved ski operations by 1969.

She has been involved in a number of historical projects most recently co-chairing the International Ski History Congress 2009 with Marianne O'Connor. They planned and produced a major international event on the scale of an international championship - but in ski history. The Congress was held in Mammoth Lakes and the Mammoth Ski Museum in April 2009 in conjunction with the International Ski History Association and attracted 300 participants and authors from all over the world. This remarkable event included over 50 professional papers, several keynote speakers of world renown and many ski movies, both antique and current. Much archival information was presented in the ISHC for the first time. The intimate role of skiing in communities globally was a frequent theme. The role of skiing in the development of a national unity was highlighted in papers and on film on the recovery of Austria after WW II and of Norway after its independence. Premiered was a keynote movie on the life of Andrea Mead Lawrence, unfortunately screened the day after her death. A longboard demonstration race was held, with participation from the historians.

Robin did much of the research for Martin Forstenzer's book, "Mammoth, the Sierra Legend", and contributed many of the photos that she has uncovered in her research.

Robin co-wrote with Morten Lund and Chis I. Lizza, "The Early Days of Young Dave McCoy" which appeared in Skiing Heritage Magazine [March 2004 (First Issue), Vol. 16 No.1].

Robin's previous exhibit at the Mammoth Ski Museum was "From Independence to Chair One – The Illustrated History of Dave McCoy and Early Skiing in the Eastern Sierra." As Mammoth Mountain celebrated its 50th year, this exhibition journeys back to the days when skiers came from far and near to ski not Mammoth, but McGee. The exhibit follows Dave McCoy from his first day in Independence in 1930 up to Mammoth's opening day in 1955 – when Chair One first begins to move skiers up the mountain. Robin contributed her research and shared her unique access to Dave in this exhibit. Visitors delighted in her many never-before seen photographs and artifacts. It was an amazing walk back through time.

Here are Robin's own words from her biographical sketch.

"The owner of Mammoth Mountain Ski Area, Dave McCoy, took us under his wing along with a troop of about twenty other kids. Fantasy ruled. We lived and breathed for being on that mountain. I found a friend, Wendy Allen, who was as obsessive as I was about memorizing lyrics and the two of us almost drove the other ski racers crazy with our incessant singing.

The National Ski Team was infiltrated with ski racers from Mammoth. We raced in Europe, South America and all over the USA. I bought a nylon stringed guitar and two songbooks... Peter, Paul & Mary and Joan Baez.



In 1968 in Grenoble, France, at the Olympics I broke my leg in a downhill training run, the day before the opening ceremonies. From a bed in a French military hospital, I watched Jean Claude Killy, Nancy Green and Peggy Fleming win, but that's another story. Nancy brought me her roses. Wendy, who was also on the team, brought me chocolate. Sgt. Pepper ruled, and life was 'groovey' if you didn't think about what was really happening in the world, and that was impossible."

Most of our members are traditional downhill skiers, but we do have members whose primary ride is the snowboard. We also have members who telemark, cross-country ski and

snowshoe as a way to enjoy the white stuff. Our main connection is the love of winter, the mountain and the sport. We currently have over 70 active members, over 10 honorary members, who are all past presidents and a list of guests who have shown interest in the Club over the past several months, but have not yet made the decision to be a Club member. Most of our members are local to the Portland metropolitan area, but are spread far and wide in that region. We do have some affiliates from other Councils in California and honorary members scattered throughout Oregon and Washington.

Sandi Shaub was the Skiyente 50th Anniversary Celebration Committee Chair and Club President in 1995, 2006 and 2007. She has been a member for 15 years. Sandi has been skiing since she was 10 years old and has become an active recreational ski racer. She is a level 5 Advanced Intermediate racer and in 1991 was the national champion in her division.

In professional life, Sandi is the worldwide technical publications account manager for NACCO Materials Handling Group. She has worked there for over 30 years.

The winner receives \$200 to be donated in the winner's name to the charity of their choice.

Other FWSA Awards

FWSA SNOWSPORTS BUILDER AWARD 2009 Deedee Corradini, Women's Ski Jumping USA



Deedee Corradini is a leader in the Olympic movement and one who is a champion of women in the events of the Winter Olympics. Her journey has not been a long one, but it is an interesting one and one which brought the Winter Olympics to the USA only for the third time.

Deedee Corradini conducted a decade-long effort to bring the Olympics to the USA. As Mayor of Salt Lake City, she became part of the effort to bring the Olympics to Utah, the Utah team losing the bid for 1998 by only 3 votes, but winning the 2002 Olympic Winter Games on the first ballot, which is rarely done. She is the only woman ever to hold the office of Mayor of Salt Lake City, and served for two four year terms, from 1992-2000.

When the selection of Salt Lake became official, she served on the Salt Lake Olympic Organizing Committee (SLOC) from 1995-2000 and in that time she was instrumental in helping to get women's bobsled and skeleton into the Olympics. She was included as a member of the USOC delegation when the Olympics came to Utah.

She is the President of Women's Jumping USA (WSJUSA), continuing her campaign to get women ski jumpers into the Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver 2012 (ski jumping is the only event in the Olympic Winter Games that does not allow women—men's ski jumping has been part of the modern day Olympics since 1924). WJUSA filed suit in Vancouver to force the Vancouver Olympic Organizing Committee (VANOC) to allow women's ski jumping as an event. The FIS had already voted 114-1 in 2006 to allow a women's World Championship under its sanction, as well as inclusion in Vancouver 2010; four months later the IOC Executive Committee voted in the negative after a 5-year battle.

She has spent untiring effort to bring women's events into the Olympic Winter Games, as well as her current leadership in WJUSA. She has now directed her attention to the litigation aimed at making women's ski jumping an event in Vancouver 2010.

Board of Trustees by Steve Coxen, Chairman

The FWSA Board of Trustees has the responsibility for long range planning, insuring that the Association's corporate records are properly maintained and that timely government filings are made. In addition, the Trustees oversee the Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention, Athletic Scholarship Program, IS/Database and the Awards Program. The Trustees also recommend changes to the organizational structure and By-Laws of the Association when appropriate.

The Trustees goals for 2009 are: 1) recommend improvements to our sources of revenue and annual expenditures; 2) improve the demographics of our membership by encouraging families and younger members; 3) improve communications to club membership; 4) improve publication and communication of the important things accomplished by FWSA; and 5) establish a long range financial plan for the Athletic Scholarship Program.

Cindy Krupp took over the position of *Treasurer* from Nancy Kelly last December. Nancy had been FWSA Treasurer since 1996. She had to step down for personal reasons. Cindy has done an excellent job by providing the Association with detailed, timely, and accurate financial reporting and budget control. **Randy Lew** and **John Reinhardt**, our Tax Advisor, have prepared and timely filed our corporate tax returns.

As *FWSA Convention Chairman*, I would like to thank **Jo Simpson**, 2009 Host Council Convention Chair, and her committee of dedicated volunteers who have worked diligently for over a year to make the 2009 Convention in Reno a huge success. There are many others to thank. **Jane Wyckoff** has been instrumental in assisting Randy and Jo with operational details, **Debbi Kor** acquiring sponsorships and **Mary Olhausen** organizing the Silent Auction. The extensive list of volunteers is included in the Delegate Book on the Convention VIP page.

I would like to recognize **Eileen Sanford**, President of San Diego Council, for her work to secure the site of the 2010 Convention at the beautiful Renaissance Esmeralda Resort in Indian Wells, California, and **David Krupp**, President of Los Angeles Council and his wife **Cindy** for their discovery of the equally beautiful Pacific Palms Resort in La Puente, California, which will be the site of the 2011 Convention. **Randy Lew** is looking even farther ahead by considering sites in Utah for the 2012 Convention. We are all offering support and encouragement to **Don Anderson** to lead Intermountain Ski Council in their first opportunity to host a Convention.

John Watson, FWSA President 1971-73, took over as Chairman of the **By-laws Committee** in 2006. The Committee completed a two year project to re-write the Association's Bylaws which were approved by the delegates at the 2008 Convention. The committee continues to discuss ways to improve the Bylaws and they offer amendments to the Trustees and FWSA Board when needed.

Over five years, the *FWSA Athletic Scholarship Program* has awarded over \$18,000 in scholarships to 19 deserving junior racers. **Robb Margrave**, who provided the leadership to make this a successful program, stepped down from the committee in 2008. The Athletic Scholarship Committee is now chaired by **Dick Shawkey**. The applicants for the scholarships, which include USSA affiliated athletes competing in the FWSA geographic region in the JI, J2, and J3 age groups, were evaluated on financial need, academics, competitive achievements, community activities, and goals and desires. **John Watson** volunteered to help secure a 501(c)(3) Charitable Organization designation by the IRS. Because of John's efforts we now have the **Far West Ski Foundation** as the charity for receiving tax deductible contributions for the Athletic Scholarship Program.

The *Family & Youth Involvement Committee* is chaired by **Linda Westlund**. The committee has been responsible for short and long-range planning for family and youth involvement, with the objective of developing programs and services to welcome families and youth into our ski organizations. This committee developed policies that were implemented in 2009 at the FWSA Ski Week at Big Sky and the International Ski Trip to Bad Gastein, Austria. Children were allowed on trips for the first time in many years and the reports have been very good. We expect this program to grow in future years.

Catherine Ohl has been at the helm of the *FWSA Awards Program* since 2007. She initially set up the FWSA Awards website with email communication for nominations and electronic Awards voting. Catherine has been responsible for the publication of the FWSA Awards book at our annual Conventions since 2002. She added the Convention Awards media presentation to her responsibilities in 2008.

Nancy Ellis has the responsibility for the FWSA database and has made substantial improvements to make sure the data is accurate and timely to all functional programs that need this information. George Stewart has done a great job with the FWSA website and continues to make changes and updates at the direction of the Trustees and FWSA Board.

I would like to recognize **Randy Lew** for an outstanding job in his third year as FWSA President. Randy has worked hard to improve FWSA programs and provide valuable oversight to the Convention Committee to make the 2009 Convention in Reno a success and plan future Conventions as far out as 2012. Randy also partnered with the industry to provide outstanding venues for our Board of Directors meetings: December at **Mt. Bachelor** and April at **Mammoth Mountain**. The Mammoth meeting was held in conjunction with the annual Ski Club Appreciation Weekend, providing a great opportunity to meet with club members.

In the year ahead the Trustees plan to introduce an on-line member survey to develop information which will assist our Marketing and Sponsorship programs. We also plan to formally evaluate all of the programs of FWSA and look for ways that we can improve them to benefit our membership.

I would like to thank the Trustees Fran Long, Linda Westlund, Jane Wyckoff, Mike Sanford, Cindy Krupp and Randy Lew for their time and effort to improve our organization and thanks to Debbie Stewart for taking minutes at all of our meetings. In addition, I would like to thank the entire Board of Directors, FWSA committees and volunteers, and all council and club volunteers for their continued outstanding efforts in making the Far West Ski Association "THE VOICE OF THE WESTERN SKIER".

2007 CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION #1 – Allow children to participate in the FWSA Travel Program

WHEREAS, FWSA is a non-discriminating association and in an effort to promote increased membership and participation in FWSA.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, participants of ages 16 and above be allowed to attend all Far West travel activities. Those under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or a guardian. They must submit an additional application to be approved by the Travel Director of Ski Council. This application will include but is not limited to previous event participation – ex: Club meetings, ski races etc. Parent/Guardian liability for appropriate behavior will be enforced.

The FWSA Family & Youth Involvement Committee worked with the Travel Program staff to enact policies that allowed children to participate in the 2009 FWSA Ski Week at Big Sky and the 2009 International Ski Trip to Bad Gastein, Austria.

RESOLUTION #5 – Logo Change

WHEREAS, FWSA has indicated its move into the electronic age.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, FWSA add the web address "fwsa.org" to its logo.

The web address for FWSA has been added to the logo.

RESOLUTION #6 – Convention Travel

WHEREAS, it is very expensive to attend the Convention by yourself, especially when you are a volunteer helping out with the Convention several days in advance. We want more people involved and make it more affordable for all to attend.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, future conventions have a coordinator who is in charge of "roommate matching." Coordinator will match people up to share hotel rooms so that more people can afford to attend future conventions.

Motion passed to refer to the FWSA Convention Committee.

2006 CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTION #7 – More Visible International Travel Program

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the travel chairmen conduct short and long range travel planning with a public report released as part of the convention Delegate Handbook and the web page. Secondly, that notice of all trips be posted on the web site two weeks prior to sign-ups, emails sent to all clubs, presidents, and VP's of travel. No sign-ups accepted prior to this notification period..

Referred to the FWSA Board of Directors, the VP of North American Travel, and the VP of International Travel. International trips are announced two weeks prior to accepting sign-ups.

Bylaws Committee by John Watson, Chairman

The committee completed its work on streamlining the bylaws in 2008, but work remains on tidying up this task and creating a smooth Operations Handbook. Your committee consisted of Bob Ellis, Robb Margrave, George Kish and John Watson. The bylaws are now posted on the FWSA web pages.

Actions in 2008-2009. Subsequent to the passage of the new bylaws, we identified further actions in summer 2008, to wit:

- Have the bylaws reviewed by an attorney with nonprofit experience
- Determine the need for any cosmetic changes to Article 3 or in Section 7.4; we will get a copy of the Association's Articles of Incorporation to see if there is wording in them which affect any addition to the bylaws
- Review the adequacy of the bylaws sections dealing with finances
- Review any impacts of our deposit strategies and FDIC coverage (remember that this was suggested on 8 June)
- Get a letter of review from one of more of our insurance carriers.

We obtained copies of both the 1939 and 1983 Articles of Incorporation of FWSA and compared the text related to tax status and the language in the new bylaws. There were suggestions that paragraphs 1.3 and 7.4 needed further explicit reference to our 501c7 status and that in the event of dissolution further reference needed to be made to a recipient foundation (501c3). The delegates authorized in the basic amendment motion such cosmetic changes be made as to satisfy State of California requirements for paragraphs 1.3 and 7.4. We found these paragraphs to be adequate in the new bylaws, but just to make sure we have proposed clarifying amendments for 2009 (see accompanying broadside). A review of FWSA finances has shown a very professional approach to the issue of FDIC coverage in the event of bank failure.

Further action. We may be able to improve on the paragraphs dealing with finances. And we intend to review our bylaws, Articles and the accompanying Ops Handbook with a suitable pro bono attorney. No insurance carrier has been contacted. The committee intends to remain alert to further needed changes to the bylaws and to complete submission to the State of California. Bylaws are like golf; one never *wins*.

A new committee will be necessary to do the work on the Handbook, and a 2010 target should be adopted for the report back to the delegates.

Bylaws Amendments submitted for 2009. <u>Amendment One.</u> Alternate Council Representative on FWSA Board of Directors Added section

5.2.4 The FWSA President may authorize under circumstances of health or emergency an alternate council representative to attend a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors. The alternate representative shall be designated by the Council and approved by the FWSA President.

Added sentence at end of section

5.4 Requirements for action

5.4.1 Action by the Board of Directors or the Board of Trustees shall require an affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors and/or Trustees present at a meeting. Such vote shall include alternate representatives from councils as allowed in section 5.2.4.

Note. The following criteria will be inserted into the policy section of the Operations Handbook by the Board of Directors should this amendment pass.

Council Presidents may request a voting alternate representative based on medical or health issues, family or job emergencies, or death of a family member. Such alternate shall be current on council matters and fully capable of representing the council on matters which may come before the Board of Directors.

<u>Amendment Two</u>. Clarification items regarding corporate tax status. These paragraph changes were authorized by the main adoption motion of 8 June 2008 for the bylaws overhaul to include reporting back to the delegates in 2009. Changes are added tax code statements and do not alter the operating status of FWSA and further clarify distribution of FWSA assets in the event of dissolution.

1.0 ORGANIZATION

1.3 **AUTONOMY**. Far West Ski Association is an autonomous non-profit California corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of California and operating under section 501(c) 7 of the IRS Code

7.0 DISSOLUTION OF THIS CORPORATION

7.4 It is expressly understood that this organization is a non-profit corporation, organized under the non-profit Corporation Laws of the State of California, and upon dissolution, none of its assets shall inure to the benefit of any individual Member but shall be distributed to the Far West Ski Foundation or to such other fund or foundation operating under section 501(c)3 of the IRS Code and as designated by the Board of Directors, whose property is dedicated to the exempt purposes as are specified in the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

Athletic Scholarship Committee by Dick Shawkey, Athletic Scholarship Chair

The Far West Ski Association's Athletic Scholarship Program is into its fifth year. The program was established in 2004 as a means of giving back to our sport by making a positive contribution to junior racing. United States Ski Association licensed junior racers in the J-1, J-2, and J-3 classes in states represented by FWSA affiliated councils are eligible for a scholarship. This year, junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico, Idaho and Utah will be eligible. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need, competitive accomplishments, academics, and citizenship.

National ranking in competitive skiing can cost in excess of \$10,000 per season; a financial challenge to even upper middle class families. In 2008, seven junior racers, 2 women and 5 men, from California, Arizona, Oregon and Washington received scholarships of \$600 to \$1000. This year, announcements were sent to over 40 ski teams/foundations including for the first time teams in Idaho and Utah. Approximately 1183 racers (686 boys and 497 girls) in these states are eligible. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will more than double.

In 2008, the program set a record of \$8400 through its raffles and auctions. This year we've set a goal of \$9000 which will permit us to serve up to ten racers. The raffle for a Karbon ski outfit raised \$3000 at the Big Sky awards banquet in January. We recently made an arrangement whereby the scholarship committee will award the Erin Nicole grant on behalf of Portland's Skiyenti Ski Club, and we also want to thank the Far West Racing Association for their continued support. Thanks to our sponsors we have many great prizes for our convention auctions and raffle:

Auction: the Whitefish Mountain Resort has provided a five day ski and stay package (five nights lodging and five day lift tickets) for two; a chance to experience 2353 vertical feet with over 90 runs and exciting bowl and tree skiing.

Silent auction: three nights lodging (room and tax) for two at Grouse Mountain Lodge valid for one year from the date of issue. Package includes daily breakfast vouchers and a voucher for the Montana Adventure Company valued at \$130 that can be used for one day of skiing, a round of golf at Whitefish Lake Golf Course or a massage Remedies Day Spa.

Raffle: Canada Mountain Holidays has provided a three-day summer Heli-Hiking trip for two. One of "50 Tours of a Lifetime" featured in National Geographics' Traveler magazine, package includes 2.5 days of Heli-Hiking, all helo flights, accommodations, meals and guiding.

FWSA councils and others have donated many exciting basket gifts and a three day ski and lodging package from the Ogden Community Visitor's Bureau (includes lift tickets for Powder Mountain and Snow Basin, breakfast and ski shuttle) as consolation prizes for the raffle.

This year we have a new and special arrangement that will appeal to contributors. Far West Ski Foundation, an IRS 501(c)3 charitable foundation, has been incorporated into the FWSA. The foundation qualifies contributions to the scholarship program as income tax charitable deductions.

FWSA Athletic Scholarship - 2008 Winners



Madison, age 12, the daughter of Liz and George Gumerman, attends the Montessori School of Flagstaff. She has been training with the Flagstaff Alpine and Snowboard Team since she was six years old, and during this last winter, she completed her fourth year as a J-4 ski racer. Madison is recognized by her coaches as a gifted, natural skier who has demonstrated solid sportsmanship and dedication to her sport. During the 2007-2008 season, she had four top five finishes in Slalom, one top 5 in Giant Slalom

and a 10th and 15th in Super G. Her solid record qualified her for the regional J-4 Junior Olympics. In 2008-2009, her first year as a J-3, Madison finished 34th nationally in Slalom, and 23rd and 25th in the Rocky Mountain Division in Downhill and Giant Slalom respectively.



This is the fourth season that the FWSA has provided financial assistance to Anton Hilts, a 2008 Summit High School, Bend, OR, graduate. The FWSA scholarship committee first recognized Anton's talent and potential when he was 14 years old. In 2007, he was the overall champion in the United States Ski Association's Western Regional Championships, and last season he won four technical races (Slalom and Giant Slalom) and came in second in a Canadian Super G race. Anton plans to devote the 2008-2009 season to improving his points standing before entering college. Anton's final numbers for 2008-2009 showed no improvement over his last season.



Macaulay, age 16, the son of Dave and Tami Lyon, attends Woodinville High School and trains with Team Lyon Alpine Race Club. Despite a disabling injury as a J-5 that plagued him through his J-4 and J-3 years, Macaulay always managed to bounce back. As a second year J-3, he was named to the Pacific Northwest Ski Association Junior Olympic Championship Team, and he finished 16th overall at that year's regional Junior Olympics. During the 2007-2008 season, Macaulay continued to show great promise with solid finishes the J-2 FIS (International Ski Federation) race where he finished 32nd in the second Downhill race with the sixth fastest time out of twenty-five racers from the Pacific Northwest. He subsequently was invited to compete in FIS events that included racers from the U.S. and Canadian ski teams. Despite a poor start position, he managed to place 58th. As one of his coaches, Jason Petek, noted, "Macaulay is the type of skier that makes

you realize that some people are actually born to ski....Mac has a gift that needs our region's support to fully cultivate." The FWSA Scholarship Committee agrees with that assessment. Macaulay aspires to one day join the U.S. Ski Team. Macaulay finished the 2008-2009 season nationally ranked 31st in Downhill



Dylan Murtha, age 14, the son of Greg Murtha, is a freshman at the Sugar Bowl Academy. Over the last three years, Dylan has been a top competitor in the United States Ski and Snowboard (USSA) sanctioned alpine ski competition. In 2006, he was named to the USSA Far West Development team and was awarded a \$2000 scholarship to participate in a two week Slalom and Giant Slalom training camp in New Zealand. More recently, he was one of only five first year J-3s to qualify for the Western Regional Junior Olympics. In Downhill, Dylan is ranked fifth in the U.S. for first year J-3s and twenty-first for all J-3s. In addition, Dylan maintains a 3.8 average at the Sugar Bowl Academy, and the Sugar Bowl Ski Team has awarded him the Gold Academic Excellence award for the last two academic years. For the 2008-2009 season, Dylan finished number one in the nation for J-

3s in Giant Slalom. He also was 10th nationally in Downhill and Super G, and 17th nationally for Slalom.

Carl Noges, age 17, the son of Joni Noges, attends Chrysalis High School and trains with the Crystal Mountain Alpine Cub (CMAC). Last season, Carl scored top five in four Super G races, including a first place at the Western Regional JR Championship, and an eleventh and a sixth place in the FIS (International Ski Federation) Downhill race at Apex Ski Resort in Canada. In March 2008, he also placed top 15 at the National Junior Olympics at Aspen, CO. According to Alan Lauba, CMAC Director, Carl is positioned to become one of the top skiers in the U.S. In addition, he maintains a 3.9 GPA in school despite a heavy training and competition schedule. Carl finished the 2008-2009 season nationally ranked 5th in Super G and 6th in Downhill.



Jake Perkins, age 16, the son of Chris and Tammie Perkins, attends Truckee High School and trains with the Squaw Valley Ski Team. His coach, Greg Jones, has praised him for his positive attitude, intensity and work ethic. In 2007, Jake received the Bobby Mehrhof Award as the most outstanding J-3 athlete. He also won the gold medal for Giant Slalom at the J-3 Junior Olympics at Mammoth, CA. This year, he was named to the Far West Ski Team, and he qualified for the U.S. Junior Nationals at Aspen. Jake finished the 2008-2009 season nationally ranked 17th in Downhill and 20th in Super G for the men's J-1 class.



Jordan Schweitzer, the daughter of Todd Schweitzer, is a freshman at Summit High School. Her coach, Nils Ericksson, has praised her for her positive attitude and dedication. Her hard work has contributed to her achieving national ranking (as a J-3 level racer) in the top ten in all four alpine disciplines. Her greatest achievement was placing 5th in the Super G in last season's Western Regional Junior 3 Olympics in Boise, ID. Jordan finished the 2008-2009 season number one among J-3 women for the Pacific Northwest Division. She is nationally ranked 4th in Super G, 7th in Downhill, 10 in Slalom and 14th in Giant Slalom.

Research shows that there is an overwhelming consensus among Special Olympics athletes, coaches and family members that there is significant

improvement in athletes' sense of self, social skills, and social interactions due to their participation in Special Olympics. Parents see health benefits that are critical, given the unmet health needs of people with intellectual disabilities.

The <u>Heuga Center</u> helps people with multiple sclerosis gain health and hope. One in 750 people has multiple sclerosis, a devastating, neurological disease in which a person's immune system attacks the brain and spinal cord. There is no known cause or cure for MS. <u>The Heuga Center is</u> dedicated to improving the lives of people and families living with MS through its interactive, educational programs unique to any in the world. All of the Heuga Center's programs are based on the philosophy that you can have a chronic condition AND have your health. By drawing on a wide range of medical professionals and focusing on all aspects of health - exercise, nutrition, social support and disease management - The Heuga Center helps people with MS learn how to live healthier, happier, more active lives. Programs take place at sites throughout the United States of America offering Wounded Warriors the opportunity to integrate as participants and mentors in their home communities.

Huge numbers of **Wounded Warriors** are returning home to our FWSA communities. Some of our councils and clubs are already involved, in one way or another, helping our disabled vets, who lost so much in Iraq or Afghanistan.

Industry Marketing by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing & Mary Olhausen, Silent Auction Coordinator

Responsibilities for the Industry Marketing program include: producing the Silent Auction, sponsorship development, serving on the Convention Committee, and promoting advertising sales for the *Far West Skier's Guide*. Debbi Kor, FWSA Vice President of Marketing, is responsible for the membership benefits program and product sponsorship development. Mary Olhausen is Chairman of the annual Silent Auction and Travel Expo. Leigh Gieringer is Editor of the *Far West Skier's Guide*.

The ski industry invested over \$175,000 this year in Association industry programs (does not include travel program sponsorships): Silent Auction Donations Value (\$80,000), Convention Sponsorships (\$18,500 cash and \$8,000 trade-out value in certificates and major product donations). Advertising for the 2008-09 Far West Skier's Guide is \$60,000.

Silent Auction

In 2009, we not only celebrated the 79th Anniversary of the Founding of the Far West Ski Association, but also the 24th Anniversary of the FWSA Silent Auction. The FWSA truly values the working relationship our Association has developed with the ski and sports industries. **During the past 24 years, the Association has received over \$1,928,000 in Silent Auction donations to generate revenue to support its programs.**Countless hours have been spent by dedicated ski club, council and FWSA volunteers, who assist with conducting a successful Silent Auction every year.

The Silent Auction began back in 1986 at the Irvine Hilton and Towers, when the Balboa Ski Club of Orange Council of Ski Clubs, host for the 54th Annual Convention, organized the event as a fundraiser to be held in conjunction with the Convention. In 1990 the *Travel Carousel* was added to the industry Convention programs at the 58th Annual Convention, hosted by the Orange Council of Ski Clubs, when the Association returned to the Irvine Hilton. The format remained the same until the 2003 Convention held at the Rancho Las Palmas Marriott in Rancho Mirage, California, hosted by the San Diego Ski Club Council. The Travel Carousel became the *Travel Expo*, and *Passports* replaced the Lift Tickets. Convention delegates now schedule appointments with industry representatives, and travel from table to table in a timed sequence. Each year we look forward to seeing our industry friends at our Annual Convention, some of whom have attended for many years, and others who are new to our program.

The Silent Auction is the Association's major fund raising effort and not only provides financial support for our programs, but also subsidizes delegate fees to the Convention. The Silent Auction and Travel Expo would not be possible without the assistance of many special people – many thanks goes to this year's Host Council Chairperson, Jo Simpson, from Sierra Council and all the many volunteers who do all the behind the scenes work and setup. 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International Travel by Norman Azevedo, VP

FWSA STARTED THIS PAST YEAR GOING TO GREECE AND TURKEY

Our Greek Isles and Turkey tour started on October 1st for a two and half week adventure in the Greek Isles followed by a week in Turkey. We landed in Athens, then sailed overnight to Rhodes. We visited the Palace of the Knights, Basilica and other historic sites. We ferried for a day to the picturesque town of Lindos and experienced the night life of Arhangellos.

From Rhodes we flew to Heraklion, Crete; where we toured the Minoan Palace of Knossos; Vathipetro, Peza and Thrapsanos; wine tasted; and danced with Zorba the Greek at Arolithos. From Crete we took a high speed boat to Santorini, the ancient volcano island. We toured the ancient acrotiri excavations, took a donkey ride, boat ride and spent an evening at Fira with a view of the caldera. From Santorini we flew to Athens, where we visited the Acropolis, National Archeological Museum, and the old town "the plaka area."

From Athens many of us moved on to Turkey and the rest flew home. We flew to Samos and took a short ferry ride to Kusadasi, Turkey. We toured Ephesus, visited the archaeological museum of Selcuk, the Basilica of St. John and the Virgin Mary house. We then moved on to Izmir. At Pergamum we visited the acropolis perched 1000 feet above the town of Bergama. Its ruins included the Alter of Zeus and the temples of Trajan and Dionysus. From there we went to Asklepion, the earliest health center of Asia Minor; and the Red Basilica. From here we bussed to Canakkale for a short stay.

Next, we toured Troy, the legendary city-state of Homer's Iliad. The first excavations were made by German archaeologist Heinrich Schleimann in 1871 and revealed that Troy was not just a myth. From there we ferried across the Dardanelles to Istanbul.

We saw the legendary Blue Mosque, named after the beautiful blue Iznik tiles that cover its walls, and St. Sophia. Then off to visit the Suleymaniye Mosque, built in the 16th Century for Suleiman the Magnificent; and Topaki Palace, legendary residence of the Ottoman Sultans. We couldn't leave Istanbul without a visit to the world famous Egyptian Bazaar used as a spice market since 1665, and a cruise around the Bosphorous. Sites along the way included the 15th century Rumelihisar fortress, the fishing village of the Sariyer close to the Black Sea, and the Beylerbeyi Palace, the summer residence of Ottoman Sultans with original furniture and gardens. Finally we had to home. The consensus was that Istanbul was unforgettable and we needed more time.

FAR WEST SKIED THE AUSTRIAN ALPS THIS WINTER....

We went to Bad Gastein, Austria for a ski week starting February 27, 2009. This was our first international trip that included participants under 18 years of age. It was a resounding success, meeting our objective of providing more family oriented programs.

Bad Gastein is a charming historical town with mountains rising on three sides and the Gastein Valley stretching across the other. A waterfall flows through the heart of town. Castle like hotels clung to forested hills. It's known as one of Europe's leading ski and snowboard centers. We stayed in the heart of the town at the Elizabethpark hotel. The hotel food and accommodations were excellent. Many of our participants took our day tours to places like Salzburg, Venice, Kitzbuhel, and Innsbruck.

After Bad Gastein, we continued on to Munich and Prague. Munich's city center is very compact, making it easy to tour the city on foot. Most of the landmarks, like the <u>Frauenkirche</u> and the <u>New Town Hall</u> are found in the historic center. From Munich we bussed to Prague, where we stayed at the Ametyst Hotel. It's the only central European capital to escape the bombs of World War II and it's one of Europe's best preserved cities. It's filled

with Art Nouveau facades and brews the best beer in Europe. Traveling in Prague is like traveling in Western Europe 15 years ago. After Prague we flew back home.

The educational seminars will be offered only at the FWSA Annual Convention or the National Ski Council Federation. They will be presented by qualified and recognized professionals in the industry or related industries and approved by the FWSA Educational Development Committee.

How to make new members feel welcome...

When new members join your association some will have no problems getting involved. However others may be unsure about what to do or not very keen to turn up at an event and walk into a room full of strangers.

So what steps can you make to new members feel welcome and involved?

A strategic approach would be to introduce an 'orientation' objective into your membership development plan, one that sets out an agreed schedule of contact which gives new members guidance on how to meet their initial expectations and achieve a sense of value. Alternatively you could simply look at a list of welcoming ideas and try out those you feel would suit your association!

In this article I will cover both approaches.

A strategic approach to orientation

Having a systematic approach to making new members feel welcome using a schedule of contact will ensure consistency and momentum. The schedule should be a carefully planned, timely and relevant flow of materials and invitations, blended with conversations with other members to educate and involve them quickly. Here is a sample five step schedule of contact:

- Step 1: Acknowledge receipt of their application form within a day. Send them an email or thank you note that you have received their application. Let them know what is happening next and how long it will take to process. This sets the tone for your relationship and makes you look highly responsive to members
- Step 2: Send them a welcome pack. There are many things you could include, so be careful not to overwhelm them. For a list of 20 different types of items to include see the file on New Member Welcome Pack. You might want to consider either staggering your dispatch, sending parts electronically, pointing them to your web site for more information or sending them a list of what is available and ask them to indicate what they would like sent next on a request for information form. Alternatively this form could be sent out in step 1 above, so the pack that arrives contains exactly what they need.
- Step 3: After they have had chance to look over the pack, have someone telephone them and personally welcome them. Also:
 - 1. Check their contact details are correct because there is nothing more annoying that having your name and contact details incorrect.
 - 2. Identify what they expect. Why did they join? It is important to recognize what type of member they are in order to understand what they will value from the association. Extensive research into 100,000 members of associations shows that they will fall into nine different categories, so it is important to understand their personal needs.
 - 3. You also need to check their perceptions are correct regarding what they expect out of the association and adjust any misunderstandings early on. This is also an important step if they joined by direct mail and have had no personal contact.
 - 4. Help them understand how to take advantage of the association. Use the call to help create awareness for undiscovered benefits.
 - 5. Gently encourage them to participate. For example, connect them with someone with the same interests or invite them to an event.

Be sure you set the ground rules. Schedule a time for the call and let the member know how long it will take. I would suggest 10 minutes maximum.

- Step 4: Call every new member after six months to check up that they have got value out of their membership. Reconfirm what they want. Let them know their opinions and ideas are welcome and tell them about this month's events and if they have not yet started to engage, suggest ways and encourage them to get involved according to their interests. Use a coupon with an expiration date to encourage them to try an event.
- Other ideas
- 1. **Identify the five most common thing new members do** in the first six months. After three months check to see who has done less than one of these items on the list and then put effort behind encouraging this group to get involved. You might want to set an objective to have a certain percentage of new members engaged in at least two of these activities within six months.
- 2. Encourage networking. Use **icebreakers** at the start of each event to give people explicit permission to talk to a stranger. Introduce a **buddying or mentoring system**. Train people in how to network. Networking is an important personal and business skill that they forgot to teach us at school. Help or train people in how to remember everyone's name and put photographs in members' directories. Use name tags for all new and old members.

- 3. Hold **special events for new members**. Have a special new member session before the start of events so new people can meet other new people and introduce committee members. If members are geographically dispersed have a new member teleconference session. The technology to do this is very easy. Alternatively set up a special new member newsgroup on your web site.
- 4. **Promote them**. Send a list of new members out to local groups and if they haven't attended the first few meetings have someone call them to encourage them to come along. **Have a new member column in your newsletter** or on your web site. Use their photograph, highlight their professional and personal interests and ask them to put down a sentence of who they would be interested in connecting with. Put special ribbons or stickers on their name badges and ask existing members to go out of their way to make a new member feel welcome. Have a new member slot at meetings and give new members a minute to speak and introduce themselves. Some might not want to do this so, make it optional.
- 5. **Set up a special 'Orientation Committee'** to focus on looking after new members. For example, they could design an information sheet for newcomers attending a convention on what to bring and wear.
- 6. Have a 'Give & Get' notice board at all events. This is for people to add post-it notes to highlight what they have to give to another member and what they are looking for. It is a great place for people who don't know anyone to stand at an event and helps connect people who can help.
- 7. Acknowledge recruiters. Thank people who introduced new members and reward them with a thank you at meetings. This will encourage them to help them make sure their contacts are happy with your association.

New members represent an important group for two reasons. Their first year is the best opportunity to lay the foundation for long-term loyalty and the year that most members are likely to leave because the passive members will have a perception of little value.

So you need to develop a range of engaging strategies and tactics to ensure that their expectations are fulfilled, otherwise you might lose them. Finally do not leave it for ten months to find out if a new member is happy because by then it will be too late. They often make a decision not to renew months before the renewal notice arrives!

Special guests included: John Aalberg (1992 & 1994 Nordic Olympian, Director Nordic Sports & Whistler Olympic Park of Vancouver Olympic Committee for the 2010 Olympic & Paralympic Winter Games), Ed Bronsdon (Executive Director Outdoors For All), Rob Iwamoto (Forest Supervisor Mt Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest), Billy Kidd (1964 Olympic Silver Slalom Medalist), Harry Leonard & Jerry Simon (Inventors of The Ski Shows), Rich Marriott (King-5 meteorologist & cofounder Northwest Avalanche Center), Robin Morning (1964 Olympian & author), and Karl Stingl (10th Mountain Division - Mt Rainier Chapter President - 87-HQ-1).

The Multimedia Show included videos/slideshows from John Aalberg of the upcoming 2010 Winter Olympic Games www.vancouver2010.com "Celebrate The Possible" and the development process of the \$120 million Nordic Center.

The Leadership Info Panel Sessions included Club/Council Awards, Public Affairs, Volunteerism, Charities/Our Communities plus two new Snowsports Leadership Academy sessions Module 1: I'm Elected, Now What and Module 2: Now That You Have Them, How Do You Keep Them. Scott Bowker (FWSA VP Public Affairs) led the Public Affairs sessions with guest speakers (see 1st paragraph above for bios) John Aalberg, Rob Iwamoto, Rich Marriott, Robin Morning and Karl Stingl. The wide ranging discussions covered USFS approval of the use of reclaimed wastewater by AZ Snowbowl to make artificial snow and subsequent challenge by the Navajo Nation which is the first major legal challenge to the 1993 Religious Freedom Restoration Act that could ultimately set a Supreme Court precedent using the sacred site argument. Other topics included USFS advertising directive encouraging resorts to partner with sponsors to promote public service messages, USFS Planning Rule changes, environmental impact of resort development, weather forecasting, avalanche awareness, and 10th Mountain Division history. Karl Stingl shared his poignant experience in the 10th Mountain Division of being pinned underneath a Jeep that flipped over from shellfire and broke his shoulder blade during the World War II battle for Castel D'Aiano (the same battle where U.S. Senator Robert Dole was wounded) and then having to crawl off the stretcher which was too high even though it was only a few inches off the ground when more shells starting coming in.

Mary Azevedo (FWSA The Councilman Editor), Karen Davis (FWSA VP Communications) & Fran Long (FWSA VP Council Services) led Club/Council Awards session in a discussion about negotiating award entry & judging process plus content/layout of a competitive winning publication. Sigrid Noack (chair of FWSA Charities/Our Community Committee) led Volunteerism, Charities/Our Community session with guest speaker Ed Bronsdon (Executive Director Outdoors For All) in a review of how FWSA and its councils and clubs involve themselves in their respective communities and a sharing of ideas on how to increase that support and involvement plus discussion of the Outdoors For All disabled sports organization.

John Watson (Past FWSA President) led the Module 1: I'm Elected, Now What session in an overview of the Snowsports Leadership Academy program, introduction of modules, officer responsibilities, types of clubs, leadership, mission statement, club programs, meetings, financial management, record keeping, and resources. Barbara Bryant (FWSA VP Membership), Harry Davis (Past FWSA President) & Diane Stearley (New Mexico Ski Council President) led the Module 2: Now That You Have Them, How Do You Keep Them session which covered membership recruiting, virtual clubs, communications, effective use of the various media formats, how to promote your club, you can make the difference and making new members feel welcome.

FWSA History Committee Meeting

The FWSA History Committee met on Friday at the convention. The committee's focus is to ensure the rich history of the development of snowsports in the western U.S. and the contributions to it by the FWSA are recognized and preserved. Discussions included a review of the new FWSA Club & Council History recognition program, effective history interview questions, and the International Ski History Congress "From Skiing to Snow-Sport: Cultures, Images, and Adventures" (3/29-4/3/09 at Mammoth Lakes, CA). Area Development

Area development covers ski area expansion and enhancement, proposed new areas, and the preservation of potential areas for future snowsports. It also includes the increasingly contentious debates between the developers, the ski areas and the environmentalists.

Arizona Snowbowl. On 1/5/09 the Navajo Nation and its allies filed an appeal of Arizona Snowbowl snowmaking case with the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the 9th U.S. Circuit Court decision of August 2008 which ruled in favor of Arizona Snowbowl. The appeal focuses on what constitutes a substantial burden on the exercise of religion. The decision whether or not the Supreme Court will hear the case moved forward with the case being distributed for conference on 6/4/09. Four justices must vote to agree to review the merits of the case (grant certiorari) before the case can proceed to the full Supreme Court. Typically only about 1% of these petitions for cert are granted. On 8/8/08 an 11 member en banc 9th U.S. Circuit Court panel in an 118 page decision ruled (8-3) in favor of Arizona Snowbowl based on a December 2007 rehearing of oral arguments for the Arizona Snowbowl snowmaking case. Judge Carlos Bea, writing for the majority said "A government action that decreases the spirituality, the fervor, or the satisfaction with which a believer practices his religion is not what Congress has labeled a substantial burden . . . on the free exercise of religious freedom. Were it otherwise, any action the federal government were to take, including action on its own land, would be subject to the personalized oversight of millions of citizens. Each citizen would hold an individual veto to prohibit the government action solely because it offends his religious beliefs, sensibilities, or tastes, or fails to satisfy his religious desires. Further, giving one religious sect a veto over the use of public park land would deprive others of the right to use what is, by definition, land that belongs to everyone. ... Respecting religious credos is one thing; requiring the government to change its conduct to avoid any perceived slight to them is quite another." This latest decision overturned the previous 3/12/07 9th U.S. Circuit Court three judge panel decision where Judge William Fletcher reversed U.S. District Court Judge Paul Rosenblatt's decision that Forest Service met all procedural requirements for approval of facility upgrades at Arizona Snowbowl and use of reclaimed wastewater to make artificial snow. District Court Judge Rosenblatt had concluded that the goal of providing a reliable ski season was consistent with the Forest Service's multiple-use mandate. This case is one of the first legal challenges to the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 using the sacred site argument. This case sets an important precedent which extends American Indians the right to practice their religion in a way and to an extent the federal government deems appropriate and adequate on public lands (not Indian reservations) instead of protecting American Indians' religious rights as they themselves define those rights and the necessary circumstances for practicing their religions. This

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- precedent could have a far-reaching negative impact on the current statutory multiple use doctrine (Federal Land Policy & Management Act) on federal lands with snowsports as a compelling use and potentially affect activity in a wide variety of locations including recreational areas such as ski resorts since about 60% of annual U.S. skier/snowboarder visits occur at ski areas on National Forest System lands. - Bearfire Resort (Glacier Peak Mountain), planned Texas outdoor ski and snowboard resort in Dallas/Fort Worth area is scheduled to open in the fall of 2009. Bearfire Mountain is to be a 25 story mountain with Snowflex material that has 650,000 square feet skiable area on a 50 acre outdoor complex with chairlifts, half pipes, hotel, convention center, spa, tubing hill, and ice skating rink. www.bearfireresort.com
- Big Sky Resort, MT received \$68 million loan in September 2008 from CNL Lifestyle Properties with an option to purchase Big Sky from Boyne Resorts for \$74 million within the next two years. With this triple net lease CNL will enter into a long term lease in September 2010 for Boyne Resorts to operate Big Sky Resort and provide Boyne with a buy back option. Boyne Resorts operates 7 other properties for CNL Lifestyle (Brighton Ski Resort, UT; Cypress Mountain, BC, CAN; The Summit at Snoqualmie, WA; Loon Mountain Resort, NH; Sugarloaf, ME; Sunday River Resort, ME; Gatlinburg Sky Lift, TN)
- Liberty Mountain Snowflex Center in Lynchburg, VA is progessing on construction with the first set of Snowflex tiles being laid down in May 2009. This 110 vertical foot artificial year round snowsports incline will be the first in the U.S. surfaced with Snowflex, a synthetic material designed to simulate snow. Liberty Mountain with 40,537 square feet of skiable area will include a main ski slope, a beginner slope for ski and snowboard instruction, jumps, a tabletop, a big kicker, an 11-foot high quarter pipe, two grind rails and a tube chute. www.liberty.edu/snowflex
- Morgan Hill Snowflex Center is expected to open in April, 2010 in Morgan Hill, CA. It will have a 600 ft long main slope with a total skiable area of about 61,000 square feet. Expected features include three jumps (a tabletop and kicker and a high rollers jumps), 11-foot high elliptical quarter pipe with hip grind rails (flat box, down-flat-down, and up-flat-down), cornice drop off, bowl counter slope, intermediate areas (blue/green/red runs), extreme tube chute, ski lodge, other possible jibbing features, and a nursery slope. Environmental Impact Report planning is in progress as of February 2009.

- Okanogon-Wenatchee & Colville National Forests, WA. Forest plan revision (recreation use included in revision topics) EIS. Currently developing proposal. Draft to be released March 2010. - Revelstoke Mountain Resort (Revelstoke, BC Canada) extended its gondola from the upper village to the village base giving it the longest lift served vertical in North America of 5,620 feet. This new resort opened in December 2007 and now has an 8 person gondola and two high speed quad chairlifts servicing 3,031 acres of skiing and 40 ski runs. Ultimately, the mountain is expected to have over 20 lifts and more than 100 runs. www.revelstokemountainresort.com
- Stevens Pass, WA. Master development plan. Scoping letter June 2008, Environmental analysis decision Phase 1 Projects (water treatment system upgrade, 5 bike trails) expected June 2009, implementation July 2009. Mt. - Wedge Adventure Resort, 120 foot high, 500 feet long Snowflex ski hill Wisconsin Dells, WI is expected to open a 5.5 acre resort complex with 14 action and adventure sports including an indoor and outdoor waterpark in fall 2009. www.wedgeresorts.com
- White Pass Ski Area, WA. Expansion (767 acres, 2 new ski lifts, 18 new ski trails, mid mountain lodge in Hogback Basin) draft environmental impact statement (EIS) released 12/23/04, final EIS June 2007, amendment November 2007, U.S. District Court Judge James L. Robart September 2008 ruled in favor of White Pass with expected opening of new chairlift 2010 season opening day since no appeals to the 9th

- Keep Winter Cool www.keepwintercool.org, a joint effort of NRDC (Natural Resources Defence Council) and NSAA (National Ski Areas Association) launched in 2003 continued its 7th season as part of NSAA Sustainable Slopes initiative. One example of this initiative is that 68 resorts are buying renewable energy credits to offset all or part of their operational energy use of which 34 are offsetting 100% of their energy use.
- NSAA Environmental Charter is currently endorsed by more than 190 U.S. resorts representing over 75% of skier visits plus partnering organizations and participating organizations. 2009 marks the 9th anniversary of the Sustainable Slopes initiative launched in 2001.

We have aggressively strengthened our relationship with U.S. Forest Service. Utilizing our contacts in the U.S. Forest Service we stay abreast of a number of issues. We will continue to work to provide forums in which FWSA is able to educate U.S. Forest Service winter sports program administrators and NSAA on the operations of the FWSA Public Affairs Program and the concerns of our organized recreational snowsports participants and racers. We routinely address our issues to both U.S. Forest Service and NSAA in order to better educate them on FWSA's PA program and to further cement our place as a partner on important issues we all face. You can help increase our influence with U.S. Forest Service by calling or stopping in at the local U.S. Forest Service office when you visit ski areas and let them know you are there. You are the VOICE!

Consumer Advocacy/Trends

- Overall dollar sales for entire winter sport market (August 2008 to March 2009) declined about -5% (\$142 million) in dollars to \$2.82 billion and -3% in units (1.264 million) according to SIA (Snowsports Industries America).
- Skier visits decrease -5.5% to 57.1 million visits for the 2008-09 season based on preliminary estimates from the National Ski Areas Association. This still represents a +0.8% increase over the 10 year average of 56.7 million annual skier visits (Southeast +3.8%, Midwest -1.1%, Northeast +5.5%, Pacific West -5.8%, Rocky Mountain +1.3%). Overall snowfall was down 10% (Southeast +31.2%, Midwest +1.1%, Northeast -10%, Pacific West -10.2%, Rocky Mountain -14.2%) but relatively favorable snow and weather conditions counterbalanced the challenging economic conditions.
- Lindsey Vonn (age 24) is the first U.S. woman to win the world cup overall title twice and with 22 world cup wins (U.S. record of 9 wins in this season eclipsing 8 season wins by Phil Mahre 1982) is now 3rd on the all time U.S. list behind Bode Miller (31) and Phil Mahre (27). She competed with her right hand duct taped to her pole for the final month of races after slicing the flexor tendon of her right thumb. Vonn also won her 2nd back-to-back world cup downhill season title (matching the U.S. record set by Picabo Street 1996) and her 1st world cup super G season title with 4 super G wins (matching world cup women's record set by Katja Seizinger 1998 and Renate Goetschl 2007). With these 3 world cup titles in one season, she matches Phil Mahre's U.S. record from 1982. FIS Alpine World Cup 2009 season women's rank for Lindsey with last year's rank in parentheses: Overall 1st (1), Downhill 1st (1), SuperG 1st (6), Combined 2nd (2), Slalom 3rd (32), Giant Slalom 8th (13). She also first became the first American woman in 57 years to win 2 gold FIS Alpine World Championship medals (SG & DH) in the same year since Andrea Mead Lawrence won SL & GS in 1952 at Oslo, Norway.
- Rossignol Group wintersports (Rossignol, Dynastar, Lange, Look & Kerma brands of ski equipment & apparel) was sold by parent company Quicksilver Inc. which had purchased the group in March 2005.
 Sale to Chartreuse & Mont Blanc (headed by former Rossignol CEO Bruno Cercley) closed November

- 2008 for 40 million euros/about \$51 million which was down from the 100 milion euros/\$127 million offer in August 2008.
- FIS World Cup races available live and as VOD (video on demand) at <u>www.universalsports.com</u>.
- The Ski Channel cable television network launched on 12/25/08 with Warren Miller films & tv shows to 15 million households plus DirectTv & Verizon FiOS TV. It is the only cable television network devoted to the wide variety of year round mountain activities such as skiing, snowboarding, hiking, biking, backpacking, climbing, etc, along with many offslope activities through magazine shows, reality shows, movies, events, news, weather and programs that focus on destination travel, equipment, instruction and real estate. As of March 2009, the Ski Channel is in just under 20 million homes.

Transportation

You would be well advised to click on the relevant baggage rules link for the airline that you will be traveling on and print out the actual policy to take with you on your trip since the airline baggage rules vary on what snowsports equipment (skis, poles, boots, bindings, snowboard, snowboard boots, helmet, ski bag, ski boot bag) counts as one item and/or is allowed. Snowboard boots are not specifically addressed by most baggage rules.

Be aware that you may be charged for an extra bag if you decide to risk packing other items in your boot or ski bag since airline baggage rules do not specifically address in most cases the allowability of anything else beyond skis, boots or poles. You will be totally dependent upon the goodwill of the person checking you in.

Most of the airlines (American, Continental, Delta, Northwest, United and US Airways) have lowered weight limitations to 50 pounds, down from 70 for checked baggage on domestic flights.

Airlines initiated 2nd checked bag fees of \$25 in May 2008 with American initiating 1st checked bag fee of \$15 in June 2008 but there may be exceptions for certain frequent flyer levels, international flights, etc. Consult the Checked Baggage policy sections of the airline websites for further details

- United increases fee by \$5 for 1st & 2nd bag to \$20 & \$30 respectively if paid at airport effective 6/10/09. However, online payment will remain at \$15 & \$25 respectively. US Airways follows with the same policy effective 7/9/09.
- Delta begins 2nd bag fee of \$50 on international flights effective 7/1/09. Northwest 2nd bag fee of \$50 for international flights to Europe effective 7/1/09.

- Virgin America lowers on 5/5/09 2nd and 3rd bag fees each way to \$15 (was \$25 and \$50 respectively) and increases 1st bag fees each way to \$15 (was free). Most other major domestic airlines except Southwest now charge each way \$15 1st bag, \$25 2nd bag and \$100+ 3rd bag.
- Delta first bag will no longer be free. As of 12/5/08 Delta first bag \$15, Delta 2nd bag \$25.

Ski History

Far West Ski Association is supporting the campaign by Phil Bartholomew, the son of Orland Bartholomew, to name Mount Bartholomew – an unnamed 11,099-foot mountain near North Fork, CA in the Minarets, a section of soaring spires in the Ansel Adams Wilderness of the Sierra National Forest. Mount Bartholomew should be named to honor Orland "Bart" Bartholomew, a Sierra High Adventurer, who made an incredible three month, 300 mile solo mid winter trek skiing the Sierra crest from south of Mt. Whitney to Yosemite National Park - just for the challenge and the photographs. Orland made the first winter ascent of Mt. Whitney, the highest peak in the lower 48 states at 14,495' and the first winter ascents of Mt. Langley and Mt. Tyndall, both over 14,000' during this three month journey from Christmas Day 1928 to April 3, 1929.

A number of further details make this an amazing feat for a true mountain man. Orland skied on custom made 6' long wooden skis without metal edges with only a crude wax system for climbing and used ski poles made from hickory garden rake handles. He didn't have a sleeping bag or much of a tent. Bartholomew cut tree boughs and used them as a base to pitch a small shelter on the snow. He built fires for cooking. Orland wrapped himself in a down robe to sleep. He carried a 70 lb pack, a folding bellows camera and a double bit ax. Orland wrote extensive journal entries and shot 320 photos. The trek is the equivalent of traveling from Pasadena to Salinas at an elevation of 9,000 feet through fierce blizzards and avalanche-prone canyons. Gene Rose, author of "High Odyssey", wrote that Bartholomew's three-month trek "stands as the ski exploration of the first half-century, unmatched as a feat of winter survival until very recently when solo ski expeditions reached both Arctic and Antarctic poles." Orland worked for Southern California Edison as a hydrographer who measured the snowpack and stream levels to gauge how much hydroelectric power SCE could wring from the Sierra in the early 1920s. Orland later worked as a ranger (fire guard in those days) in the Ansel Adams Wilderness of the Sierra National Forest for 20 years from the early 1930s to the early 1950s. This campaign is also supported by Congressman George Radanovich of California's 19th Congressional District who has already written a letter of support which has been entered into the Congressional Record. - Actress Natasha Richardson fell without a helmet during a lesson in the middle of a beginner slope (Nansen trail at Mt Tremblant in Canada) with reportedly slushy and sticky conditions. After declining medical attention from the first ambulance, she complained of a headache a few hours later at her hotel room when a second ambulance arrived, was transported to various hospitals, and later died from an epidural hematoma. Natasha age 45 is survived by her mother Vanessa Redgrave, husband Liam Neeson and two sons Micheal and Daniel. March 2009. Make an informed choice about helmets and become educated about concussions.
- Extreme skiing & BASE jumping legend Shane McConkey died after experiencing difficulty releasing his bindings during a double back flip ski BASE jump off the 600 meter Saspardoi cliff in the Italian Dolomites while filming with Matchstick Ski Productions for a Red Bull ski BASE project near Corvara which is east of Val Gardena. He had successfully completed over 700 BASE jumps and starred in 21 ski films over 17 years. Shane also invented the reverse sidecut, reverse camber ski category with the Volant Spatula and founded the International Free Skiing Association tour. Shane age 39 is survived by his wife Sherry and 3 ½ year old daughter Ayla. March 2009. See www.shanemcconkey.org for more details.
- Andrea Mead Lawrence (the only U.S. double Olympic gold medal skier SL & GS at Oslo, Norway in 1952) died in Mammoth Lakes, CA after a long battle with cancer. She competed in 3 Olympics starting in 1948 when she was 15 and held the U.S. National Championship record of 10 wins until Julia Mancuso matched it in 2009. In 1951 she won 10 of 16 races that she entered and finished 2nd in 4 of the races. In

1958 she was inducted in the U.S. National Ski Hall of Fame. Andrea skied with the flame into the stadium at the 1960 Olympics in Squaw Valley (the first woman to carry the torch into the lighting ceremony). In 2002 she was honored as the greatest Winter Olympian of all time by noted Olympic film producer Bud Greenspan. When she carried the Olympic torch in 2002 on its journey to the Salt Lake winter Olympics she offered the advice "Your life doesn't stop by winning medals. It's only the beginning. And if you have the true Olympic spirit, you have to put it back into the world in meaningful ways." Andrea age 76 is survived by five children. March 2009. Bill Briggs (American ski mountaineering pioneer first ski descent Grand Teton 1971, Mount Rainier 1961, Middle & South Teton 1967, Mount Moran 1968; founder Great American Ski School). Liz McIntyre (1994 Olympic silver medal moguls, 3x U.S. Olympic Team 1992, 1994 & 1998; won 4 World Cup moguls events, U.S. Ski Team freestyle moguls 1986-1998 & U.S. Ski Team moguls technical coach 1999-2006). Nelson Carmichael (1992 Olympic bronze medal freestyle, won World Cup Mogul championship 1988 & 1989 plus 12 World Cup Events & 6 U.S. Championships). Cary Adgate (2x U.S. Olympic team 1976 & 1980, 6 U.S. Alpine Championship titles in slalom or combined, 25 professional victories & 1984 U.S. Pro Championships, won 3 U.S. Masters Championship events in 2005).
- International Ski History Congress "From Skiing to Snow-Sport: Cultures, Images, and Adventures" (3/29-4/3/09 at Mammoth Lakes, CA)
- Edgar B. Stern Jr. (founder Deer Valley Resort, UT) died at age 86 in Seattle, WA on 10/12/08. He was founder of WDSU Television, New Orleans; chairman of Royal Street Corp.; the Stanford Court Hotel, San Francisco; and a director of Sears Roebuck and Co.
- Nick Badami (past owner Park City Mountain Resort/PCMR, UT 1975-1994 & Alpine Meadows Ski Resort, CA 1970-1994) died at age 87 at his home in Tucson, AZ on 6/4/08. Nick grew up in New Jersey and started skiing at age 48. During his leadership, PCMR installed its first snowmaking guns which paved the way for hosting FOS Alpine Ski World Cup races at PCMR for more than a decade starting in 1986. Nick was Chairman of the Board of Powdr Corp (1994-2003). Nick's leadership helped to bring the 2002 Olympics to Salt Lake City where PCMR hosted alpine giant slalom, snowboarding halfpipe and parallel giant slalom events. He was a strong supporter of the U.S. Ski Team with his resort sponsoring many of the top athletes and being a board leader with USSA in the 80s & 90s (Chairman 1994-1998) and U.S. Ski & Snowboard Team Foundation (1974). Nick also served as President of U.S. Ski Team, Chairman of National Ski Areas Association, Chairman of American Ski Federation and co-founder & Chairman of National Avalanche Foundation. He also received the FWSA Tommi Tyndall award in 1980 as the operator of Alpine Meadows.
- 6th Annual Vermont Antique Ski Race benefit at Suicide Six Resort in Woodstock,VT on 3/15/09 for Vermont Ski Museum where past celebrities have included over 35 Olympians & U.S. Ski Team members competing with the general public in Strictly Vintage, Woodies, and Metal/Fiberglass divisions with all skis from 1975 or before.

Racing by Bob Ellis, VP

The 2008-2009 race season started off a little slow with poor snow conditions in many of our areas, however after the snow finally fell, it turned into a pretty good year for racing.

The first main event of the year was the Keystone Nationals at Keystone in Colorado. Once again the Bay Area Council won the Keystone Cup for the third year in a row. Forty competitors from all around the country had great snow, great weather and fun race courses. Next years event will be January 27-29, 2010 right before ski week at Keystone. Pricing for the event will be \$195 for the welcome party, awards banquet and three high quality race days.

In January, we arrived at Big Sky in Montana, and once again had great snow conditions but very cold days and a little bit of wind. The race courses were top notch, and those that raced seemed to have a very good time. Bay Area Council was the top Council and Modesto was the top ski club, and Los Angeles Council won the Council Challenge Race, while Sierra's Winning Depends Team won the Costume Award.

After all the local league racing concluded, most of the leagues sent their best racers to Northstar-at-Tahoe for the 2009 Far West Championships. This three day event brought in 200 plus racers of all abilities and ages. This year Open League cleaned up and won both the Children's Division and the AAA Division for adults. I guess having children makes you ski faster. The Northstar Race Department did a great job, snow conditions were very firm and temperatures were very cold. Comments received from participants gave me the impression that it was a fun filled weekend for most. Once again the FWRA will be donating funds to the FWSA Scholarship Program from our Silent Auction which was managed by Barbara Bryant.

Our insurance program continues to be a financial burden to Far West Racing as the insurance carrier gave us a \$500 increase in premium this year to over \$6,400 per year. Due to the economy, it was very difficult receiving donations for the Silent Auction and will probably continue to get harder in the future.

In 2010 the Far West Championships will once again be at Mammoth Mountain, so plan ahead and put it on your schedule to be there on April 9-11, 2010.

Awards Program by Catherine Ohl, Awards Chair

The modern day Awards Program was initiated in 1966 and has witnessed a series of expansions and changes over the years. For 2007, optional electronic submissions and voting has been added to the Far West Service awards. The Charity and Community Service Recognition Award for Clubs and Councils has been added this year.

In a volunteer organization such as Far West Ski Association nothing happens without individuals contributing their time and talent to produce programs. These dedicated people could never be compensated for the contribution they make to the association. For volunteer organizations, recognition is the most valuable thank-you that can be offered. 1. Far West Service Awards

The Far West Service awards, sometimes referred to as "The Great Eight" were administered by Catherine Ohl, Awards Chair, with a committee consisting of Linda Westlund, Mike Sanford, John Watson, and Norm Cullen. Use of the internet continues to be the popular and a most efficient mean of submitting nominations and voting. Voting was permitted using the internet, email or by the traditional snail mail. These awards are given to individuals or a team within the Far West Ski Association or Ski Industry. All accepted citations are archived at the Western SkiSport Museum in Boreal, California as a living history of volunteerism in the Far West Region. In addition to commemorative plaques and medallions, a permanent display of past recipients is showcased at the Museum. The Museum is administered by the Auburn Ski Club (http://www.auburnskiclub.org/), one of the founding ski clubs of the Far West Ski Association.

Hans Georg Award (1966 - present)

The Hans George Award is given for distinguished accomplishment and long-term contribution to skiing. This award is given to an individual or individuals who have contributed significant achievements to skiing, not necessarily organized skiing. It reflects a long term contribution and is the highest award of the Far West Ski Association. This award may only be received once and is based on a ten-year minimum service in the Far West region.

The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

2. Snowsports Builder

The Snowsports Builder award was administered by John Watson, History Chair, along with the Far West Board of Trustees. In 2008 Far West added this award to expand its suite of awards. The award recognizes an individual, teams or an organization that has made a contribution to benefit the sport, a contribution that has made an indelible impact on the sport and that may not have been fully recognized.

Such contributions may not be limited to any particular sector of industry, society, or the sport. Their background could include manufacturing, athletics, travel, journalism, electronic or print media, government, academia,

teaching and safety. The Builders Award is intended to be to those outside Far West's traditional service awards and may be made annually by the Trustees.

3. Industry Media Awards

Billy Berry Award for Hard News (1966 - present)

Candidates should have awareness of Far West programs and, in particular, its public affairs involvement. Award covers the previous two years.

Tollakson Award for Outstanding Club

The Tollakson Award was administered by Catherine Ohl under Mary Olhausen, FWSA VP Councils. Each club was asked to submit up to a 10-page bio detailing their contributions to the sport of skiing/boarding. Results from their Newsletter and Web site scores are included in this competition. In addition, each club was asked to submit a judge to help with the judging.

Wentworth Award for Outstanding Club and Council Publications

The Wentworth Award was administered by Catherine Ohl under Mary Olhausen, FWSA VP Councils. Each club and council was asked to submit a three newsletters (Sept, Dec and March) for judging. In addition, each club was asked to submit a judge to help with the judging.

Award for Outstanding Club and Council Web Sites

The Award for Outstanding Web Site was administered by De Catherine Ohl under Mary Olhausen, FWSA VP Councils. Each club and council was asked to submit their web site for judging. In addition, each club was asked to submit a judge to help with the judging.

For the first time in 2009, submission of entries and score sheets were available via the internet. 5. Special Awards

Safety Person of the Year Award

This award is administered by Richard Lubin, Safety Chair, under the leadership of Scott Bowker, VP Public Affairs. This award honors the person within FWSA who does the most to promote safe skiing and safety programs at the club and/or council level. Individuals are judged through the utilization of organized events, educational forums, print and electronic media, on mountain activities and partnering with other, safety focused community and industry organizations.

This award has been sponsored by Aspen Skiing Company since its inception in 1998.

Western Ski Heritage Award

This award is administered by John Watson, History Chair, under the leadership of Scott Bowker, VP Public Affairs, and recognizes an outstanding effort in the area of ski history by historians in the identification of resource material, preparation of historical publications and/or recording or documenting of significant historical events. This award also recognizes interest in Far West's history through collection, preservation and protection of appropriate articles and material. This award acknowledges the utilization of all types of media and is not limited to FWSA members.

This award has been sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corp. since its inception in 2000.

Club and Council History Recognition Program

FWSA has inaugurated a program to collect club, league and council histories. These will go to make up an historic collection available to researchers—and who knows? - maybe a book of histories from the standpoint of organized skiing. Charity and Community Service Recognition Award

Ski Industry Recognition Certificates

Long-term ski industry supporters of Far West and the FWSA annual convention are recognized with certificates of appreciation. This award is administered by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing and Convention Sponsorship Coordinator.

President's Award

The President of FWSA selects the recipient. This award recognizes one or more individuals who have made a significant contribution during the year to the goals of the Far West Ski Association or to the skiing experience of the "Western Skier".

6. Sports Awards

Joe Ross Memorial Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association Ski Week Staff. Metals are given to the ski racers at FWSA ski week who earn the highest point totals for the entire week in their age bracket both male and female. The Joe Ross Memorial Trophy is given to the club with the highest number of points. The trophy, donated by the Canadian Tourism Office in 1997, is on permanent display at the American SkiSport Museum (http://www.auburnskiclub.org/) in Boreal, California.

Club of the Week

Awarded to the Far West club who earns the most points racing at the annual Far West ski week. This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association Ski Week Staff.

Awarded to the Far West council that earns the most points ski racing at FWSA ski week. This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association Ski Week Staff.

Club of the Week

Awarded to the ski club who earns the most points racing at the annual Far West ski week. This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association Ski Week Staff.

Racer of the Week

Awarded to the female and male racer who earn the most points racing at Far West ski week. This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association Ski Week Staff.

Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West Race League that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. This award is administered by the Far West Race Association.

Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West Race League that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. This award is administered by the Far West Race Association.

Family/Youth Involvement by Linda Westlund, Trustee

The **Family/Youth Involvement Committee** of FWSA was established in July 2003 and meets at breakout sessions held during FWSA Board of Director Meetings. This committee works throughout the year to evaluate, develop and execute plans that provide opportunities for families and youth to participate in snowsports and ski club related activities.

Effective with the travel policy update affirmed at the July 2007, family participation is offered on all FWSA planned trips unless the Board of Directors recommends and votes to grant an exception for a certain trip. The 2008 Whistler Ski Week was open to members age 18 and above. In 2009, FWSA opened the North American and International Ski Week Trips for family participation. Family participation is member participation involving a minor under the age of 18 accompanied by a responsible parent or guardian.

Three youth joined their families at Big Sky Montana for 2009 Ski Week. Six teenagers enjoyed the 2009 Austrian Ski Week with their families for a great international experience, and the VP of International Travel reported that they were a pleasure to have on the trip. The Fall 2008 Greece Trip was planned as an Adult Trip, and an approved exception to the new family participation standard.

Family oriented trips and activities are also happening at the Council & Club levels:

The *Skiyente Ski Club of Northwest Ski Club Council* continued their tradition of an annual family ski trip, which was combined with the NWSCC's "Bachelor Blitz" over Easter Weekend this year. FWSA members will be invited to participate in the to be announced 2010 family trip.

Central Council held its first family ski trip to Mammoth Mountain, CA, in January 2009. Although late snow arrival affected trip sign ups, 3 of 15 trip participants were teenagers. There were no concerns or issues related to having minors on the trip. Central council reports that they anticipate an increase in family participation, especially on their weekend trips.

Intermountain Ski Council has a wealth of programs offered to facilitate youth participation in snowsports, including "scholarship" programs that sponsor local high school students to join the ski club on weekend trips to local mountains, in recognition of their academics and other achievements.

Other Councils and Clubs have also reported that they offer local skiing and off season recreational activities with a focus on family and youth involvement.

FWRA Championships continues to welcome junior racers and families. The 2009 races were held at Northstarat-Tahoe, and the Open League cleaned up and won both the Children's Division and the AAA Division for adults

History Committee by John Watson, Chair

The history committee is charged with the encouragement of interest in snowsports in the Far West. This includes support to the development of histories and to take note of and communicate news of historical import.

Continuing programs. Our continuing programs consist of the FWSA Western Ski Heritage Prize and our ski club and council recognition. The Western Ski Heritage Prize is sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corporation and is presented at the annual Convention held each June. Steamboat Springs itself is an area rich in the history and personalities involved in the development of snowsports in the West. Steamboat Springs, home of champagne powder, annually makes available a snowsports vacation prize for the history product selected by the judges for the Western Ski Heritage Award. Past winners have included

Our club and council (and this includes leagues) recognition is designed to stimulate the recording of history in the grass roots organizations. The recognition merits a cash prize generated by donors which can go to a charity of the winner's choice. In 2008, the entries included

- Sequoia Ski Club (founded 1935)
- Bay Area Snow Sports Council (founded 1947)
- North Island Snowdrifters (founded 1978)

The Sequoia entry included an incredible film of their 1935 Winter Festival. The Snowdrifters had a sophisticated presentation that included sound effects of aircraft. Snowdrifters received the recognition cash and a modest trophy for 2008. It is anticipated that Sequoia will reenter, along with other anniversary presentations.

Looking ahead. The history committee wants to be made aware of any snowsports organizations' anniversary years, as well as the passages of any members during the past year. In addition, the committee requests the biographies of all officers in our ski organizations. And this committee feels that an effort to produce an annual or some sort of periodic soft cover publication is definitely in order. It could capture many of the reports generated by the committees of the Association as well as our award winners' achievements.

International Ski History Association joint meeting with International Ski History Congress 2009. For only the second time in history, the ISHC was held in the USA March 29-April 2. Hosted by the Mammoth Ski Museum and led by Robin Morning, ably assisted by Marianne O'Connor and the entire Mammoth volunteer team, it attracted nearly 300 participants from around the world. Robin conceived of this whole event and pressed forward for over a year to make it happen. This was a truly remarkable ski event, awesome, humorous, educational, surprising and entertaining. The serious side of the joint event consisted of over 50 professional papers and several significant keynote speakers and movies. Some of the movies dated back to the 1930s and even earlier. The fun side consisted of glorious skiing and convivial gatherings. The papers will be prepared for

publication in the ISHA magazine by a grant to the ISHC. Attached is a complete list of the papers, with those having especial relevance to western skiing noted below.

Notable among the keynotes

- Dr. Rudolf Mullner, University of Vienna, on "Movement Culture and the Construction of Collective Identities: Skiing and Nation-Building in Post-war Austria."
- Dr. Annette Hoffman of the University of Ludwigsburg, Germany, on the case for women's ski jumping as an Olympic event. "Left Out in the Cold? Women's Struggle for a Breakthrough in Ski Jumping."
- Advance release of a film by Allison Probliso "Olympic Charm: Andrea Mead Lawrence, A Film".

The ski jumping issue is in the courts in Vancouver, Canada, and the FWSA has taken a stand in favor of women's jumping and in support of WJUSA.

The 34-minute film was shown on March 31, unfortunately one day after the death of Lawrence.

Safety Committee by Richard Lubin, Chair "The Snowboarding Chiropractor"

Safety

Having fun without injury is what safety is all about. It is also about anticipating potential problems. The ski industry has taken great measures to insure an excellent and safe experience at the ski resorts. Of course there All snow sports participants can appreciate how critically important safety is to all of us.

Many are aware of deaths occurring at ski areas this year. Deaths are often the result of skiers/riders going too fast and striking an object. There is little doubt that in each person has to set their own standards of what they consider to be conscientious and prudent behaviors. It requires a constant attention to the hazards and potential hazards around us.

Our sports take place in ski areas which do a great job at controlling many things which could cause us harm. Excessive speed, inattentiveness, and failure to look around are some of the main causes for injuries. Issues of safety are both relevant to the ski industry and very important to the Association.

The position of Safety Chair was created in the fall of 2002, with two time Safety Person of the Year winner ('01&'02). **Richard Lubin, D.C.** Mike Sanford and Dr. Lubin drafted a new Committee Charter, Mission Statement and Objectives.

The Association promotes safety by a number of methods.

- A) There is a special section of the webpage (FWSA.org) with articles on safety.
- B) In our annual FWSA SKIERS GUIDE, publication, the widely distributed magazine.
- C) The associations' quarterly newsletter, **The Councilman**, has featured articles on safety by Dr. Lubin and others.
- D) Our Safety Chair has continued to interact with a number of Risk managers and Ski Patrollers at the Ski Resorts to discuss issues of Safety.
- E) The Safety chair has regularly e-mailed original articles to many websites and newsletters.
- F) Our slogans—"**Ski With Pride, Let It Ride, Watch All Sides**" and <u>First With Safety Awareness appear</u> in many places letting all know that safety is an important issue with the association.
- G) Our **Safety Person of the Year** Contest brings greater exposure to our concerns and dedication to safety in snow sports.
- H) **The** FWSA **Thermometer program.** The Safety chair has delivered several of these to Tahoe resorts. Other board members have taken these to various other resorts.

Safety Person of the Year (SPOY)

Starting in 1999 the FWSA has been awarding a Safety Person of the Year to the individual within the association that has done the most to promote safety through a number of criteria. This contest has been sponsored by **ASPEN SKIING COMPANY**. They have announced that they will continue sponsorship. While every ski resort promotes safety, Aspen has proven their dedication to making safety an important issue by rewarding these individuals with a fabulous ski vacation. This includes a 7 day package for 2 including airfare, 7 nights lodging, 6 days of lift tickets, rental equipment, lessons, a mountain tour with an employee, and an appearance on the local

TV show.

SAFETY THERMOMETERS

This year saw the introduction of our FWSA Safety Thermometers. These 11 inch dial thermometers have the Far West Ski Association logo, Website, and the slogan "Be Safe. Watch All Sides". The Safety chair ensured that these were placed at Heavenly, Squaw, Northstar, Sugar Bowl and Sierra at Tahoe. Some of the other board members placed these in other resorts like Aspen and Telluride. Next year we hope to include more resorts. This is a great way to increase exposure of our organization.

RESORTS

The ski resorts take great measures to ensure that skiing and snowboarding can be a safe sport. Every aspect of a ski resort is predicated on safety. If there is any question about these issues, they will close a lift or an area. Long before a ski area is open, the patrollers check the slopes. Issues like avalanche danger, lifts, marking obstacles, padding lift towers, marking out of bounds, grooming are among the many safety concerns. Most resorts have a Risk Manager to address some of these concerns. Each ski area has its own unique set of concerns. "The Skiers Responsibility Code", which outlines safe practices, is displayed prominently at nearly every US resort on posters, on napkins and in restrooms. Ski patrollers issue warnings and sometimes pull the passes of those who demonstrate unsafe practices. We ultimately recognize that the issue of safety is most dependent on each individual's own cognizance.

We applaud the efforts of some of the national programs like Burrton's Smart Style, the National Ski Area Association's (NSAA) Heads Up Safety Program, Lids on Kids, and Safety Awareness Week.

Equipment manufacturers have contributed to increased safety in skiing. Material science and improved design have helped to bolster the numbers of safe snow sport participants. Certainly the advances in fabric technology have made snowsports more safe and warm.

INTERACTION RESORT SAFETY PERSONEL

The safety chair has personally interacted with many ski patrollers, risk managers, and safety personnel this past season. He had a unique opportunity to interview a lift manager at Squaw Valley who has been there over 25 years. We discussed issues of operations and safety. The ski areas in general do more safety checks than are required. In California the lift operations are also inspected by the State, unlike many other states. Safety compliance of the resort with their insurers is also an important issue.

In this relatively sparse snow season in Tahoe snowmaking was a big concern. The safety chair got to interview the snowmaking managers at Heavenly and Northstar, the two largest snowmakers in Tahoe. It is amazing how this not only contributes to the enjoyment of skiing, but also safety. Areas of high usage, like terrain parks and commonly used trails must have adequate coverage to be safe.

The FWSA Safety Chair is an avid snowboarder, with third consecutive season of over 50 days of riding at 6 resorts this season. Interactions have occurred on a weekly basis with the ski patrollers, both professional and National Ski Patrol (amateur). We discussed safety concerns like injury areas, profiles of injured skiers, locations, terrain parks and skier/snowboarder interaction.

TERRAIN PARKS

There has been a large industry push to provide parks and terrain feature. Since a disproportionate number of injuries take place in these regions it has been a great safety concern.

Some of the discussions have focused on making these parks safer. One of the strategies is to have multiple areas for skiers/riders of different ability levels. Burton Progression Parks, developed by Burton and Snow Park Technologies bring small features to an area and have increasingly bigger terrain features. This way skiers/riders can start small and work their way up. Four or more separate park areas may be provided at the larger resorts giving the public a great choice in diversity and intensity. A beginner snowboarder is less likely to get hurt if they have a choice for a smaller, less dangerous park. The larger, more extreme features attract those of a higher skill level.

There is little doubt that the trend for freestyle has attracted many to skiing and boarding and this trend will likely continue. We at FWSA believe it is a good and safe practice to use wrist supports and helmets. Other safety gear, like padded shorts, or shoulder pads may also help decrease injury. Rely on your skills, let the features clear before going, and use a spotter if possible.

Education and safety in these park areas will decrease the risks, however we expect people to continue to injure themselves. Burrton's Smart Style is a sensible approach. Respect the other people, look before you leap, and easy style it. It promotes rational increases in ability.

CONCLUSION

Skiing and snowboarding present the most risks ultimately to the individual user Like driving, one has to use common sense and ski or ride defensively, watching and anticipating all possible dangers.

At all FWSA conventions, safety has remained a major issue. FWSA has continued to focus its efforts on promoting safe snow sport practices.

The Far West Ski Association takes an active role in promoting safety. We have teamed with Aspen/Snowmass in giving a fantastic award for many years. Through our other methods we are leaders and proponents of safe snow sports.

The Safety Chair has developed a new hip phrase: CHARGE FIERCEBUT DO IT SAFE!
